Summer School Planned To Run From July 4 - Aug. 13

It has been announced that the annual summer school, operated jointly by the Department of Education and Prince of Wales College, will be held this year from July 4-August 13. Courses will be offered in both academic and professional subjects by an experienced and capable staff.

The offerings at the university level include English 1, History 2 (Canadian), Biology 1, French 1, French 2, Mathematics 1, and Psychology 1. High school courses will be provided in English and in other subjects if there is a sufficient demand for such courses. Persons interested in Grade XII courses should make their wishes known immediately so that the necessary instructional staff can be procured.

For the first time, a course in Natural Science will be offered. The lectures and field trips associated with this program will be provided by Prof. T.M. Lethian and students will have an opportunity to become well acquainted with native flora and fauna.

The professional work for teachers will centre largely around the course offered by Willis Hall of the Department of Education, Halifax, on the teaching of mathematics from kindergarten level through to grade eight.

The summer school in Music, normally conducted by Mt. Allison University in Sackville, will be held this year in Charlottetown in conjunction with the Prince of Wales College Summer School. This program is directed towards general classroom teachers and those who wish to become specialists in teaching music in the schools.

Through the joint efforts of the Drama Division of the Department of Education, the Confederation Centre, and Prince of Wales College, the Atlantic Summer School of the Arts will be conducted here. A variety of courses in the dramatic arts will be presented. Included in this program is a course in Creative Writing by the well-known author, poet, and lecturer, Dr. Earle Birney.

Schurman Firm Given Contract For Sewer Lines In Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — At a meeting of the Georgetown Town Council Monday night, the tender of Schurman Construction Limited was accepted for the installing of six parcels of sewer lines in the Town of Georgetown. The amount of the tender was \$61,017.45. The only other tender submitted was by Douglas Bros and Jones Inc. and was in the amount of \$68,872.20.

The town will purchase the necessary pipe, culverts and tees for the job. This is estimated to cost an additional \$17,056.42. Laurie A. Coles and Associates were engaged some time ago to do a survey and draw specifications for a sanitary sewage collection system for the town. It will include six parcels and will serve approximately 40 to 70 per cent of the town's area.

To complete the job 11,365 feet of 8-inch concrete pipe; 1,300 feet of 10-inch concrete pipe and 5,501 feet of 6-inch no-corrode pipe will be necessary. There will be 300 feet of 18-inch culvert needed and 122 tees, size 8 inches, 8 inches.

The areas to be served will be Weeks Crescent, south to the present lift station; Kent Street from North Street south to the corner of Kent and Grafton and thence east along Crafon to the center of the block and cutting through vacant lots to the manhole on Richmond Street; from the center of the block opposite the bank on Richmond Street, west along Richmond Street to the lift station; a line runs the length of Water Street and also one from North Street south along Victoria to the corner of Richmond and a short line from an area proposed as a trailer park at the east end of the block formed by Richmond and Grafton Streets, on East Street.
