#### CELEBRATION AT RUSTICO.

##### Impressive Service in the Church Followed by a Picnic.

The sixtieth anniversary of the building of St. Augustine's Roman Catholic Church at Rustico was celebrated yesterday. The celebration was participated in by upwards of a thousand people, including a goodly number from Charlottetown.

At half past nine Solemn High Mass was celebrated in the Chapel. Archbishop O'Brien, of Halifax, was celebrant; Rev F X Gallant, Bloomfield, Arch Priest; Rev D B Reid, Kelly's Cross, Deacon of Honor; Rev J McNally, Ottawa, Sub-Deacon of Honor; Rev P C Gauthier, of St Dunstan's College, Deacon of Office; Rev P D McGugan, Surgeon, Sub-Deacon of Office; Rev I R A Macdonald, of the Cathedral staff, First Master of Ceremonies; Rev J J Macdonald, Kinkora, Second Master of Ceremonies; Mgr Gillis, Indian River, and Dr Murphy, Halifax, Assistants.

His Lordship Bishop Macdonald, with Rev. J. A. McDonald, Hope River, and Rev. D. J. G. Macdonald, Summerside, were seated within the sanctuary.

The choir, under the direction of Mr. Joseph Ducette, rendered the second tone Mass (harmonised) in a splendid manner. At the Offertory, Dr. Gallant, of Rustico, sang Millard's Ave Marie in splendid voice. Mr. Blanchard, organist of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, presided at the organ with much acceptance.

After the first Gospel Rev. F. X. Gallant preached an able and eloquent sermon in French, his text being "Christ also loved the church and delivered Himself up for it... That He might present it to Himself, a glorious church not having spot or wrinkle or any such thing, but that it should be holy and without blemish." The reverent gentleman's discourse made a deep impression.

After the second Gospel Rev. P. D. McGugan ascended the pulpit and delivered an eloquent and impressive sermon in English. His text was, "For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world, and this is the victory that overcometh the world—our faith."

The church was thronged and many could not obtain admission.

After the service in the church a very enjoyable picnic was held on the grounds in the vicinity, the pleasure of which was materially enhanced by the excellent music rendered by the Rustico band.

##### IMPORTANT. — It is important that drivers who intend driving at the autumn races of the Charlottetown Driving Park on the 6th and 7th September, should see that they have complied with the new rule of the National Trotting Association, viz:—"No rider or driver should be allowed to compete on the grounds of member until he shall have obtained license from the Secretary of the National Trotting Association. Such license must be applied for annually. Each applicant must give the full name and address of the applicant, witnessed by an officer of the Association, or the postmaster at the place where he resides, and be accompanied by two photographs of applicant." The above rule must be complied with before a driver can start his horse. All information in the matter will be given by the Secretary of the Charlottetown Driving Park, C R Smallwood. This license will be given free to all applicants.
