MONDAY

The highest number of points awarded in the Moncton Gladious Show last week went to Mr. W. J. Cadmore, Charlottetown, when his blooms won 49 points. He had 10 first places, 6 second places and five thirds.

Thirty local Sea Cadets returned Saturday night from a two weeks' training at Camp Ewing, a 36-acre property on scenic Lake of Two Mountains near Chazy, Que. The camp is operated during July and August and plays host to approximately 1200 Sea Cadets from all parts of Canada.

The mobile Red Cross blood donor team from Halifax arrived at Summerside last evening on its second visit to P. E. I. for 1953. Most of the week's clients were held in Prince County where the objective is 500 of the 950 donors required in the Province. This afternoon's clinic will be held at Charlottetown.

The women who are travelling together aboard two buses, represent England, Scotland, Wales, Ireland, Ceylon, Southern Rhodesia, Norway, Australia, New Zealand, Haiti, the United States and Canada. For all of them, this is their first visit to the Maritimes.

The annual meeting of the P. E. Island Medical Society opens this morning beginning with registrations at Prince of Wales College where all the general sessions will be held. Following the official opening and visits to the exhibits a luncheon will be held at the Charlottetown Hospital at which Dr. C. W. Burr, President of the Canadian Medical Association, Professor of the University of Manitoba, and Chief Surgeon of Winnipeg General Hospital will be guest speaker. Dr. J. P. Sweeney will preside.

The guest speaker will be introduced by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, who has represented this province in the Canadian Medical Association for nearly half a century and was honoured at Banff last year by being made a senior member of that distinguished organization.

GASPE, Que. (OP)—The wreck of a DC-3 passenger plane, missing since March 22, 1952, has been found in the Gaspe peninsula west of 40 miles from here, it was announced Sunday night.

A spokesman for Maritime Central Airways of Charlottetown, owners of the craft, said it is believed there were five persons aboard when the plane disappeared. They would be a pilot, co-pilot and three passengers.

A search party Sunday reported finding skeletal wreckage which was spotted last Thursday by the pilot of a charter plane operated by Trans-Gaspesian Airline of Gaspe.

R. W. Goodwin of Moncton, N.B., Maritime district air regulations superintendent for the department of transport, arrived Sunday to start an investigation.

Pilot of the wrecked plane was Capt. John MacGathie, 28, of Charlottetown and Kenora, Ont. Co-pilot was John E. Boudreau, 21, of Moncton.

The 31st annual Provincial Convention of the Catholic Women's League of Canada opened at North Rustico last evening with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament at Stella Maris Church, celebrated by Rev. Eric Robin, pastor. This was followed by a dinner meeting at 6:30 in Stella Mari Hall, presided over by the hostess president,

Mrs. M. J. Doyle, North Rustico. In the unavoidable absence of His Excellency, Bishop Boyle, grace was offered by the Provincial Director, Rev. George McCormack. The delegates and visitors were cordially welcomed by the chairman, Mrs. Doyle, and greetings were also extended by Rev. Eric Robin, parish priest, as also fraternal greetings from the Knights of Columbus by Grand Knight Walter Morrissey.

A change in banking hours in Charlottetown will give employees a long weekend to themselves as starting on September 19 all banks in the city will remain closed on Saturday mornings.

To give the public an opportunity of transacting his regular business the Friday hours will be lengthened. Effective September 18 the banks will be open Fridays from 9:30 in the morning until 4:30 in the afternoon. Announcement to the above effect was made yesterday by Mr. W. R. Cruikshank, chairman of the board of management, Charlottetown Clearing House, which represents all the chartered banks in the city.

The Acadian Teachers held their 61st annual convention at Tignish on August 27 and 28. Solemn High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Joseph LeClair assisted by Rev. J. N. Poirier as deacon and Rev. Emmanuel Richard as sub-deacon. The sermon was delivered by Rev. Charles Gallant.

The first session, held in the Parish Hall, was presided over by Mr. P. A. Arsenault. Miss Clothilda Arsenault acted as secretary. After the president's annual report, the minutes of the last annual convention held in Rustico in 1952 were read.

Marie Arsenault, 21 Abrams Village, was drowned yesterday morning about nine o'clock, two miles from shore at Cape Egmont, while fishing with his partner, Auguste Arsenault.

At the time of the accident the deceased was tending his lines from the stern of the boat, while his partner, Auguste Arsenault, was at the bow. It is assumed that the deceased lost his balance and fell overboard, while the two men were working, their backs to each other. Auguste Arsenault turned just in time to see his partner going under and was by that time too far away to reach him and render assistance. Attempts to recover the body were unsuccessful up to dark last night.

"We keep always in mind the injunction of our Code of Ethics. The greatest well-being of the sick person should be the whole study and care of the honourable physician," said Dr. A. D. Kelly of Toronto in addressing the Rotary Club at yesterday's luncheon held in the Charlottetown Hotel. Dr. Kelly, who is deputy general secretary of the Canadian Medical Society and scheduled to address the P.E. Island Medical Society in session here this week, was speaking on "Medical care security for Canadians."

Dr. Kelly referred to matters touched on in the recent Federal campaign which are designed to make our lives richer and fuller, "basic policies which sincere men of good-will of every political party have advanced as good for the country."

"It is reasonable to assume that a group of intelligent and public minded people such as the Medical Profession should be the best qualified group to advise and to formulate any new medical programme, if and when it becomes a national necessity," said Dr. C. W. Burns, President of the Canadian Medical Association in an address before the P. E. Island Medical Society following a luncheon meeting at the Charlottetown Hospital yesterday.

Each and every Governmental party have committed themselves to varying degrees of National Health Insurance," the speaker continued. "It seems to be a popular theme and therefore a popular slogan, in spite of the fabulous expenditures, and the unhappy experience of some of those countries who have adopted it. We must admit that the whole structure and programme of life has been altered in our lifetime. Standards of living are improved, but the whole fabric of human relations and the share of responsibility that each citizen is prepared to take on his own behalf, formerly expected from his fellows is rapidly decreasing," Dr. Burns said.

The two-day Teachers Convention opened yesterday morning jointly at St. Stewart and Souris with large numbers of teachers from the surrounding territories in attendance to hear some of the leading educationists of the Province. At Souris the morning meeting opened with the appointing of committees; press, resolutions and nominations. The convention president, Mrs. Sadie Coffin welcomed the teachers to the convention and reviewed the activities of the past year citing some of the notable improvements made.

Through the co-operation of the leading manufacturers of drugs and pharmaceutical requirements, an elaborate and comprehensive exhibit of their products was on display this week during the sessions of the P. E. I. Medical Association. Frequent recess periods were called when the representatives were questioned regarding their products which were examined in detail by the Doctors. Yesterday afternoon the nurses, technicians, laboratory personnel and others from the hospitals were invited to view the display as well as the city druggists.

Dr. J. H. Shaw was re-elected president of the Medical Society of P. E. Island at the final meeting of a two-day session which terminated yesterday afternoon at Prince of Wales College Auditorium.

Dr. R. G. Lea, honorary treasurer, reported an all-time high of 83 in the number of practicing physicians in the Province, with an increase of eleven during the past six months. "This favourable situation places every resident of the Island within reasonable distance of a doctor, which must be quite pleasing to all concerned," Dr. Lea said.

The provincial convention of the Catholic Women's League in session at North Rustico was resumed yesterday morning with Mass at 8 o'clock at Stella Maris Church, celebrated by Rev. Eric Robin, who also delivered a very inspiring sermon on Christian charity. Appropriate hymns were sung by the Stella Maris girls' choir.

Registration took place at 9 o'clock with 65 delegates enrolled. Meeting was called to order by the provincial president, Mrs. L. L. Noonan who occupied the chair placed before a beautiful shrine of Our Lady of Good Council, surrounded by a profusion of summer flowers and votive lights. The C. W. L. banner occupied a prominent place on the platform.

A decrease in the number of passengers and autos carried on the Northumberland Ferries run between Wood Islands and Charlottetown, and an increase in the number of trucks moved points up the greater demand on ferry space made by the necessity for freight movement on this route.

During the period from May to the end of August this year the number of passengers declined by 2,155 from the 57,341 of 1952 to the 55,186 of this season. Automobiles dropped from 14,620 to 14,601, but the number of trucks increased from 3,738 to 3,827 for an increase of 89. At the same time the attitude of people using this service is reflected in the fact that this season there have been requests for 2,255 reservations, an increase of 930 over the similar period of last year.

The ladies of St. Elizabeth's Aid Society of St. Vincent's Orphanage achieved a remarkable success yesterday afternoon in their preparation and serving of what they modestly termed a turkey supper held in the spacious new dining hall at St. Dunstan's University. More than 1200 patrons were served during the late afternoon and early evening, comfortably seated in groups of six or less at the 45 tables which permitted 315 servings at a time.

Alberton Prince County Exhibition was favored with delightful weather yesterday. While the attendance of visitors was somewhat less than in recent years, the number of exhibits in many classes was larger than for some years. Since last year the prize list has been revised to conform with recommendations of the Department of Agriculture. In many cases larger prizes were offered and there were more special prizes donated.
