Generally such positions are decreed to some elderly and prominent member of the party in power in the riding, who has borne the burden and heats of the day, and in whose honesty and sense of fair-play everybody entirely confides in. Not so it must sink into the yawning gulf of a chieftain's greed. The grits in this as in other things have since they came to power violated compact and disturbed the natural order of things to feed hungry and often unprincipled heeled in whom the general public have no confidence. It is really unedifying if not a public scandal to see with what selfishness and meanness those spite minded and disinterested patriots of the past decade or so rush and tumble over each other in their inebriated haste to grab even thumpenny-hapenny jobs which foul play and Star Chamber investigators give them. Prince Bismarck is much improved in health.

San Francisco is soon to have the largest plant in the world for disposing of the city's refuse by fire. There will be 32 furnaces with a capacity of disposing of 400 tons of material a day.

A despatch from Cape Town says the Het Dagblad, the Dutch newspaper, declares that leading officers in the Transvaal speak openly of war with England being inevitable.

Mr. Justice Wurtel gave judgment a few days ago that Mr. Greuer will be allowed to show justification for accusing Mr. Tarte of boodling, and all clauses in the plea of justification leading to this charge are permitted.

The authorities of McGill University, Montreal, have received from his Highness the Maharajah of Jeypore, India, a number of works on India architecture, known as the Jeypore portfolios of architectural details.

Bank notes of the value of thousands of pounds are annually lost or destroyed by accident. In forty years there have been outstanding notes of the bank of England, either lost or destroyed, amounting to £1,333,000 odd (over six and a half million dollars), every shilling of which was clear profit to the bank.

A despatch from Havana states that Captain-General Weyler, on arriving at Sancti Spiritus, learned that Quintin Bandera, the well-known insurgent leader, had passed the military line across the province of Puerto Principe, from Jacaro to Morono and the Island of Turiguanos, before the Alfonso XIII. battalion occupied that Island. The insurgents succeeded in passing through the swamp lands between the Island and Morono. The Captain-General has ordered the Alava and Vizcaya battalions to pursue the enemy. A skirmish with the latter has already taken place at Piecjo. The insurgents left eight men killed on the field. Bandera was accompanied by only one hundred and fifty men. The Barcelona battalion has killed fifteen men in a skirmish, and it is believed the latter formed part of Bandera's band or of dispersed groups formerly belonging to the force commanded by Gen. Maximo Gomez. The troops in the engagement with Bandera's insurgents had fifteen men wounded.

INTERESTING NEWS NOTES SELECTED FOR THE EXAMINER.

Sir William Whitewar, premier of Newfoundland, is to proceed to London to be present at the jubilee celebration.

Ontario will have a deficit of \$650,000 this year, according to the Treasurer's estimate. We are doing everything on a large scale, be it in the way of land grants or of financial deficiencies.

The net debt of Canada, at the end of March last, was \$256,355,271. The increase over March, 1896, was \$5,732,326. The Liberal Government is doing its expected work in the expected way.

Mr. Blake is carrying into the British House of Commons the painful notice of making long and heavy speeches which he earned at Ottawa. The London Times says of his recent effort on the financial relations between Great Britain and Ireland:

It would appear that Mr. Blake is emblematic of the reputation for lengthy and redundant oratory enjoyed by Mr. Sex on in the last Parliament. For more than two hours by the clock he poured out yesterday upon the House of Commons a diluted version of those parts of the report of the late commission which suited his purpose.

Egypt now, according to the latest census, possesses the largest population in its history. It has also the most lightly taxed population, certainly since the Turkish established their rule. Whatever outsiders may desire the Egyptian people should not want a restoration of unrestricted Khedival rule. The improvement is British in its entirety.

As an economist Mr. Malock is a self-overrated man. After he had been several weeks buried in the ins and outs of the various contracts and attending to charges trumped up against postmasters by office-seekers, he emerged with the announcement that he was going to save the country a round hundred thousand dollars a year in the cost of his postal service. The amount he really wants is not in the estimates, and it exceeds by \$20,000 the outlay for 1896 in the Post-office Department.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, April 15.—Hon. G. A. Kirkpatrick, Lieut. Governor of Ontario, keeps about the same. He hopes to return to Canada next week. His friends who met him at lunch and on driving, find it hard to believe the grave reports circulating in Canada about his condition.

LONDON, April 15.—The Daily Chronicle's special correspondent at Athens, Mr. Henry Norman, says: As the result of interviews which I have had today with King George, M. Delyannis and M. S. Kouzes, it seems to me that the situation could not be much worse short of actual war. The last words of the Premier to me last night were: "I have but little hope. The Servian Government has summoned all officers of the reserve, militia and national guards. The Servian insurgents are now on the Macedonian frontier, and the Servian Government is sending ammunition there constantly."

NEW YORK, April 15.—Hy. G. Barleigh, the big lumber dealer of the Champlain district, was here yesterday, en route for Washington. He says the political drift in the State of New York favors the Democratic party. The lumber schedule of the new tariff is simply frightful. It practically admits Canadian lumber free and does not remedy the defects of the Wilson Bill, as to the lumber schedule, a particle. The ex-Congressman continued: "I have written to Senator Platt that I am coming to see him, and get him to protest against the lumber schedule of the Dingley Bill. It practically admits lumber free by all waterways running into the United States from Canada. The states bordering on the Canadian frontier, and especially New York, have suffered immeasurably from the lumber schedule of the Wilson Bill, and now the Dingley Bill does not help us out a bit. I venture to predict that if there was a republican State ticket to be elected this fall we would lose the State by 75,000. I am going to protest hard against this lumber schedule in the Dingley Bill, and you will hear something crack in Washington."
