

Youth Club Manhandles Montague Primroses 14-7

Coach Jack Reed also hit for two goals as did speedy Jack Burke and rightwinger Red Howatt. Johnny Squarbriggs picked up the other goal and Arnold Mullins chipped in with five assists, his best scoring performance of the year.

Other Montreal goals were scored by Tom Johnson, Dickie Moore, Maurice Richard and Claude Provost.
Billy Dea, Gordie Howe and Norm Ullman counted for the Red Wings. Canadiens held a 3-1 lead midway through the final period only to have the Red Wings capitalize quickly when two Montrealers were penalized. The Wings quickly scored and then added another two minutes later to tie the score when Montreal was again short handed.

Moore scored what proved to be the winning goal at 14:46 while Marcel Pronovost of the Wings was in the penalty box.
