Winnipeg Furrier Displays Fresh Approach to Taxation

WINNIPEG (CP)—An old-time tax expert, a Winnipeg furrier came apologetically before the Royal Commission on Taxation Tuesday and fast-nasted the hearing by unleashing a spanking new tax structure.

Morris Neuman clearly broke new ground at a time when the member commission is hearing many suggestions for the sixth time around.

"A fresh approach," said commission chairman Kenneth Carter, "with considerable virtue." And for the first time since hearings began last spring, spectators broke into a round of applause as Mr. Neuman rose to leave.

Here are the highlights of what Mr. Carter called "The Neuman Plan":

All exemptions for personal income tax would be abolished. Employees earning less than \$6,000 a year would pay no tax themselves, and wouldn't even complete a form. Instead their employers would pay the revenue department a monthly amount equal to 10 per cent of each employee's salary.

Husband and wife incomes would be lumped together.

GRADUATED TAX
Persons earning between \$6,001 and \$9,000 would pay an additional tax of 20 per cent on any amount over \$6,000. On incomes between \$9,001 and \$18,000 the tax rate would climb to 40 per cent, with higher incomes being nailed at 60 per cent.

Dividends paid by corporations would be taxed at the same rate as salaries.

The two-level corporate tax—now 21 per cent for income under \$35,000 and 50 per cent for higher incomes—would be abolished in favor of a flat rate of 40 per cent. There would be no tax holidays for new industries, and Crown corporations and co-operatives would pay the same amount as any other firm.

"Open the door an inch," said Mr. Neuman, "and you open it a mile—give nobody anything and you have nothing."

He figured that his plan would give the government an additional \$87,000,000 in tax money.

Clergyman Plans Jail Stay As Protest Of Traffic Fine

MONTREAL (CP)—Rev. Donald Campbell, a Presbyterian Church minister in suburban Pierrefonds, has decided to go to jail for five days rather than pay a \$15 traffic fine. He feels was imposed to his home without fixing his lights.

"The whole spirit of the law is to protect the safety of the citizenry and that's why I was stopped," Mr. Campbell said in an interview.

He felt he should have been told to have the lights fixed at the nearest garage or ordered to leave the car there until the next morning.

"But I was allowed to go on, still violating the law."

The minister announced that he would stop his car at the town of Ste. Genevieve of "using the police and the municipal code" to swell the community's coffers. The police car that stopped him was parked with lights out to see if motorists would stop at a stop sign, which he did.

Mr. Campbell pleaded guilty in Ste. Genevieve municipal court and was given the \$15 fine on five-day terms.

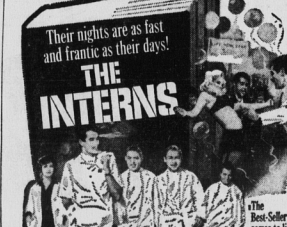
