Rochester Nips Cleveland 3-2

CLEVELAND (AP) — Rochester whipped in two goals with 52 seconds of the final period Saturday night to edge Cleveland 3-2 in a penalty-filled American Hockey League contest.

The hometown Barons led 2-1 until veteran Stan Smrke, the 35-year-old left winger who sat on the bench in his team's first five games, scored at 15:10 of the final session to tie the score.

Lou Angotti skated behind the Barons' net 32 seconds later and slipped the puck to Gerry Ehnman out front. From point-blank range, Ehnman fired the shot past goalie Les Binkley.

Smrke got Rochester's first goal at 2:00 of the opening period while the Barons were a man short. Ray Kinasevich made it 2-1 at 8:15 of the first period, and a goal by coach Fred Glover in the second period put the Barons in front 3-1.

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Faloney Leads Hamilton To Victory Over Ottawa

It took a last-minute quick kick but Hamilton Tiger-Cats won first place in the Canadian Football League's Eastern Conference Saturday with an 11-0 victory over Ottawa Rough Riders.

And Toronto Argonauts won up the league's interlocking schedule Sunday by downing Saskatchewan Roughriders 46-28 in a wild game that saw six pass interceptions and a fumble wrapped up touchdowns.

The Hamilton win gave them a bye into the two-game, total-points final to decide the Eastern representative in the Grey Cup. Quarterback Bernie Faloney was the hero of the piece as the Riders were caught napping on the quick boot.

Faloney scrambled back on second down with only 20 seconds remaining in the game and practically kicked the ball into the roaring end zone mob at Civic Stadium. Riders were fooled by the obvious ploy of strategy and watched helplessly as the ball landed in the end zone and bounced past the deadline.

It was a thrilling finish to a hard-hitting game before a roaring mob of 28,007, the largest football crowd in Hamilton's history. The winner of this game was automatically assured of a first-place finish no matter what happens in the 14-game schedule winds up next weekend with a pair of contests.

TOP RANKING

Hamilton now has 18 points, two up on the Riders. The Ticats hold a 10-0 edge in games with the Riders over the season and this gives coach Ralph Sauter his 10th victory as head coach of the two clubs end in a point tie. The last-place Argonauts are at Ottawa next Saturday and Montreal Alouettes, assured of the final spot in the three-team playoffs, are hosts to Ticats Sunday.

Bobby Kuntz gave Tiger-Cats a 7-0 first-quarter lead when he crashed over left tackle from the Ottawa one-yard line and Don Sutherland kicked the convert. The Ticats set it up when Ralph Goldston pounced on a loose ball at the Ottawa 38 after quarterback Russ Jackson's lateral got past Joe Williams.

Sutherland also kicked a 39-yard field goal in the fourth quarter after Riders had gone into a 10-7 lead on a one-yard fourth-quarter touchdown by Ron Stewart, converted by Rick Black who added a 17-yard placement early in the fourth.

If the game statistics meant anything, Rough Riders would have won easily.

They moved the yardsticks 20 times, gaining 381 yards rushing and 180 passing. Ticats managed only 13 first downs, 108 yards on the ground and 136 in the air.

Faloney completed seven of 21 passes and Jackson elected on 11 of 17. Each had one pass intercepted. The Riders fumbled twice and lost the ball both times while Tiger-Cats bubbled once and recovered.

and four fumbles. Argonauts intercepted four passes and recovered one Roughrider fumble to set up five of their six touchdowns.

Dick Slatto, 10-year veteran with the Argos, led the scoring parade with two touchdowns to take over the Eastern Conference scoring lead with 78 points, 12 up on George Dixon of Alouettes.

The 30-year-old halfback carried 17 times for 134 yards, completed three of four passes for 34 yards and caught seven Sandy Stephens throws for 131 yards.

The Roughriders scoring was handled by Hugh Campbell, Jim Copeland, Ron Lancaster and Dale West, who each went over for a touchdown, and Frank Tripucka, who converted three. Martin Fabi added a single.

Fog Postpones Golfing Round

VERSAILLES, France (CP-AP)—Dense fog enveloped the Saint-Nom-la-Bretche course, Sunday, forcing a 24-hour postponement of the final round of the Canada Cup golf competition.

The defending champion United States team and the Spaniards share the lead with 18 holes to play in the 72-hole tournament. It was so close by the South African, Australian and Canadian teams in that order.

A magnificent six-under-par 66 by Nicklaus Saturday helped send the U.S. into a first-place tie with Spain. The co-leaders have a 34-hole score of 41.

Nicklaus' fine score also put him into a one-hole lead with South Africa's Gary Player for individual honors. Each has a total of 205 after three rounds.

The South African team of Player and Retief Walman are one stroke back of the U.S. and Spain with 47, followed by Australia's Bruce Crampton and Bruce Devlin at 49 and Canada's Al Balding and Stan Leonard at 42.

The next best team score is 43, shared by Italy and Belgium.

DOUBLE STARTS

To expedite the final round to enable some golfers to play in the Australian open starting in Melbourne Wednesday, Canada Cup directors decided to send foursores off both the first and 10th tees this morning.

The forecast for today called

for more fog, but tournament director Fred Corcoran of the U.S. said if weather conditions prevented completion of the final round there will be a sudden-death playoff to determine both team and individual winners.

"It is impossible to delay another day because of varied tournament c o m m i t m e n t s by the players," Corcoran said.

Nicklaus, with rounds of 67-72-66, played exceptionally well but teammate Arnold Palmer lost his usually reliable and sometimes sensational putting stroke, shooting rounds of 68-70-72.

Palmer for the 6.534-yard layout is 72.

SURPRISED AT TIE

Sebastian Miguel acknowledged that both he and Spanish teammate Miguel Sota were surprised to find themselves tied for the lead.

"I've putted very well, but we have been most lucky," he said. "The Americans should beat us."

Sota fired a 68 Saturday while Miguel shot a 70.

Player's South African teammate, Walman, carded a 73 in the third round while Australian Crampton came through with a 67 and Devlin scored a 71.

Leonard and Vancouver had a third-round 71 and Balding, of Markham, Ont., a 73.

Sota followed Nicklaus and Player in the individual standing with a total of 207. Miguel and Crampton were next at 209. Balding, Leonard, Devlin and Palmer shared the sixth position—at 211.

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Two Players Are Fined
