

# Halifax Symphony Orchestra Presents Delightful Music At QCHS

The Halifax Symphony Orchestra with conductor Thomas Mayer attracted capacity houses yesterday afternoon and evening at The Queen Charlotte High School Auditorium.

Mr. K.A. Parker briefly introduced the conductor and orchestra.

The afternoon program, primarily for students, was of special interest in that the conductor told the children what an orchestra was. Then Mr. Mayer with an infectious and charming style of European humour proceeded to name and describe each instrument.

After this pleasant music appreciation period the program started. It was obvious to all that the numbers were well chosen for a children's program. The child ten gave every evidence of really

enjoying the music.

The following were included in the program: O Canada; Prelude and March of the Toreador's from Bizet's opera Carmen; march from opera Faust by Berlioz; boat song from tales of Hoffman by Offenbach; waltzes from Faust by Gounod. This entire opera was recently performed in Halifax. Mr Mayer expressed the hope that it would also take place in Charlottetown.

**LEA MORGAN'S WORKS**  
At this point in the program the audience had the privilege of hearing Mr. John Lea-Morgan's two Afrikaans songs for chorus and orchestra. The names of these songs are "Aivake" and "Now is the Day." These compositions are definitely contrapuntal music, requiring ensemble playing in which the orchestra forms the harmonic

and contrapuntal interest against the melody or canto fermo of the choir. The orchestra is constantly changing in color and figuration. The ladies in the chorus were from various Charlottetown choirs and they sang with a near deal of artistry.

Mr. Lea-Morgan was called to the platform and children and adults in the audience showed their enthusiasm for the work of this great composer.

The program continued with a dance from Greig's Peer Gynt suite; March of the Tin Soldiers; Syncopated Clock; Flight of the Bumble Bee; Land of Hope and Glory, closing with the Queen.

**EVENING PERFORMANCE**  
The evening program consisted of popular orchestral numbers. The first an overture from a 19th Century French opera with the famous prayer that is often used as a hymn tune in Churches. The second number was the Italian Symphony by Mendelssohn. The chorus of the Pigmim's occurs in this. The third number was Mozart's serenade Eine Kleine Nachtmusik.

Mr. Lea-Morgan's songs were again sung. This time the work of the performers was most finished, as the afternoon performance had made a fine premiere.

The final numbers were dances by Borodin from the opera "Prince Igor."

The community project of bringing the orchestra to Charlottetown was sponsored by various Home and School Associations. All those attending were unanimous in their praise of these fine concerts and the opportunity to enjoy the musical standard in the province.

## Jury Finds Death Due To Medical Condition

"That William D. Taylor came to his death between Elm Avenue and the Prince Edward Island Hospital around nine a.m., November 8th, 1956 due to natural causes due to a medical condition," was the finding of the Coroner's Jury at the inquest held in the Court-room at City Hall Tuesday evening. Coroner Dr. L.E. Prowse presided. Mr. J.P. Nicholson represented the Crown.

The evidence of three additional witnesses was presented. Dr. Neil Boyd, Provincial Pathologist, explained to the Jury what his post mortem examination had disclosed. He stated in addition to superficial markings on the face, and the evidence of a brain injury apparently incurred several weeks or months ago, there were definite indications that the deceased was suffering from "fatty infiltration of the liver" at the time of his death. In Dr. Boyd's opinion this liver condition was the immediate cause of death.

Dr. Lloyd Cox described the deceased's medical history since coming under his care April 1st, 1955, following a car accident in which the deceased was involved. He stated that the victim had recovered from the major effects of that accident, but was subject to recurrent convulsions thought to be the result of brain injury incurred at that time. Questioned by the Coroner he stated that in his opinion, Dr. Boyd's conclusions were "logical."

Mrs. Mary Manuel, Charlottetown, was the third witness called. She stated that she had observed the deceased about five minutes to nine on the morning of November 8th, walking north on the left hand side of Elm Avenue. As she watched he fell to the street in what she thought to be a convulsion. Asked by the Cor-

## Committed To Stand Trial In Higher Court

Clarence Reid and Stanley Dingwell of Charlottetown were committed to stand trial before a judge without a jury on two charges each of being in unlawful possession of seven cases of Perfection canned milk and several bags of Perfection milk powder, the property of Central Creameries of Charlottetown. The preliminary hearings were held in the Law Courts Building in Charlottetown Tuesday evening with Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet presiding. Mr. J.P. Nicholson represented the Crown, and Mr. Allison Gillis was Counsel for the accused.

Clarence Reid was specifically charged with being in unlawful possession of 79 cases of canned milk, and the witnesses heard in this case last night were Gordon Stewart, office manager of Central Creameries; Blair Johnston, who works at Johnnie's Fish and Chips; Harold Murphy, caretaker of the Exhibition grounds, and Everett Hastings, helper. The second committal charge was that of being in unlawful possession of nine 50-lb bags of Perfection powdered milk and together with some of the previous witnesses, the following were heard: Earl Arsenault, worker at Central Creameries; Constable Cox, R.C.M.P., Charlottetown; Percival Simmons, officer at Central Creameries, Sgt. Don S. Davis, R.C.M.P., Charlottetown.

Stanley Dingwell was charged with being in unlawful possession of 40 cases of Perfection canned milk and ten 50-lb bags of Perfection powdered milk. Besides Earl Arsenault and Jim Trainor gave evidence on these charges. A third party was charged with two cases of Perfection brand canned milk the property of Central Creameries. Constable Williams of Berden gave evidence after which the case was adjourned for one week to November 20th at 7:30 p.m. at the Court House.
