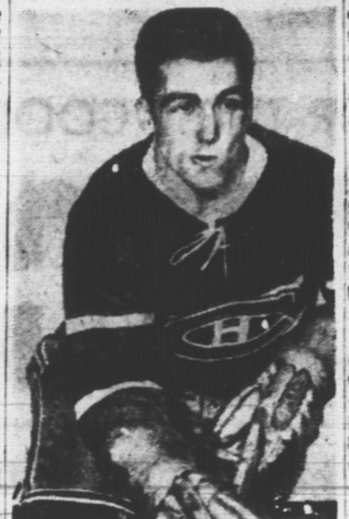

Montreal Nips Toronto; Rangers Trip Beantowners

By JERRY GLADMAN TORONTO (CP) — Centre Henri Richard's fourth goal of the season, early in the third period, enabled Montreal Canadiens to edge Toronto Maple Leafs 2-1 in National Hockey League action Wednesday night.

Frank Mahovich had the only clean scoring opportunity of the first period when he had an open net to shoot at with Worsley off to one side. But the big Leaf leftwinger shot wide of the corner.

With Jacques Laperriere sitting out an elbowing penalty, Keon gave the Leafs the lead at 9:13 of the second period. Mahovich fired a hard drive from the side, which Worsley knocked out, but Keon was right by the goal crease to knock in the rebound.

The Canadiens had an ideal opportunity to tie it up when the Leafs had two men in the penalty box for 1:14 seconds. But the efficient penalty killing by Keon and Bob Pulford thwarted Montreal's power-play efforts.

Watch Patterson & Grant Is Bombers' Game Plan

Most of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers will when they meet Hamilton Tiger-Cats in the 38th East-West Grey Cup game here Saturday.

"I'm concerned most with Patterson and Grant" defensive halfback Ernie Pitts said Wednesday as the Bombers got their first look at their midtown Varsity Stadium practice field. It was soggy compared with the hard surface Bombers have been accustomed to in the West.

"Patterson and Grant are their big threats," said Dick Thornton, another defensive back who has played a variety of positions, including quarterback, for Bombers.

"Patterson will probably be their key player," Thornton said. "He's due to play a good game."

Patterson, 32-year-old offensive end who came out of retirement for the last four games of the season this year, scored one touchdown and was a big threat as Hamilton went on to win all four games. He's been in six Grey Cup games with Montreal Alouettes and Hamilton and has five touchdowns, a record, including four on passes, also a record.

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Two Former Tiger Cats Hope To Gain Revenge

By WALTER KREVENCHUK TORONTO (CP)—Two Hamilton Tiger-Cats castoffs will fill key posts for Winnipeg Blue Bombers in Saturday's Grey Cup final.

Interior linebacker Al Miller and split end Ken Nielsen said Wednesday they'll be out for a little revenge when the Eastern and Western champions clash in the football classic for the sixth time in nine years.

"I had that in the back of my mind in the Western playoffs against Calgary," said Miller, who became a Western Conference all-star after being sliced by Tiger-Cats last July.

"It feels good... beautiful to be in the Grey Cup, particularly against Hamilton," said Nielsen, 23-year-old rookie from Hanna, Alta., whose pass-catching helped Bombers defeat the Stamps in the WFC final.

Nielsen, traded by Ticats to Winnipeg last August for end Cloyd Webb, combined with quarterback Kenny Ploen for a terrific two-touchdown afternoon. One was a spine-tingling 100-yard gallop that equaled the Canadian Football League record for a pass-and-run touchdown.

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Miller believes in about a year Ken will be on a par with Hugh Campbell, Saskatchewan Roughrider flanker who caught 73 passes for a WFC record 1,329 yards. "He's got great moves."

Nielsen said he enjoyed himself with Hamilton but "I was traded to a great team."

"We got here the hard way," he said, referring to the half-dozen close decisions Blue Bombers won in the 1965 season.

Miller joined Hamilton late in the 1964 season after the National Football League Washington Redskins decided he was expendable when a linebacker Sam Huff arrived.

"They wanted to use me at guard... I wanted to play linebacker," he said. "I wasn't real happy."

He wasn't overjoyed at the idea of accepting an invitation to join Winnipeg either. "I looked at their 1964 record (one victory in 16 games) and I was real doubtful. I thought I was going to another Toronto."

He referred to Argonauts, perennial last-place finishers in the Eastern Conference.

But Miller found a highly-efficient organization. "In Winnipeg, when they said they were going to do something, they did it. It wasn't like that at Hamilton."

IMPRESSED WITH GRANT He's also impressed with Grant. "He's cool, collected and handles the situation a little differently when a mistake is made."

Miller, a 25-year-old Cleveland native who played college football at Ohio University, said he expects Hamilton to run a lot Saturday. He mentioned halfback Willie Beetha as Hamilton's main ground threat. "I've always thought he was a good football player."

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
