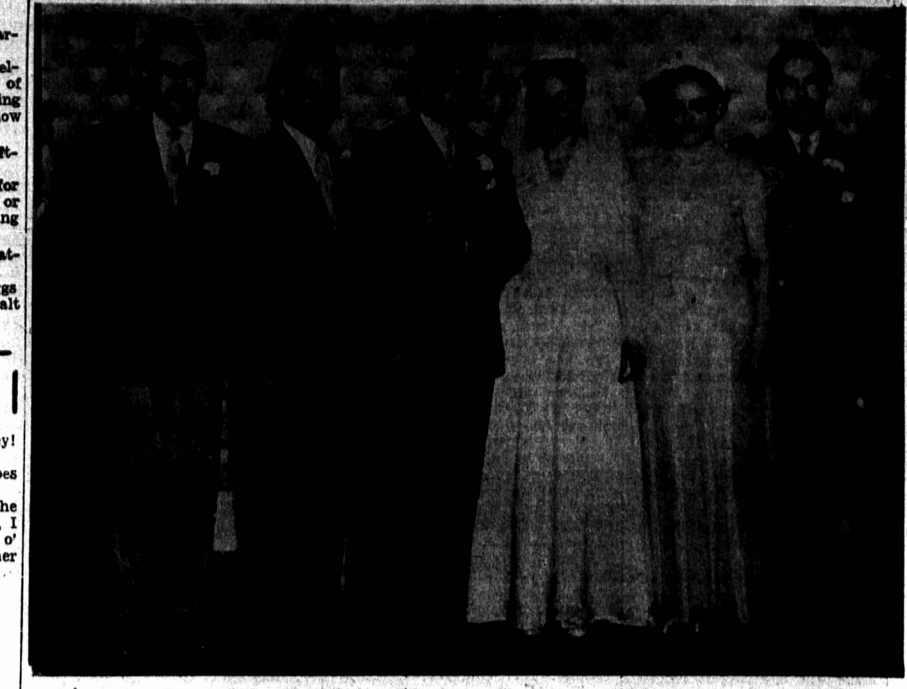

Favorite Recipes Revealed In 'From Ottawa Kitchens'

OTTAWA (CP) — Some of Ottawa's more distinguished cooks have revealed their favorite recipes in a little yellow book entitled "From Ottawa Kitchens."

This choice collection of more than 250 recipes is selling in local book stores for one dollar. The proceeds will go to the Canadian Save The Children Fund.

Wives of diplomats, cabinet ministers, business and professional leaders have all contributed to the book. It's not a purely feminine preserve, however.

SPAGHETTI BASE

Defence Minister Claxton has submitted a recipe for beefsteak and kidney pie and another for "spaghetti bolagnissimo." The spaghetti recipe which serves 12, includes 2 tablespoons fat, 2 cloves, garlic, 4 large onions, 1 lb. coarse ground or fine chopped beef, 1 lb. similarly treated ham, 1 small can Italian-style tomato paste, 4 large tomatoes, 1 cup chopped celery, 1/2 cup chopped green pepper, 1 bay leaf, 4 cloves, 1 tsp. Worcester-shire sauce, 1 tsp. celery salt, 1/4 tsp. thyme, 1/4 tsp. nutmeg, 1/4 tsp. sweet basil, 1/2 lb. mushrooms, 4 oz. grated cheese, 1 cup red wine, 2 tsp. salt, 2 tbsp. spaghetti, 2 tsp. butter.

Heat the fat. Slice garlic and onions and fry until golden brown. Add meat and cook for 10 minutes. Add tomatoes, tomato paste, celery, pepper, seasonings and simmer for 20 minutes or more. Fry mushrooms separately in butter. Add mushrooms, cheese and wine and simmer for 10 minutes or more. If thinning necessary add canned tomatoes, tomato juice or more wine.

Meanwhile, add salt to rapidly boiling water and cook spaghetti according to taste for 17 to 25 minutes. Serve spaghetti and sauce from separate dishes. Add to taste grated cheese, parmesan or other strong white cheese.

NOTEABLE COOKS

Two famous chefs also reveal some secrets. G. Fondu, chef at Government House, contributed "Les carottes a la Vichy," and Henri Frietag of the Chateau Laurier Hotel offers "Quillflower polonaise."

Ottawa's Mayor Charlotte Whitton provides a calorie-laden "charlotte russe" made up of heavy

cream, powered sugar, gelatine, milk, vanilla and almond extracts, sponge cake and almond macaroons.

That Body of Yours

DRUNKEN DRIVERS

I don't think that we will ever become used to the terrible stories in the newspapers of the number of deaths caused by automobile accidents over every weekend and particularly over holiday weekends. There is no doubt that many of these deaths need never have occurred—they were caused by drunken drivers.

In an editorial in the Journal of the American Medical Association, we read that the growing use in the United States of chemical tests of the blood, urine and breath for the arrest and prosecution of persons driving while under the influence of alcoholic beverages have convinced law enforcement agencies and physicians that these tests can effectively aid in protecting the innocent and convincing the guilty.

A close study was made of the court records of all cases involving charges of driving while under the influence of alcohol that appeared before the court of common pleas in New Haven, Conn., during a period of 46 months. It was found that a much higher percentage of people pleaded guilty when chemical tests are used in evidence. In the cases examined the concentration of alcohol in the blood was found to range from 0.14 to .40% which indicates a consumption of more than one-half pint of whiskey or an equivalent amount of alcoholic beverage of other types.

Another useful test is the breath-testing device. When this test was used the number of pleas of guilty rose from 23 per cent to 61 per cent. The fact that so many more people pleaded guilty shows that they realize these findings from tests are true as they correspond to what the persons themselves know they have drunk.

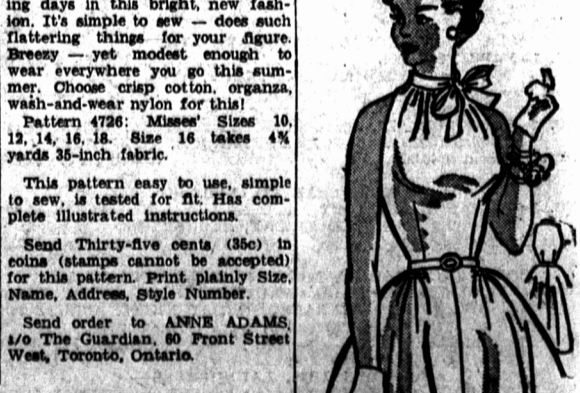
