Both Factions In Lobster Price War Indicated

PORTLAND, Me. AP) — Both factions in a summer-long lobster price war on the Maine coast were indicted Tuesday on charges of violating the Sherman anti-trust law.

A federal grand jury returned two bills charging a conspiracy to fix prices.

The Maine Lobstermen's Association and its president, Leslie A. Dyer, were accused of conspiring to fix minimum prices, refrain from catching lobsters until the price was met and "induce and compel all Maine lobstermen" to adhere to those terms.

Four greater Portland lobster firms and three individuals active as dealers were named in the other bill.

The lobstermen's association claims on its rolls some 2,300 of Maine's 6,000 licensed lobstermen.

Tribute To Club Member

NEW YORK (AP) — Thirty members of the Milwaukee Braves will receive \$8,924.36 each for topping the New York Yankees in the 1957 world series. It was the third highest winning share in the history of the classic. Thirty-three Yankees collected \$5,606.06 each.

The cutting up of the series swag was announced Wednesday at the office of Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick.

Only the New York Giants of 1954 and the Brooklyn Dodgers of 1955 got larger winning shares than the Braves. Full shares for the Giants amount to \$11,147.90 and for the Brooks \$9,768.21.

The Braves also voted three-quarter shares of \$6,699.27 to outfielder Bob Hazle and first baseman Nippy Jones, one-third shares (\$2,974.78) to infielders Mel Roach and Dick Cole and outfielder John Demerit and cash grants of \$7,750 divided among bat boys, groundkeepers and farmhands who joined the club late in the season.

The players' pool, built on receipts from the first four games, was \$709,027.55 with the Braves cutting up \$297,791.57 and the Yankees \$198,527.72.

Canadiens Fight To Tie With Chicago Black Hawks

CHICAGO (CP)—Henri Pocket Rocket Richard's second goal of the game enabled the Montreal Canadiens to tie the Chicago Black Hawks 3-3 in a National Hockey League game here Tuesday night.

Richard's tying goal, a rebound on a shot by his brother Rocket, came early in the second period and ended what had been a ferocious offensive duel.

Ed Litzemberger, Chicago's leading scorer, also picked up a pair of goals, his first of the season. The other Montreal marksman was Jean Beliveau.

Nick Mickoski opened the scoring at 7:45 of the first period for the Black Hawks, but less than a minute later Beliveau evened matters with a long shot from the blue line.

Richard's first goal at Montreal on top less than a minute after that, but it was the last time the powerful Canadiens were to lead.

Both goalies, Charlie Hodge for the Canadiens and Glenn Hall of Chicago, turned in fine stops, but neither was called on too often during the tight defensive game the contest became after six goals were scored.

Hall was tested 21 times, while Hodge was forced to make 20 stops.

Canadiens seemed unable to organize any of their usually formidable sweeps into enemy ice and Chicago rearguards, particularly Jim Thomson and Pirre Pilote, played outstanding games.

Rousing Scrap Anticipated At Boxing Card On Friday

A rousing scrap is anticipated at Civic Stadium Friday evening when Bud Ramsay, P.E.I.-N.B. Welterweight Champion accepts the challenge of Walter "Peanuts" Arsenault in a title fight.

Yesterday both boys were confidently predicting victory, and both were training vigorously.

Ramsay expressed assurance of retaining his title, and said he could stop Arsenault within six rounds. He said he knew he was going against a capable opponent, and expected he would be in for a good fight, but said he did not intend to lose the title he won in the last card at the Stadium when he defeated the N.B. Champion. These two boys are both capable fighters and the championship which is at stake is important to both, and guarantees a scrap that will decide which of these two Summerside men is the better boxer.

Arsenault is training at R.C.A.F. Station Summerside where he is employed, and Ramsay is in training at Civic Stadium. Arsenault recovering from flu, said yesterday he can go the full ten rounds if necessary and walk out with the title. Recalling his pre-fight training opposite Ramsay on several occasions, he said, that from this experience he doesn't think Ramsay can defeat him and that he intends to be the new champion.

In the semi-final Urban Rogers of Borden and Indian River has been rematched against Wendell Oliver, Alberton by popular demand, following their recent match which was one of the most exciting, and action-packed fights ever seen in Summerside.

It was first thought that these boys would sign for an equal share of the purse but Oliver, who won a six round decision, has acceded to the demand of Rogers for a winner take all purse. Rogers, the smaller of the two, and not in top condition for his last fight has said he is now in excellent condition for this all important scrap.

On the other hand reports out of Alberton has it that Oliver has been working out regularly and is ready for what promises to be one of the biggest brawls ever staged in Summerside.

In a special 6-round bout Len Durelle of Bale St. Ann, N.B. and R.C.A.F. Station Summerside, a cousin of Yvon Durelle, British Empire Lightweight Champion, will take on Francis "Peanuts" Arsenault, who recently returned from Toronto where he has had several exhibition bouts. In the curtain raiser young Wendell Grady again takes on Young Young "Peanuts" Arsenault, and if past performances mean anything these boys will again put on a treat for fight fans.

Arsenault Moved Up

Walter "Peanuts" Arsenault, a rugged two fisted 140 pounder from Summerside, who displayed a two handed ambitious attack in his last bout at Civic Stadium will headline the Oct. 18th boxing card at the Stadium. The third to be presented this year by promoter Charlie Hogan.

Moving up from the semi-final ranks, Arsenault has been matched with Bud Ramsay of Alberton, the N.B.-P.E.I. Welterweight champion in a ten rounder.

"I know Arsenault is good, but how good remains to be seen, I have seen him in action and his record in the last six months is an impressive one. It doesn't scare me, I am too old a troupier for that. It may be that he is just the man to show me if I can go after the Maritime Welter-weight crown, or it may be a step up to bigger bouts with the top notches in Canada".

That is Ramsay at his best for he is not much of a talker, he oozes confidence however.

Arsenault dignified, yet plain, never outspoken, believes that his chances of making good Friday night mean everything to him, a win would be a great boost for him. Asked at Summerside on Monday what he thought his chances with Ramsay might be he said "I will give my best and let the chips fall where they may".

That is an overstatement for the likeable lad, for he never talks that way, he will be out to give Ramsay a hectic time of it while he is in the ring.

Ramsay will be the favorite, but Hogan points out that Arsenault is a fast improving fighter and he would not be surprised if Arsenault walked off with the decision.

GOOD SEMI-FINAL
In the semi-final of six heats, the fans will witness a return

engagement of Alberton's blond bomber Wendell Oliver and Urban Rogers of Indian River. This will be the second meeting of the two and is expected to be hotter than the first, which was a thriller.
