A Fatal Railway Accident.

St. Paul, Oct. 5. Five men were killed and forty injured by a railway accident near here. Several cars became disconnected from a train going up a heavy grade, and running back with terrific force, dashed into another train coming up in the rear with two hundred people in the sleeping cars. The night was pitch dark and the scene was terrible.

Reported Seizure of Herat by the English.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 5. Despatches to the Novo Remgo from Askbad, says the English have taken possession of Herat and ordered the inhabitants to quit the town immediately. The inhabitants, angered by the action of the English, have thrown up earthworks opposite the citadel. The English are being strongly reinforced.

Albanians Defeated and Leaders Hanged.

Constantinople, Oct. 5. Veizel Pasha telegraphs that he has completely defeated the Albanians, and that he has captured and promptly hanged the most notable of their leaders. It is believed that the Sultan is becoming demoted.

Russians in Bulgaria.

London, Oct. 5. Six thousand Russians have entered Bulgaria. This number represents the aggregate of isolated volunteers who have arrived so far in private capacity, such as commercial travellers, clergymen, etc. Roumelia is pushing forward rapidly all work on the frontier defences.

Exploring Greenland.

London, Oct. 5. The Danish Expedition in the east of Greenland, after an absence of two years, has returned to Copenhagen. The expedition has made special charts of a hitherto unknown coast, reaching 66.08 north latitude.

Getting Ready to Fight.

Constantinople, Oct. 5. The Porte is hurrying troops from the Maritime Provinces of Asia to Salonica. Two thousand men left Smyrna to-day. The Porte has obtained £100,000 from the banks for war purposes.

Armed Intervention by Russia.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 5. M. DeGiers, Russian Foreign Minister, demands that the powers assent to armed intervention by Russia, if the Servians enter Macedonia.

Nihilistic Sensation.

Warsaw, Oct. 5. A great sensation occurred here yesterday, over the arrest of forty Nihilists, including several college professors, for conspiracy to murder the Czar.

Athletic.

New York, Oct. 5. W. J. M. Barry, of Queen's College, Cork, threw a sixteen pound hammer one hundred and fourteen feet, beating all previous professional records.

Browned while Drunk.

Halifax, Oct. 5. James Hayes, aged nineteen years, the only support of a widowed mother, was drowned on Saturday night while drunk.

Smallpox in Sydney.

Sydney, C. B., Oct. 5. The bark Scotia, from Montreal for Buenos Ayres, with lumber, has put into this port with smallpox on board.

Fighting Between Servians and Bulgarians.

Vienna, Oct. 5. Fighting between the Servians and Bulgarians took place along the western frontier yesterday.

Greece Borrowing for War Purposes.

Athens, Oct. 5. The Government has obtained an advance of £500,000 from the National Bank for war purposes.

500 Villages Destroyed.

London, Oct. 5. Advice from Fala Point, India, say recent cyclones have destroyed five hundred villages.

Germans Tendering Services.

London, Oct. 5. German officers are offering their services to Prince Alexander of Bulgaria.

The French General Elections.

Paris, Oct. 5. The French general elections on Saturday resulted in a Republican victory.

FIFTY-FOUR THOUSAND FEET RESERVED FOR CANADA.

FIRST ROYAL EXHIBITION COMMISSION SINCE 1862.

THE COLONIAL AND INDIAN EXHIBITION to be held in LONDON, England, commencing MAY 1st, 1886, is intended to be on a scale of great magnitude, having for object to mark an epoch in the relations of all the parts of the British Empire with each other.

All Canadians of all parties and classes are invited to come forward and vie with each other in endeavoring on this great occasion to put Canada in her true place as the premier colony of the British Empire, and to establish her proper position before the world.

Every farmer, every producer, and every manufacturer, has interest in assisting, it having been already demonstrated that extension of trade always follows such efforts.
