BRITISH TROOPS STILL ADVANCING THE ADVANCE GUARD NEARING KROONSTADT.

Buller is to Make an Important Move Very Soon.

The News from Mafeking is Gloomy—Many Deaths Among Women and Children—Four Canadians Missing.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

PLOT UNCONFIRMED.

LONDON, May 9.—The Parliamentary Secretary for the War Office states that the War Office has no information tending to confirm the reports of an alleged plot to assassinate Lord Roberts.

FOUR CANADIANS MISSING.

LONDON May 9.—It has been reported to the War Office that Private W. Cooper, 62nd St. John Fusiliers, Private N. McIntosh, Royal Canadian Artillery, of "F" Co., Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry, Private George Keswick, 73rd Northumberland Battalion, "G" Co., New Brunswick, and Private S. Teeler, Second Regiment Royal Canadian Artillery, of "H" Co., Nova Scotia, have been missing from Bloemfontein since April 30.

BULLER TO MOVE SHORTLY.

CAPE TOWN, May 9.—An important movement by Buller's army in Natal is expected within the next four days. Buller is rapidly completing his transport arrangements.

FREE STATERS MAY SURRENDER.

LORENZO MARQUES, May 9.—It is reported that when Kroonstadt falls the seat of the Free State government will be transferred to Heillroa.

The Free State commandoes, it is stated, are acting independently of the Transvaalers and may surrender at any moment.

BRITISH STILL ADVANCING.

LONDON, May 9, 4.10 a. m.—Four thousand British cavalry watered their horses at Zand River on Monday, twenty-five miles beyond Smalldiel where Lord Roberts continues to date his despatches.

Scouts who have been searching the country for miles along the stream have found no Boers south of the River.

The enemy is laagered in unknown forces on the north bank.

Thus the British advance guard is within forty-five miles of Kroonstadt.

WHAT THE CORRESPONDENTS SAY.

LONDON, May 9.—The correspondents at headquarters are now wiring freely concerning the incidents connected with the occupation of Smalldiel.

Some surprise is expressed at the ease with which the Boers escape with their transports before the very eyes of the British. For instance, when the British entered Smalldiel the Boer ox wagons coolly outspanned only five miles away as if in contempt of the ability of the British to overtake them.

Lord Roberts is described as rightly unwilling to sacrifice his horses for the sake of a comparatively minor advantage. Nevertheless the waste of horse flesh in spite of all precaution is enormous.

MAFEKING'S HARDSHIPS.

LONDON, May 9.—The tidings from Mafeking are gloomier than ever. Every body there has an empty stomach and pinched face.

The natives are no longer given even porridge and the whites now have nothing but a quart of that substance and one pound of horse-sausage daily.

Everything else eatable has gone. Insufficient food, wet trenches and cold nights, are deadly to the health of the garrison.

The Mafeking correspondent of the Times, who also emphasises the extreme gravity of the situation, says:—

"It is impossible to ignore the fatal significance of Colonel Baden Powell's reference to the hardships endured by the women and children among whom many deaths have already occurred.

"The commissariat is holding a certain stock of food stuffs in reserve for use in direct extremity.
