No Assisted Passage Loans To Orientals

OTTAWA, Feb. 12. - (Special) - IMMIGRATION Minister Walter Harris stated today that assisted passage loans are not granted to immigrants coming from Oriental countries. The statement was made in reply to a question placed on the House of Commons order paper by T. J. Kitchin, Liberal member for King's.

Mr. Harris explained that while the Federal Government does not lend money to Orientals to facilitate their coming to Canada, once they arrive in this country they may call on the good offices of the settlement service of the Immigration branch, and the National Employment Service. In the past, loans enabling the eligible Oriental countries to come to Canada have been made by missionary and church societies and by private individuals.

In the official answer to Mr. Kitchin's query, Mr. Harris states that loans to Orientals coming to Canada from Britain, Ireland and certain European countries, are interest free and cover minimum ocean fare and inland transportation in Canada. These loans are made to certain classes of immigrants, namely those eligible by reason of their occupation. At present these loans are being made available to dependents of immigrants coming from the flooded areas of Britain, Belgium and the Netherlands, when the head of the family is eligible by reason of his occupation.

S'side Board Of Trade Names New Committees

Mr. Alan Holman, newly elected president of the Summerside Board of Trade presided last evening at the opening meeting of the 1953 season. There was a better than usual attendance of the members present. He congratulated the members on their good attendance and said he felt greatly honored at being elected to head the board for the coming year.

He pointed out that a board of trade exists for the good of the community, to foster understanding between town and rural districts and said that only through an active and interested membership can a board of trade really be effective.

The meeting ratified the appointment by the council of five committees which will act during the coming year. These committees are:

Membership and Entertainment: E. M. Cannon, chairman; Gregory Mulholland, vice-chairman; Robert Schurman, Richard Henthorn.

Some discussion was held regarding the formation of a retail merchants committee. Trading Volume Climbs But Prices Slip At Toronto

TORONTO, (CP) - Speculative stocks in low-priced mining interests Thursday boosted trading volume but the market generally slipped.

Volume totalled 7,070,000. Holdings in Saskatchewan uranium districts and in New Brunswick base metal areas drew most speculative interest.

Gold's dropped almost a point on the exchange's index. Base metals slipped and western oils were mixed.
