

VOTERS' LISTS.

Lists of voters in this Province have been printed, and are being posted. Every bona fide elector should satisfy himself that his name is upon the list.

The intention of the Registration Act is clear. It is that no person shall be permitted to vote in either a Local or Dominion election unless his name is duly registered, and that no name shall appear upon the list except those of persons legally qualified to vote.

The Act provides that the lists of electors shall be subject to revision by the Judge of the County Court, at the time and place and in the manner set forth in this Act, at the instance of any voter, on the ground of votes being omitted from the lists, or from either of them, or being wrongly stated therein, or of names of persons being inserted on the lists or either of them who are not entitled to vote; and upon such revision the Assessment Roll shall not be conclusive evidence in regard to any particular, and the decision of the Judge under this Act in regard to the right of any person to vote, shall be final.

We are not certain whether a voter may have his name placed upon the list by means or through the representations of a third party. Our impression is that every voter will have to appear before the County Judge in person. At all events the Act requires that "the evidence relating to the revision of the electoral lists shall be under oath."

CITY COUNCIL.

City Council met last evening. Present—the Mayor, the Recorder, Councillors, Smith, Murphy, Hooper, Hartz, Millner, Harris and Byrne.

COUNCILLOR HOOPER, as one of the Market Committee, said he knew nothing about the leave given to Mr. LePage to erect a shed on the Market Square. He would support a motion for having all the machinery on the square removed.

His Worship said he was waiting for Councillor Harris to give an explanation relating to the erection of the shed.

THE RECORDER said it was dangerous to have the machinery in that place, as citizens passing through the square were liable to have their legs or arms broken. If such were to happen, there would be a nice bill against the city in consequence.

Moved by Councillor Hartz, that the owners of machines get notice to clear their machines from the Square by Saturday night.—Carried.

On representation of Councillor Murphy the unfulfilled contract to bore in the Royalty, entered into with Messrs. Harris & Co., was referred to the Recorder for the purpose of having the agreement enforced, if necessary, at once.

COUNCILLOR BYRNE moved the following resolution:

Whereas, various circumstances as well as reports of Committees, prove there exists an absolute necessity for the services of a competent Civil Engineer for the management and improvement of the streets and squares of the City.

Be it therefore resolved that a practical Civil Engineer be appointed for the purpose of planning and superintending improvements in connection with the streets, squares, and parks of this City.

Resolved, that Mr. Patrick D. Cox, be appointed to the office of Civil Engineer, for the City of Charlottetown, at the rate of not more than \$500 per annum.

After some discussion the above resolutions passed.

COUNCILLOR MURPHY—Referring to the petition of inhabitants of the eastern part of the town for an additional Steam Fire Engine, moved the following resolution:—

Resolved, that the Fire Department be empowered to purchase a new Steam Fire Engine.

The Resolution passed. Some minor business was transacted. We have not space this morning for an extended report.

MY DEAR DR. JENKINS.—Soon after receiving your note of the 20th May, with the enclosure from Mr. Davies, I saw Sir Graham Montgomery, who communicated with his relative, Mr. James F. Montgomery. The latter agrees to leave the question to my arbitration. He is shortly going to Prince Edward Island, where he will sign any necessary agreement with the Island Government.

As I said before, I shall be glad to have the statements on both sides, the papers delivered to us, and the print of the original evidence, sent to me, and I will then make my decision.

It is possible that I shall be passing through Halifax in October, on my way to Quebec by the Intercolonial Railway—thence West, as far as San Francisco. I might, perhaps, read the papers and decide this at Halifax, but I will let you know again what my movements will be.

SUPREME COURT—TRINITY TERM.

John McLean, v. Dr. McKay. Trial now going on. This is an action brought by the plaintiff to recover damages for malpractice in setting his arm. Damages laid at \$900. For the Plaintiff, Mr. McLeod; for defendant, Mr. Peters and Mr. Longworth. It appears that on the 31st of October, McLean had his wrist fractured or broken by a powder explosion while working in a well. He procured the medical services of Dr. McKay, to have the arm restored to its former usefulness, which the Doctor failed to do. McLure, consequently, brought the action for damages. A number of the medical men of the city have been examined.

Clippings.

—The ironclad Achilles and Agincourt, and sloop of war Ruby, are ordered to join the Mediterranean squadron.

—There is a general exodus from Respt, Persia, in consequence of the plague. The deaths are reported to number 20 to 30 daily.

—Varna has been declared in a state of siege, and it has been definitely decided that the Roumanian army is to pass the Danube. Arrangements for crossing are being pushed with celebrity.

—No less than three thousand pictures are said to have been rejected from the Royal Academy this year. The unlucky artists have held a meeting to consider what they can do about it.

—Queen Victoria is very sparing of her visits in London; but it is stated that as soon as she lunched after her recent arrival in Balmoral, she and the Princess Beatrice went out and visited the cottages in the vicinity of the castle. This is all very well, but fashionable London rather resents it.

—"Cockroaches Utilized" is the title of a brief article in an exchange. It appears that in Russia the common cockroach is a popular remedy for dropsy, and is also useful in other diseases. A good many housekeepers would willingly dispose of their stock of cockroaches at a reduced price.

—Lawlessness of the irregulars caused the utmost panic in Pera. The Italian vice consul has been forcibly robbed and severely injured by Circassians. Two attempts were made to force an entrance into the English club. Some of the irregulars who were seen have been sent to the seat of war upon the representation of Mr. Layard.

—Many of the inhabitants of Mount Carmel are in a distressed condition from the results of the tornado, notwithstanding the aid which has been sent them. About one hundred families are homeless, and over one hundred persons are wounded. The pecuniary loss is not less than \$400,000—a heavy burden for a population of 2200 to bear.

MORE LIBERAL OFFERS.—John Owen, Esq., of Cambridge, Mass., who has worked so earnestly in our behalf since the great fire, writes again: "Boston publishers say that they will send books for a public library, whenever St. John is ready to receive them." Napoleon's passage of the Danube in the face of the Austrians before the battle of Wagram was still more brilliant. He concealed the materials for a floating bridge in the woods and brushwood; he sent across at 9 p. m., two battalions of infantry, who held their ground till the bridge was completed; he then threw another corps across the river; and by daylight there were 70,000 soldiers on the other side.

BRITISH WAR SHIPS IN THE MEDITERANEAN.

COLORADO BATTLES IN DUBLIN

[Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner.]

LONDON, July 11.

On Monday last, General Tergkassoff returned to Russian territory, having lost nearly all his war materials.

All accounts received, go to prove the Russian campaign in Asia a failure. Any other campaign will have to be commenced.

The British Admiralty has ordered several first-class war ships to the Mediterranean.

Numbers of the Colorado battles are found on the Dublin Docks.

THE WAR.

LONDON, July 10.

The Turks and Russians charge each other with ruthless devastations, outrages and murders in Bulgaria.

The resignation of 25 Servian deputies of the Left leaves the Skuptschina without a quorum. They were dissatisfied with the address of the House to Prince Milan.

The commander of the British fleet of Besika Bay is in Constantinople, and will have an audience with the Sultan.

The United Kingdom rifle team sail for New York August 10th.

Military preparations throughout Austria are on a larger scale than published.

The municipality of Pupig, in France, has been dissolved by Government.

It is surmised that active diplomatic efforts are making between England and Austria for joint action.

Anarchy prevails beyond contending armies—Bulgarians, Circassians, and Tartars, are murdering each other.

Col. Valentine Baker accompanies Raouf Pasha to Adrianople.

EZEROU, July 10.

It is officially announced Russian left wing has been driven across Russian frontier, and pursued by Ismail Pasha.

Deputation of citizens of Kars have visited Mukhtar Pasha.

CANADA.

MONTREAL, July 10.

The financial effort to put the New Windsor Hotel into operation is going on successfully: \$100,000 out of \$250,000 borrowed, has been paid in.

The Water Policies are being drilled in the use of their new rifles.

Extensive seizures of unauthorized weights and measures have been made by authorities of Weights and Measures department.

The new Conservative club, of this city, for French Canadians, has been duly opened with a large membership.

OTTAWA, July 10.

Numbers of persons continue to leave for Manitoba. One party of thirteen and one of ten have taken their departure this week.

Organization of Opposition for a possible election this fall, continues in various quarters, and is advised in all.
