HUNTER'S CORNER

Opening Day One Of Best For Great Many Seasons

The fishermen's day of days is over and will go on record as being one of the best for many seasons. The day was ideal for outdoorsmen but the trout were inclined to be finicky. A full stomach will make even a human being choosy about what he eats. The Kindergarten class would grab the bait and make a run for it, possibly with the view of seeping it out of the mouths of companions, but the bigger trout would suck the blob of worms down into their stomachs and then lie quiet. One often never knew a trout was on until the line was reeled in.

On the whole catches were good but as usual some had to work hard all day for three or four trout. It was a peach of a day to be out and one didn't begrudge the time. My partner and I breakfasted before daybreak and were on the fishing ground at half light. On the opening morning last season this pond was sealed under two feet of ice and snow. I checked it a day or so before the opening date. . . the fifteenth . . . and decided to wait a couple of weeks. On Tuesday the situation was reversed. Sun dimpled blue water greeted the eye and Red-winged black birds swayed and sang on the flag tips. Pair of black ducks cut didoes against a blue sky. Some were still in the courting stage but others indicated they had teamed up for the season at least.

Wildgeese began moving shortly after daybreak. Soon after we had our lines out a flock left the Old Home Lake and headed for a stubble field to the east. It was good to listen to their stirring notes and watch a ragged fly flying against a blue sky. So far as this columnist is concerned the morning was a blank with respect to trout. I was using a pinning rod that was slightly off kilter. . . that's as good excuse as any. . . but my partner creeled 0 nice pan fish. None were large. Ten inch trout that went 3 to a pound make for tasty eating. They were full as ticks with stomachs pounded out and drum tight.

In the afternoon and evening as all by my lonesome. The trout were slow. It required close to 6 hours to creel 16. They were in the 9 and 10 inch bracket but were rounded out and fat. They sure hit the spot when I wished up on a platter on the evening of the sixteenth.

It takes good food to give trout flavour. It's not just because they are trout. The difference between a well fed trout and one that has been on starvation rations all winter may be compared to the difference between a scavenger fed chicken and one that has been crate fattened on choice fare. One trout I opened its stomach held two black water beetles, two fresh water shrimp, two last fall's trout fry and a brownish beetle shaped creature with a flatfish, hinged all like a lobster. It had me lumpy. Others had dined on a little of everything including snails. One had eaten six fry of its own kind. They all had one thing in common. . . they were full to their throats. . .

As I said before I didn't mind the time I spent. When I got hungry and sat on a sunny bank under the leaf of a dark green spruce spruce and ate hard boiled eggs, homemade brown bread and oatmeal cookies and drank tea until I was as full as the trout. If any of you trout fishermen or hunters have a wife who knows how to put up a real outdoors lunch don't let her get away, even if she does muss up your hair at times, you have got a treasure. Once I took time out and went for a stroll in the process of which I stumbled upon a beaver dam that I didn't know was there. The Old beaver in charge smacked his tail in the water time after time. I think the first slap was a warning but the others were more or less in annoyance as he still kept up after I was hundreds of yards away. They had a sort of get going and don't come back tone.

A fishing expedition is enjoyable even if one's catch is small. There is always something that claims one's attention. The sun was a furnace glow beneath the horizon when I started my mile and a half walk to the car. From atop a spruce spire a robin filled its twilight sang. In the hush of

approaching night every note came clear as a bell. Robins are hard workers. They are the last to bed at night and among the first up in the morning. There is something about the robin's bedtime song that holds me. This

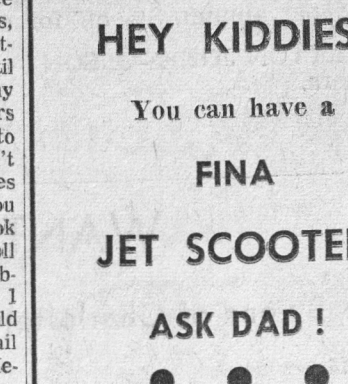

CONDITIONS The Eastern Driving Association will pay all expenses attached to promoting this event. The purse will consist of all money received from the horsemen. In the event the entrance fees and subsequent payments are less than \$6,000.00 The Eastern Driving Association will add enough to bring the purse up to the sum of \$6,000.00. In the event the entrance fees and payments equal or exceeds \$6,000.00 the track does not add to the purse. This is to be one race for trotters and pacers and is not to be considered separate races for each gait.

There will be at least three dashes with 10% of purse set aside for the winner and the balance of purse divided in three equal parts and should there be three different dash winners they only shall go a fourth dash for the 10% set aside for the winner, positions will be drawn for each dash. All dashes at 1 mile.

Divisions of purse: 40, 22%, 17%, 12%, 7 1/2%. If only four starters: 50, 25, 15, 10%.

If more horses are declared into start than the track will accommodate in two tiers, then elimination heats will be raced in accordance with the U. S. T. A. rules governing elimination heats then in effect. All starters must be declared in by 8 p.m. three days previous to the date of race.

The Eastern Driving Association agrees not to hold this race before August 1, 1960. All eligible will be notified of the exact date and place of the race by January 1, 1960.

In the event it is impossible to race this race for any reason whatsoever, all money received will be divided equally among the horses eligible at the time the race is declared off.

SUBSTITUTIONS: On Nov. 1, 1959 when fourth payment is made an original nominator may substitute a colt or filly, without extra charge. Upon fifth payment, May 1, 1960, name, sex and color of colt or filly must be given.

Don't forget: Your mare must be in Canada at the time the foal is dropped. Your foal must be foaled in Canada.
