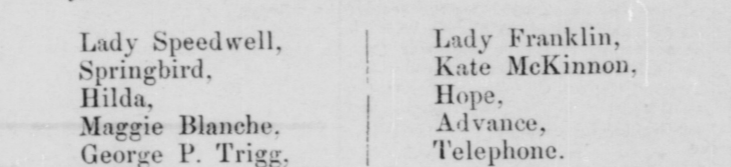

THE RULING PRICES. In this city, oats sell at 32 cents per bushel for black and 33 cents for white; wheat at 48 cents per bushel; potatoes at 22 cents per bushel, and turnips at 11 cents; pork at 51 to 6 cents per pound, and eggs at 15 cents per dozen.

The movement of produce in the past week has been very quiet, though the supply has apparently been equal to the demand. No improvement has, so far, followed the reduction of duties by the United States Congress; and farmers have been ploughing and rounding up their fall's work, in the hope that there will be a better demand and higher prices later in the season.

Most of the shipments to date have been to Provincial ports, Newfoundland and the West Indies, where the highest prices are paid. Big prices for potatoes in the Boston market have not yet been obtained. The latest quotations being: Woodstock Helron, per bushel, 55 to 56c; do, Rose, 50 to 55c; do, White Stock, 53 to 55c; and Dakota Red, 50c. The tendency seems now to be upward. Halifax advices report that there is just now a small boom in that market, small lots selling from schooners at 35 cents a bushel.

Oats in St. John are quoted at 37 to 40 cents a bushel, and in Halifax at 40 cents, P. E. Island oats having the preference, as being of a better quality than those from Ontario. In the British and foreign markets we see no change to note.

The Montreal quotations for pork are: Canadian short cut, heavy, \$19 to \$20; Canadian short cut, light, \$18 to \$19; do, heavy, city cured, per lb., 10 to 11c; do, light, compound, per lb., in pairs, 7 to 7 1/2 cents; do, pure, per lb., in pairs, 9 to 9 1/2 cents; dressed hogs, 6 to 8 1/2 cents per pound, with a downward tendency.

Eggs are, if we mistake not, a cent or two lower in price than they were at this time last year. The Boston market has not strengthened according to anticipation. A great many eggs have, this year, been sent from Canada to England. The Montreal Trade Bulletin says: "The receipts of Canadian eggs in Great Britain for last September were 497,620 dozen, against 230,630 dozen for the corresponding month of last year, being an increase of over 100 per cent. In fact, there were more eggs shipped from Montreal to British ports last month than during the whole year of the month ending Sept. 30th, last year. The total receipts of Canadian eggs in England during the past nine months ending Sept. 30th was 780,370 dozen, against 460,944 dozen for the corresponding period of last year. The month now closing will also show large shipments from this port. Some idea of the immense proportions of the British egg trade may be gathered from the fact that the importations of eggs into Great Britain during the past nine months ending Sept. 30th, were no less than 88,106,310 dozen, of which the imports from Canada were less than the one-hundredth part, showing to what an extent our trade with the mother country may be carried. Account sales have been received from Liverpool and Glasgow of two round lots of eggs netting to shippers in the west 17c and 18c respectively; but the quality of the eggs was fine fall-gathered and selected. Picked eggs have sold in Liverpool netting to shippers in the west 15c and 16c, and in some instances we hear that even higher prices than the above have been realized. Other account sales have been received from London, but as a rule shipments to England have paid fairly well during the past six weeks.

It is notable, too, that the export of horses from Montreal to Great Britain from the beginning of navigation to the end of October reached the total 6,995. For the fiscal year 1893, the shipments from all Canada to the old country were only 1,946; in 1892 they were but 1,205, while in 1890 they were only 125. The pineal gland is a small body almost in the center of the brain. It contains a cavity holding a sandy substance composed of phosphate and carbonate of lime. Its use in the animal economy is absolutely unknown. Fanciful physiologists have conjectured it to be the seat of the soul.

Instances are numerous of persons who, born without arms, learned to use their feet as hands. In London, in "The Artificial Chang-ling," tells of John Simonds, a native of Berkshire, who was born armless, but who could write with his mouth, thread a needle with his toes, tie a knot, play cards and do almost anything else that another person usually does with his fingers.

The apparatus for keeping the eye moist is complex and efficient. It comprises the lacrimal gland, which secretes the tears; the lacrimal canaliculi, which convey the tears into the eye; and the lacrimal sac, a dilatation of the canal.
