### Charlottetown Couple Are With R. C. A. F. In Europe

MEITZ, France. — Among the men and women of Canada's NATO radar squadron in Europe, a husband-and-wife team achieve the same co-operation in their work as in their home life.

Recent arrivals at the squadron, located "somewhere in Europe," are Corporal Alan W. (Mike) Burns, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and his wife Emily, a leading airwoman, who comes from Thicket Portage, Man.

As Fighter Control Operators, both Mike and Emily play their part in the operation of the RCAF's crack radar unit. Equipped with late model radar of exceptional range and accuracy, the squadron operates 24 hours a day,

seven days a week, alerting and guiding NATO fighters onto unknown aircraft which may fly in to the Iron Curtain "buffer zone."

As well as its role in the defence of Free Europe, the radar squadron has also won the gratitude of many allied pilots by locating aircraft in distress.

The son of Mr. Warren A. Burns, of Charlottetown, Cpl. Burns was educated at Parkdale School and Prince of Wales College before joining the RCAF in 1953. His wife, the former Emily Evans is the daughter of Mr. George J. Evans, of Thicket Portage, and attended school there and at Selkirk College, Selkirk, Man. She entered the RCAF in 1954.
