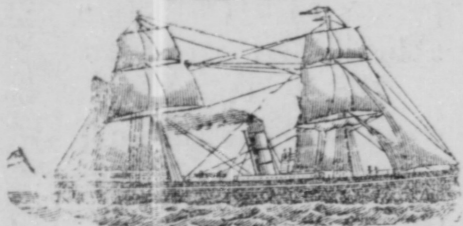

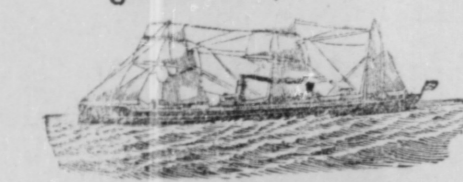

The Transvaal War

Words Tommy Will Hear,

Although born of English parents, the juvenile colonial or Transvaaler mixes much, and of necessity, with Dutch children and Dutch speaking native servants. Hence, as he grows up, a certain number of quasi-Dutch phrases become a part and parcel of his vocabulary, and require some study on the part of the newly-arrived Briton in order to understand their true significance.

For instance, there is a word which is always on the lips of everyone who owns a dog, and in South Africa one owns a dog and a horse as naturally as one owns a christian name and some worthless mining shares. This word is "voetsak," pronounced "foot-sack," and it means "get out" or "go away."

There is a story that a very new arrival at Capetown expressed his surprise that all the dogs seemed to have one name, "voetsak," and when you called them by it they always ran away.

Another familiar phrase is "Wacht een beetje," which means "Wait a bit." It is applied even to a particular kind of veldt bush with long, spiky thorns which catch on your clothing as you pass through—unless you happen to be wearing khaki—and torcibly detain you while you disentangle yourself.

"Pas op!" means "Look out!" and is heard on all occasions and on the very smallest provocation, or none at all. At the Johannesburg Agricultural Show, which took place in a big yard over Hospital hill, Englishmen who were not fluent in the "taal," or language, were puzzled to read big placards, pasted in prominent places, to this effect:—"Pas op voor zakkenrollers." Each one asked his neighbor what that portentous thing a "zakkenroller" might be. It suggested somehow of "jabberwock," or something equally gruesome. However, on enquiry, the dread message turned out to be nothing more alarming than, "Look out for pickpockets."

In South Africa, when a man is incapable of doing this, that, or the other job, say riding, for instance, it is said of him, "He can't ride for sour apples!" If you want to imply that you are a particularly smart fellow and not easily taken in—and this is a favorite assumption of the untraveled colonial—you must say often and with emphasis, "I'll watch it!"

If a man is absolutely averse to doing any and if he has been swindled he alleges that So-and-so has been "doing a shot" on him.

Views of Military Men.

Military writers are divided between two courses, and unable to forecast General Buller's plan of campaign with confidence. The force now available for the defence of a strategic line of the highest importance for the direction of the campaign in December is utterly inadequate, not exceeding four thousand infantry, and is without field guns and cavalry. General Buller's sagacity in reducing the number of exposed points from three to two is apparent, even if he had to sacrifice a fine plan on paper for a concentric march to Bloemfontein from three points. What, however, can be said in favor of the military plans of defence which were formed at the Cape before his arrival, and were mainly based on the necessity of overawing the disaffected Dutch in the districts by infantry garrisons too far removed to support one another? Nothing, except that the issues of colonial politics were mixed up with them, and that modern

warfare has remained, after all, an exact science.

The keenest military writers who analyze the situation for yesterday's journal lay stress upon the fact that the Dutch allies are wasting their resources by attacking the British at too many points instead of concentrating their efforts upon one or two lines. This is true. Whatever advantage they have won has been due to the recklessness of their enemies who have forgotten that the Boer was first a hunter and then a frontier backwoods warrior, hunting foes as though they were deer or birds to be stalked or entrapped, and have fancied that he is another Afridi or dervish to be rushed and carried off his feet. The Boers have made graver tactical mistakes than the British staff, although its record is not particularly brilliant in defensive work, and they have allowed three weeks to slip by without winning a decisive success by virtue of their overwhelming superiority of numbers.

General Symons.

General Symons will go down to history as one of Britain's heroes. At the battle of Glencoe he ordered the gallant charge which was made by the Dublin Fusiliers and the King's Royal Rifles. Seeing the men hard pressed, he instructed his staff to remain in safety, and rode out into the open to cheer on the advancing British troops. When half a mile out he reeled in his saddle, and Major Keerton hastened to his rescue, only to be shot dead on the spot. Borne from the battlefield mortally wounded, Sir William Symons received the joyful intelligence that his men had carried the Boer position. It was a repetition of Wolfe's experience. Six days after the battle the general died after ordering the withdrawal to Ladysmith, and was buried wrapped in the British flag.
