NEW YORK, Jan. 2 — (AP)—Ed Lopat, New York Yankee left-handed ace, has signed his 1952 contract for a reported \$25,000 salary. The Yankees, revealing no terms, announced the signing in New York while Lopat conducted his baseball school at Daytona Beach, Fla. Contracts for the 39 other Yankee players will go in the mail this week.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 2 — (AP)—Ewell Blackwell, famous Cincinnati Reds pitcher, today signed his 1952 contract. "The Whip," who had only a fair record last season — he won 16 and lost 15 — came to terms with general manager Gabe Paul after a brief conference.

What pay Blackwell will receive was not disclosed. However, he is reported to have been receiving \$25,000 annually for years.

CHICAGO, Jan. 2 — (AP)—Robert (Red) Wilson, former University of Wisconsin football and baseball star, today signed a 1952 contract with the Chicago White Sox.

Wilson, a catcher, 29 years old, became the eleventh player to sign for the coming season. He played with Memphis, Tenn., a White Sox affiliate, last season, batting .327 in 82 games.

Goalies Paul LeClerc of Valleyfield, Johnny Marois of Quebec and Al Millar of Shawinigan are tied for shutout honors with four each.

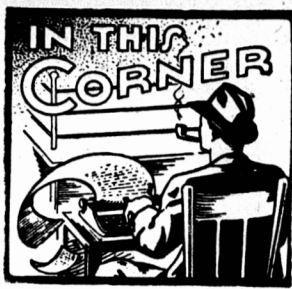

The Islanders will leave this afternoon by plane for Glace Bay where they will tangle with the Miners in a game that was postponed for twenty four hours to the mutual benefit of both clubs.

Missing from the Islanders lineup will be "Buck" Whitlock who is expected to be out for a couple of games with a bruised knee-cap which he suffered in Saint John. Whitlock injured his knee when he was checked heavily by Johnny Arundel on the Beavers blue-line. "Buck" was hit slightly above the knee cap.

Another Charlottetown injury at Saint John was "Bucko" Trainer. The team captain was cut behind the ear by a Saint John skate and the gash required a couple of stitches. "Bucko" will be playing tonight. Johnny Dutchak, who has been ill with the flu, will also be back at his regular position on defence.

Contrary to reports which came out of Saint John coach Leo Lamoureux did not take the Islanders off the ice. Leo called the team over to the boards by the players bench as he wanted to discuss a decision of the referees. The official's decision to give George McLagan a misconduct penalty caused the argument when Leo thought the penalty was undeserved. The referees gave the Islanders two minutes to resume play.

For a time following the financial crisis in Sydney, there were reports that the whole Millionaires defense corps were seeking their releases. Things have picked up since then, however, and it looks as if the Millionaires will be keeping their blue-line belters. The latest to come to agreement with the Sydney management has been Joe Levandoski. The big defenseman, who at \$300 a week, was the highest paid player on the Sydney club came to terms yesterday for the second time this season.

The Millionaires paid Levandoski his back pay and also deposited \$2200 in the bank for him which will cover his salary for the rest of the schedule. With eleven weeks left in the schedule it appears as though Levandoski was among those who took a salary cut. A few days ago Aubrey Keizer in the Sydney Post-Record reported that Levandoski was asking the club to put \$3,000 in the bank so that he could be sure of his regular pay. Since then he has had a change of heart or the Millionaires do not think they can make the play-offs.

Frank Bathgate, former Islanders centreman was having money troubles with the Millionaires and there were reports that he would be given his release if it was rumored that he would be heading for Halifax but now it appears that he may remain at Sydney. Nick Pidsodny, the Millionaires goaltender who failed to make the team wants to return to the Millionaires A Halifax sportscaster predicts that Pidsodny will go to Vancouver and play for the Canucks in the P.C.H.L.

The transfer of ownership of the Moncton Hawks from LeBaron Reid to a citizenship committee should benefit the Moncton team. Community owned teams have proved more successful in surviving than privately owned teams in smaller centres as evidenced in Charlottetown and Glace Bay. The probable reason for such success is that the individual fan feels he owns a certain amount of the team, that he has a personal interest in the club and so he will support it more heartily than if one man or a group of men owned the team.

With a new shot of life into the Hawks and into the league as a result, the Monctonians can be expected to provide pretty stiff battles from here in. They have been victorious in their last three games, one of them a 7-3 victory over the Miners, another a 5-2 win at the expense of the Millionaires along with a 2-1 win over Saint John. The Hawks are now in fourth place one point behind the Miners.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2 — (CP)—Time magazine announced today that its man of the year for 1951 is Premier Mohammed Mossadegh of Iran.

Mossadegh's picture appears on the cover of the current issue captioned: "He oiled the wheels of chaos."

Of Mossadegh, who sparked his country's oil crisis, Time's editors said: "In the year of his rise to power he was in some ways the most noteworthy figure on the world scene. Not that he was the best or the first or the strongest, but because his rapid advance from obscurity was attended by the greatest stir. The stir was not only on the surface of events; in his strange way this strange old man represented one of the most profound problems of his time. Around this dizzy old wizard swirled a crisis of human destiny."

OSLO, Jan. 2 — (AP)—A last-minute entry from Portugal today increased the number of countries taking part in the Olympic Winter Games to a record-breaking 29.

The wire from Lisbon arrived in Oslo shortly before the New Year's eve deadline but was not received by the Norwegian Olympic committee till today because of holiday delays.

The previous attendance record for the winter games was set in 1936 with 28 countries competing in Garmisch-Partenkirchen in Germany. The same number fought for Olympic laurels in St. Moritz, Switzerland, in 1948.

Beavers Edge Moneymen 5-4 In Hard-Fought Game On Sydney Ice

SYDNEY, N.S., Jan. 2 — (CP)—A breakout goal by centre Johnny Ubrico at 11:03 of the third period gave the Maritime Major Hockey League Leaders, Saint John Beavers, a hard-earned 5-4 victory over Sydney Millionaires before 1,950 fans here tonight.

The tally dissolved an uphill climb by the Millionaires who, in arrears by three goals at one stage, battled back to deadlock Beavers 4-4 and maintain the pressure in and around goalkeeper Gordon Mabee till the final whistle.

Ubrico, least effective of Saint John's forwards on the general play, saved his best burst of speed until Sydney defenceman Bill Dinning missed a pass back on a Millionaire power play behind the Beaver line. He blazed down centre unopposed and laced an ankle high shot past Cliff Hicks when 20 feet out.

Pressed hard all the way, Beavers made the grade with brilliant forechecking and defensive play. Beavers had it 3-0 at 2:50 of the second period when Nick Nic-

olle reached around the fallen Hicks to score, following first period markers by Pete Langelle and Ed Mulligan.

Undaunted and banking their comeback try on more shooting, harder and from longer range, Millionaires scored two minutes later when Dean MacBride's slap shot split Mabee's pads.

Beavers got their three goal bridge back on a surprise punch shortly after their defenceman Matt Mesich got the gate for interference. Mulligan broke from his own end with no barrier in sight but the goalkeeper.

Don McRae steered Mulligan around but the Beaver winger retained possession of the puck and angled it into the open net.

McRae, outstanding player on the ice, offensively and defensively, gained a measure of revenge at 9:38 when he blocked a shot at the Sydney line and swivelled his way through the entire Beaver corps and sank a 25-footer.

At 12:19 Fred Hildebrand caught a pass from playing coach Cliff Roach at the Beaver line, skirted around the left side and shot from almost the exact spot from which McRae failed.

Concentrating their biggest push in the third period, Millionaires met with airtight defence. Millionaires got their equalizer, however, at 5:33 of the final frame when Dunc MacIntyre rapped a shot off Mabee's stick. Mabee was out of his net and unable to recover when Lorne Pirie swarmed through to bang the rebound.

Mabee, replacement for regular Phil Hughes, performed when his performance was needed most. He came through in the minutes after Ubrico's winning goal with at least three personal blocks from Millionaires on his doorstep. He steered aside point-blank shots from Alex Birukov, Ron Matthews and Dunc MacIntyre.

Hicks was removed for an extra forward with 36 seconds left to play. Millionaires held for three faceoffs in the Beaver end but failed to counter despite two big scrambles before the net.
