Local and Other Items.

ISLAND WHEAT.—The New Glasgow flour mill used 20,000 bushels of Nova Scotia and P. E. Island wheat last year. —Pictou Advocate.

WORKING AT THE ST. OLAF.—The Pictou Advocate reports that Messrs. McKinnon & McLean have several men at work on the S. S. St. Olaf, repairing boilers and furnishing new grate bars.

IMPROVEMENTS AT SUMMERSIDE.—The Pioneer says useful improvements are being made to the general waiting room at Summerside railway station. A new floor is being laid and a new ceiling put in and considerable space is being added by the removal of the partition between it and the conductor's room and throwing the two together.

GETTING THEIR PUNISHMENT.—The convicts at present residing in the Kingston penitentiary will learn that it does not pay to rise in mutiny against the authorities of that institution. Seventeen of the gentlemen who took part in the recent rising have been sentenced to one year in the isolation prison, and fifteen have had their lights taken from them for one month. The others concerned will lose their remission of good conduct time.

THE NEXT GRAB.—The scene of the next grab by the great powers will probably be in the region of Liberia. A missionary just returned from there says there is considerable unrest and dissatisfaction with President Coleman, and the neighboring tribes are encroaching and inciting the natives to rebellion. The missionary added that it is reported the French have encroached over the frontier from the Hinterland, and that the Germans were continually lending money to the Liberian Government in return for concessions, thus continually increasing their influence and hold on the country, though the Liberians would prefer a British or a United States protectorate.

AFTER THE BATTLE.—The Agriculturist reports that, at the close of the poll in his own town of Miscouche, Mr. DesRoches received a rousing reception. An immense crowd assembled, a huge bonfire was lighted, the Miscouche Band serenaded the victor, and speech-making and congratulations were the order of the day. At Summerside also, the same evening, Mr. DesRoches received an enthusiastic reception. He was met in the smoking room of the Campbell Hotel by a large number of supporters, and a meeting was organized with Mr. L. Morris as chairman. Short speeches were made by Mr. DesRoches, who thanked them heartily for their support, Mr. Neil McQuarrie, the Conservative candidate in the Fourth District, Mr. E. Hackett, Tignish, Mr. J. A. Arsenault, M. P. P., Wellington, Mr. A. A. Lefurgey, Summerside, Mr. E. Walsh, Wellington, Mr. J. McKenna, Summerside, and others.

A CLOSE SHAVE.—A correspondent at Marie writes: What might have been a very serious accident happened on the 1st inst. at a small bridge convenient to Mr. R. R. Webster's mill. The bridge has never had a railing placed on it, and while Mr. Horatio Webster, jr, was driving a spirited horse, with a heavy load of wood, his sleigh took a leap and precipitated both Mr. Webster and the horse over the bridge. But luckily, and strange to say, neither the man nor the horse were seriously hurt. FOUND IN OMDURMAN.

Strange Memento of a Cruel Captivity

CAIRO, Feb. 4.—While Sir Rudolf Slatin was engaged with some other officials of the Egyptian army a day or two ago, an official of the War Office came into the room and handed to him a small metal case resembling a revolver cartridge attached to a ring, which had been found among the Khalifa's effects brought down from Omdurman. The ex-prisoner of the Khalifa was visibly touched at the sight of an object he had last seen under circumstances of an exciting and dramatic nature. The case contained a paper on which was written in French, English, and German, "This crane has been bred and brought up on my estate at Ascania Nova, in the Province of Tauride, in South Russia. Whoever catches or kills this bird is requested to communicate with me, and inform me where it occurred."

The story of the Russian crane is familiar to readers of Sir Rudolf Slatin's book. The Khalifa sent for his prisoner one morning, and placing a metal case in his hands, suspiciously asked him to open it and see what it contained. Slatin did so, read the paper enclosed, and replied that the case had evidently been fastened to the neck of a bird which had been killed.

"You have spoken the truth," said the Khalifa more amiably; "the bird was killed by a Shaifa near Dongola, and the car ridge case was found attached to its neck."

When Sir Rudolf read him the contents of the paper the Khalifa cried irresistibly, "This is one of the many deviltries of those unbelievers, who waste their time in such useless nonsense. A Mohammedan would never have attempted to do such a thing!"

The case and its contents were taken from the prisoner, to be thus returned to him in Cairo as a memento of the days of his cruel captivity.
