

MR. BEER'S LETTER.

We do not wonder that Mr. Henry Beer should hasten to assert his innocence of the reduction of the valuation of Mr. Wisner's farm from \$6000 to \$4000.

If we have wronged Mr. Beer, we have done so unintentionally—upon what we considered good evidence—and we regret it.

It will be observed that Mr. Beer corroborates our statement as to the really important fact. The Assessors' valuation of Mr. Wisner's property was—after the lists were closed, revised, corrected, certified, and sent to the Provincial Secretary's office—in the face of the simplest principles of right action and in the teeth of the law—changed from \$6000 to \$4000.

We sincerely hope that it is not true, and that he may be able to meet the charge with a flat contradiction, but that is certainly required.

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 17. The following official despatch has been received from the headquarters of the Russian army of the Caucasus, dated 16th: Yesterday we gained a great victory over the Turks, capturing many guns and provisions.

The Turks were driven from the road to Kars. The fate of the battle was decided by a flank attack made upon Mukhtar's position from the north by the Russians.

The siege of Kars will recommence immediately. The Turkish official despatch from Constantinople, 16th, locates the battle at Adadjah.

The complete returns from the elections (except from the colonies) show 314 Republicans and 201 Conservatives have been elected in fourteen districts, second ballots are necessary.

The Conservatives retain 142 seats out of 158 held them in the late Chamber, and the Republicans 297 out of 363.

It is considered probable the new Chamber will consist of about 320 Republicans to 210 Conservatives.

Duke DeCazes, Minister of Foreign Affairs, is returned from Puget Thieniers in place of M. Lefevre.

Hon. T. McGreevy sues the "Free Press" for libel.

Martin, the forger of British North American bank notes, has been sentenced to two years in the Penitentiary.

Five hundred exhibits have been entered for the Paris Exhibition, independent of those by Government.

Mr. Cauchon has returned to dispose of household effects.

A special session of Congress met today, only three Senators were absent. The only business transacted in Senate was the swearing in of new members and appointing committee to wait on the President.

The land wires connecting with the cable on the European side were interrupted by the storm, but were repaired to day.

An unsuccessful effort was made on Sunday to float the "Massachusetts," the object being to lay her ashore on the beach to give the wreckers an opportunity to repair her bottom and get her in a condition to tow to New York.

Details of the surrender of Joseph and his Indian forces add little to previous accounts, except that Howard arrived just as Joseph was surrendering.

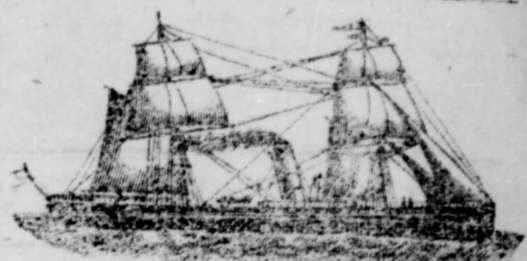
