### Teacher's Study Group Meets At Tignish

On May 26th the teachers of Inspectorate No. 2, Tignish, held their Study Group Meeting. Fifteen teachers attended and Supervisor P. E. Dolron presided. After the minutes of the last meeting were read the questions on the day's agenda were considered and discussed. In answer to the first one the group decided that no children who may attain their sixth birthday during the second half of the school year should be admitted in the Spring, because such a custom if it were practiced would only give the child a disadvantage for school in a very short time. Attending at such a time he would be alone in his group and would lose the happy experiences of learning new things with other little ones of his own age.

The teachers suggested that the Department inform the Secretary of each District of these and other disadvantages and have them read to the rate-payers at the annual meeting.

The second question, "How to occupy pupils who have finished their readers early in the year," was satisfactorily answered by suggestions such as—spending time on English Composition—oral and written—completing more thoroughly the work in the Guide Books to such readers, and doing supplementary reading. Teachers voiced their appreciation of the help sent out by the Department especially Canadian Nature, Canada Unlimited and Soil Survey of P.E.I.

All teachers agreed that no pupils should write Provincial Examinations without being reasonably prepared as it would be of no benefit to a pupil and the standard of such examinations would be lowered in the Province as a result. Text books, care of school property, and teachers' personal problems were all dealt with. Supervisor P. E. Dolron informed the teachers of a possibility of there being two days of local convention in September. It was suggested that at such a time it would be profitable to have a public meeting to which school secretaries and rate-payers would be invited. On the motion of Mrs. Eulalie Gillis the meeting adjourned.
