COLLISION IN CANNO HARBOR.—A Canno despatch of the 15th says: The schooner G. P. Whitman, of Gloucester came into harbor this morning, ran into the schooner Acadia and Carrie C. W., of Lunenburg, produced laden from P. E. Island, carrying away the former's bowsprit and head gear, and breaking the foreboom, rail, several stanchions and plank of the other.

CONSCIENCE MONEY.—An Ottawa despatch says: The Minister of Customs received today a letter bearing the Hamilton post office stamp, which read as follows: "Enclosed find six thirty-six, conscience money." The \$36 consisted of one \$5 bill, Bank of Commerce, No. 99687; one \$1 bill, Dominion of Canada, No. 839833, and the 36 cents in three cent postage stamps.

THE LAWYERS PARADISE.—Complaints are made in certain parts of Quebec that the cost of the administration of justice is too great. The Huntington Gleason says that at the recent criminal term there sixteen days were wasted and a bill of \$2,000 incurred in disposing of two cases. One was that of an un-defended criminal, and the other was a petty misdemeanour for which the culprit was fined.

NOVA SCOTIA NEWS ITEMS.—An old colored woman named Nancy Bailey died at the poor's asylum in Halifax on Tuesday, aged 100 years.

There are two four-masted schooners loading coal at Caledonia Mines. One vessel is loading 200 tons and the other is taking 1,800. This coal is for the gas works in Britain, and the taking of the coal from Cape Breton is the result of a strike in the American mines.

THE JAMAICA EXHIBITION.—There will be a good show from Canada at the Jamaica Exhibition which opens at Kingston on January 27. Two hundred have already promised to contribute to the display, from Manitoba to P. E. Island. Seventeen nations will take part, including Russia, Germany, Austria, India and France. W. D. D. Mack, Superintendent of the Canadian Department, left Halifax by the Alpha on Saturday, taking lumber and material for the fitting up of the Dominion court. The local governments of all the provinces east of Manitoba, except Ontario, are sending provincial trophies, that of Quebec amounting to 84 tons.

Parnell-O'Shea Divorce Case

DISGRACEFUL END OF THE TRIAL.

Fall of the Irish Leader.

OPINIONS OF THE BRITISH PRESS.

Self-Effacement Advised

LONDON, Nov. 17.

At the trial of the O'Shea divorce case today the petitioner presented evidence to prove the charges against his wife and Parnell. Neither respondent nor co-respondent made any defence. The case was given to the jury, who returned a verdict that adultery had been committed by Mrs. O'Shea and Parnell, and that there had been no connivance on the part of Capt. O'Shea. The court granted a decree of divorce, with costs of the petition, and also awarded him the custody of the younger children.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

The Daily Telegraph publishes Parnell's political obituary. It says he must cease, for the present at least, to lead the Nationalist Party. It is reported that the followers of Parnell do not desire him to retire except by his own volition.

The Daily Chronicle says the middle class electors of England will certainly resist any appeal, even by Gladstone, to support a party led by Parnell.

The provincial newspapers join in a chorus of denunciation of Parnell, and Gladstonian papers in many cases advise temporary self-effacement.

Reassuring Advices.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

Everything was quiet about Baring Bros', financial house today. Members of the firm state that all their acceptances and other liabilities will be met as they fall due.

BOSTON, Nov. 17.

Kidder, Peabody & Co. have received a cablegram from Baring Bros. stating that matters are being arranged satisfactorily and permanently, and authorizing Kidder, Peabody & Co. to proceed with business as usual.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.

State Superintendent of Banking Preston stated late this afternoon that it was definitely decided that the North River Bank would not resume business, the directors not being able to raise the funds required.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.

In the case of Blanchard, the Boston sailor under sentence of death at Sherbrooke, Quebec, for the murder of a farmer named Calke, the executive have refused to interfere.

The Port Arthur board of trade have memorialized the government against extension of the fisheries modus vivendi licenses until the United States abolish the duty imposed on Canadian fisheries by the McKinley act.

MEI Employees on Strike.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Nov. 17.

One hundred employes in the Glasgow Mills, South Hadley Falls, struck this morning on account of disagreement between the agent and one of the bosses. There was no trouble about wages and the proprietors expect all the men to be at work to-morrow. The mills produce 8,000 yards of dress goods a week.
