U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, Sept. 30 - (AP) - The United States steel industry roared into the final quarter at 101.5 per cent of capacity, still far from able to keep abreast of demands for its product, Steel Magazine reports today.

The national ingot rate rose a half point last week, and mills were beginning to show wear-and-tear from prolonged high-level production, the weekly review of the metalworking industry journal says.

The shortage of iron and steel scrap continued acute and may bring a post-harvest-season drive of Second World War proportions. Sept. 1 mills averages scrap stockpiles that would last 1.4 months, compared with 1.2 months on July 1. The slight recent upturn is due mainly to a boost in receipts of auto wrecker scrap.

New York Stock Price Level Continues High

NEW YORK, Sept. 30 - (AP) - The stock market is passing the three-quarter mark of 1951 with average prices still close to a 21-year high.

Some ground was lost in listless trading last week. But the movement had no decisiveness to it. When the exchange wound up its summer closing schedule and prepared to resume the 5 1/2-day program with a Saturday session added this week, stock prices were within striking distance of the year's average high.

The 21-year high for the Associated Press 60-stock average was established at \$100.60 on Sept. 20. From a point 30 cents below that at the start of this week's dealings, it declined to \$99.50, at the close Friday, falling in four of the five sessions.

While rails, which some regard as critical indicators of the probable course of the market, drifted lower, they avoided any runaway decline. Strong support failed to concentrate behind any particular section of the market. Spurts for individual issues were the rule. One of the steadiest groups was gold mining.

Three of the five most active stocks on the exchange were railroad issues. Pennsylvania Railroad topped the list, up 1/4 at 19 1/2 New York Central was second, down 1/4 at 18 1/2, and Baltimore & Ohio fifth, off 1/4 at 21 1/2. Fedders-Quigley was third most active and RKO Pictures fourth, each up 1/4.

Given Right To Sell Gold On Free Markets

OTTAWA, Sept. 29 - (CP) - After months of negotiation, Canada today finally obtained the right to sell her gold on the world's free markets. But it appeared likely she will exercise that right only to a limited degree.

A cabinet decision on Canada's policy is expected early next week, following decision by the International Monetary Fund in Washington today to allow its 49 member countries full freedom in their external gold transactions.

Government officials, faced with the tremendous complications of free-market sales after 20 years of government supervision over exports, said two main problems had to be considered:

1. The extreme delicacy of the government's position in trying to maintain "a firm hand" over gold exports.

2. The question of returns to the producers in view of the fact that the free markets now may become "flooded" with gold, forcing prices down and making benefits to producers "dubious."

However, the government likely will allow a limited proportion of Canada's annual \$140,000,000 gold production to reach the so-called "premium or industrial" markets where bar or fabricated gold earlier this year brought as much as \$51 (U.S.) a fine ounce, compared with the fund's fixed price of \$35 (U.S.)

Main reason underlying the officials' fears of a voluminous flow of gold to the free market is the possibility that it may upset international currency stabilization and lead to price-cutting competition on gold between producing companies.

Another is the fund's own view that increasing amounts of fabricated gold are finding their way into the hands of hoarders - buying from the free markets - thus draining the gold from reserves

needed to back up currencies. Canada was prepared to abide by the fund's decision to maintain a complete ban on free gold sales, had the fund found some way of restricting the practice by South Africa - the world's top gold producer - from selling 40 per cent of her gold on the free market.

The fund's stand collapsed when Canada and Southern Rhodesia continued pressure and South Africa declined to restrict free market sales.

Still to be reviewed, too, is the government's position on the maintenance of subsidies to marginal mines which may be given the right to sell production on free markets in Paris, Bombay and Hong Kong.

These mines may be given an alternative: Either the right to sell at premium prices for continuation or subsidies. The current subsidy plan ends Dec. 31. No decision has yet been taken on renewal.

Started in 1948, the subsidies have cost the government about \$10,000,000 a year. This year, the payments may run to about \$11,000,000.
