DR. RONALD HUGH MACDONALD

The sudden death of Dr. Ronald Hugh MacDonald well known surgeon of Saskatoon at New Orleans, Saturday October 15th shocked his many friends throughout Canada and the United States.

Dr. MacDonald accompanied by his wife was attending a convention of surgeons when death took place about twelve hours after the onset of a heart attack.

"Ronnie" MacDonald was born in North Bedouque, Prince Edward Island, 64 years ago. Both his parents were of MacDonald Highland Scotch forbears who had purchased land on the island a few decades after the conquest when migration from the British Isles began to come to what was to become Canada's only insular province.

"Ronnie's" pre-medical education was obtained at St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown and in 1908 he obtained a Medical degree from McGill being the Sutherland Medalist of his class; he won competitive internships at Bellevue and Harlem Hospitals, New York. In 1912 he decided to follow his close friend and classmate at St. Dunstan's and McGill, the late Dr. Robert A. Donohue who had settled in Rocanville, Saskatchewan, shortly after graduation. Incidentally it may be recorded that Bob Donohue's record as an athlete at McGill is only once been equalled and never surpassed. Having won the all-around athlete's medal four years in succession from 1904 to 1908.

Dr. MacDonald after a short time in rural Saskatchewan moved to Saskatoon and was acquiring a good surgical practice when he went overseas with the first contingent in the early fall of 1914, a matter of weeks after the outbreak of World War I. He returned to Canada in 1916 to recuperate from a bad leg wound received on duty up in Front as medical officer. On his return to duty in France and Belgium deserved decorations and promotions came to him. A surgical specialist in No. 1 Canadian Casualty Clearing Station, Lieutenant Colonel and Commanding Officer of No. 4 Field Ambulance, then full Colonel and A.D.M.S. of 2nd Canadian Division. The D.S.O. and the Military Cross and Bar, and mentioned twice in dispatches where the decorations received, it was stated in 1915-16 that he had been recommended for the V.C.

He re-established himself in Saskatoon after the war becoming associated with the late Dr. "Eddie" Munroe who had also won honors in World War I and was later to become Lieut. Governor of the Province of Saskatchewan. Dr. MacDonald was married in 1923 at St. Patrick's Church, Montreal, to Miss Nona Hutchison of Rothesay, Scotland. Gradually his reputation as a surgeon was being built up and he became well known in Western Canada as a Chest Surgeon. Conditions requiring removal of a lung for cancer or the results of severe tuberculosis were referred to Dr. R. H. MacDonald of Saskatoon instead of to the large surgical centres in the United States and Eastern Canada.

Fellowships in the American College of Surgeons, the Canadian College of Surgeons and American Medical Societies were conferred on him. Perhaps the honor he liked best was his membership in the comparatively small and select group of Chest Surgeons of the United States and Canada. The papers he presented before this group were highly valued by his fellow members. His interest in fox and mink was
