Brig. Reid Speaks At Reopening Of Murray Harbor Ch.

Brigadier W. W. Reid, D.S.O., Charlottetown, was the guest speaker at a very largely attended reopening service at the United Church at Murray Harbour on Sunday evening. Many complimentary remarks were heard with regard to the fine appearance of the church, following its renovation and redecoration.

The pastor, Rev. Wallace MacPherson, officiated, and thanked the congregation for the wonderful transformation that had taken place within the church and for the spirit of goodwill which was manifested therein.

Following was the order of service: Choir: "Day is Dying in the West"; Invocation: Hymn 681, "Unto the Hills Around Do I Lift Up"; Responsive reading, Psalm 24; Selections, Brooklyn Trio, consisting of Messrs. John Bears, Malcolm Munroe and Willard Bruce; Prayer; Greetings from the Presbytery of P. E. Island; Scripture reading, Psalm 122; Hymn 441, "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah"; Choir selection; Sermon, by Brig Reid; Hymn 164, "The Church's One Foundation"; Benediction.

The Brooklyn Trio, who were in fine form, sang with much feeling three selected numbers.

In introducing the guest speaker, Brigadier Reid, Rev. Mr. MacPherson said he was not only a good soldier in military circles, but — what was more, was "a good soldier for Jesus Christ."

Taking as his theme "The Glory of Service", Brigadier Reid defined religion as "the highest satisfaction of man's felt needs." He touched briefly on the tenets of various religions, emphasizing that Christianity was preeminently the religion of love, kindness, and good works. Membership in the Christian church involves the duty of individual service, both to one's fellows and to God. This opportunity for service, he pointed out, extended to children as well as adults—all can work together harmoniously in groups.

Brigadier Reid warmly complimented the congregation on creating such a beautiful setting in which to worship. "The work done in renovating shows that you are doing your part and anxious to have your church a symbol of the glory of God," he said.

After the service the guests present were invited to the home of Mrs. Richards, where an appetizing lunch was served.

The group winning these badges was under the leadership of Mr. A. C. MacKay.

Mr. Morris in his address thanked all who had in any way helped them out; namely, the women of the church for lodging and feeding them and for providing a banquet for them on Saturday evening, the leaders who had everything well mapped out, the officers of the conference, and the boys themselves who had made the conference possible.

In his address Mr. Morris said that the topic of their meeting was "Ambassadors for Christ, in the home, in the school, and in the church."

"In order to be ambassadors," said Mr. Morris, "we must first take Jesus into our lives and learn all about Him and his plan for us. Then by our words and deeds we will become ambassadors for Christ."

At the close of his address, Mr. Morris asked the boys to form a fellowship ring, after which the hymn, "Jesus As I Am" was sung.

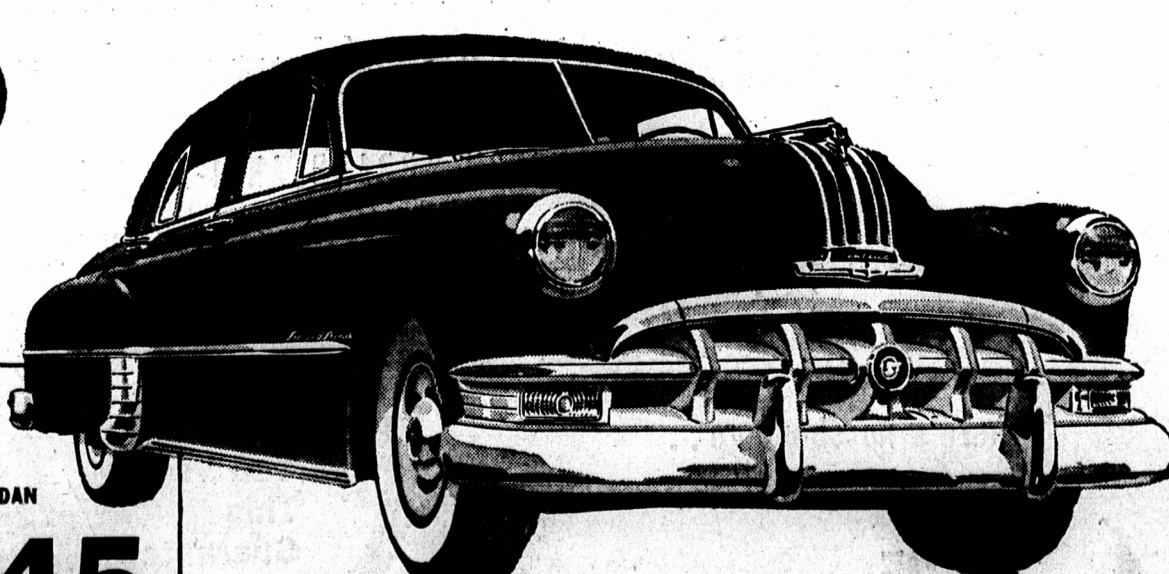
Mr. Morris presented top notch badges to the best of the four groups but the winners were only a few points ahead of the others.
