Ontario Undefeated At End Of Fourth Round For Curling Ch'ship

VANCOUVER, March 7 (CP)—Ontario loomed tonight as the team to beat in the Canadian curling championship. With five games remaining, they boasted four straight victories and no defeats.

The Carl Amussen quartet from Kitchener, handed Nova Scotia its second defeat today by a thumping 15-5 score.

Amussen's draw game appeared perfect although his front men missed occasionally on take-out shots. But the 45-year-old skip, playing in his first championship managed to keep the house clear with a mixture of running and drawing style that never allowed a Nova Scotia rally.

At the end of four rounds, the picture took on a not-unfamiliar pattern with Ontario and Northern Ontario in the one-two slots. The Northerners, skipped by Tom Ramsay from Kirkland Lake, came up with their second victory of the day, a convincing 14-8 triumph over Prince Edward Island.

In past years it has been mainly Western Canada rinks battling it out in the final round.

Probably the most exciting game of the 10-rink round-robin championships to date was the 11-10 victory Quebec came up with in an extra-end over Alberta this afternoon.

Quebec sewed up the game with its extra-end single.

Alberta now is in a third-place tie with a 2-2 win-loss record with British Columbia, Manitoba, Nova Scotia and Quebec. They are followed by New Brunswick, Saskatchewan and Prince Edward Island, each with one victory in four starts.

Manitoba, considered a big threat before the competition started Monday, bounced back with a double triumph today after defeats in the first and second rounds. The Manitobans, skipped by Bill McTavish of Winnipeg, defeated Nova Scotia 11-9 and then handed Saskatchewan a 12-7 loss.

The Alberta-Quebec game lasted 3 1/2 hours. It ended as Manaham failed on an attempted raise on his last rock, leaving Quebec's winning stone untouched.

Quebec's Bung Cartmell was vandy on draw shots as he skipped his British Columbia rink to a 14-8 victory over New Brunswick.

Highlight of tomorrow afternoon's fifth round will be the Ontario-Northern Ontario clash. A win for Amussen would leave the Kitchener rink a virtually clear road to the title.

Other matches in the afternoon draw—first of two scheduled for the day—pit Saskatchewan against Nova Scotia, Alberta against Prince Edward Island, Quebec against New Brunswick and British Columbia against Manitoba.

Button, from Englewood, N.J., was at his brilliant best when he outclassed a top-flight, nine-man field before 7,500 fans at the Wembley Rink.

His whirlwind leaps—2 1/2 circuits, high in mid-air—had to be seen to be believed. Wickson, the Canadian champion, was simply not in the same class.

The rest of the competition was tough too, and the best Roger could do was finish eighth.

Button, a Harvard undergraduate, piled up an amazing 504.76 points out of a possible 613.2 in tonight's free skating division for his over-all total with yesterday's compulsory figures of 1,419.47 points. Perfect would be 1,537.2.

Kiraly, in second place, had a total of 1,344.92.

Hayes Allen Jenkins of Akron, O., was third with 1,277.96. Helmut Seibt, Austria, fourth with 1,274.35 and Austin Holt, San Francisco, fifth with 1,247.51; and Michael Carrington, 15-year old British star, sixth with 1,241.80.

The Summerside Crystals earned their way into the playoffs in the Island Intermediate A Hockey League at the Forum last night when they sent the Prince of Wales College Welshmen down to a 9-7 defeat in a wide-open, free scoring encounter.

The game was the second of a home-and-home, total goal series to decide the fourth place team in the playoffs, and gave the Crystals the series by an 18-13 count, having won the opening game at Summerside last Thursday by a score of 9-6. They will meet either Saint Dunstan's University or the Victorias in semi-final playoffs, depending on which team wins a sudden death game here Thursday night to decide the second and third place teams.

Playing to a very evenly contested first period that didn't come up with any too much exciting action with both teams garnering a goal each, the Crystals really opened up in the second period to outscore the Welshmen 4-2 and take a two goal edge on the game.

Fighting off a determined P. W. C. onslaught in the final session that saw the Crystals tie up the score 6-6 by the 11:58 mark, Summerside got back into the game again from then on to outshoot their rivals three goals to one for their 9-7 victory.

Layton Schurman was the big goal-setter for Crystals by notching up three while Syl Bernard and Stan Gallant came up with a brace each, with Emmet Trainor and Benny Grady tallying one apiece for the remainder of the scoring.

Jackie Brown led the scoring honors for the Welshmen with a brace to his credit, while Gus Downe, Arnold McCallum, Red Howatt, MacLeod and Maclean accounted for the rest with one each.

Although the Crystals never had the three goal advantage that they carried into the game with them very seriously threatened, they certainly had to battle every inch of the way for the game itself, particularly in the third period when P. W. C. roared back from behind a 5-3 count to deadlock the score at 6-6 midway in the frame, and except for some very smart goaltending by Sprague in the Crystals' cage, might have been forced to come from behind themselves.

But they seemed to be masters of the situation when they really had to be, and every time that P. W. C. made the going tough, seemed to be able to come through with a rally that put them out in front again.
