DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

THE BUDGET

OTTAWA, May 12.

House met at 3 o'clock.

After routine business,—

Sir Charles Tupper rose to make his budget speech and was loudly applauded.

As head of the finance department he would not go deeply into the history of Canadian commercial policy further than to refer to some matters.

He and the men with whom he was associated had vainly sought to induce the Ministry which preceded this to change their tariff policy to bring it into line with the requirements of the country.

After a few opening remarks Sir Charles continued as follows:—

"With regard to the receipts and expenditure for the year ending 30th June, 1886, the late Finance Minister last year estimated that the total receipts on account of consolidated fund would amount to \$33,550,000.

The public accounts show the actual amount received was \$37,177,040.39, showing that the late finance minister's estimates were almost literally verified.

His calculation of the customs yield was realized within \$15,000, but the main difference arose from the receipts from excise which didn't come up to expectations.

It must be realized, however, that all through that year Canada suffered particularly from other causes in addition to the ordinary depression of trade felt all over the world.

The effects of the rebellion were severely felt as well as the smallpox epidemic in Montreal.

On the other hand, the estimated total expenditure was increased. The difference may be said to be made up by the charges for suppression of the rebellion in the Northwest which were estimated at \$2,300,000, whereas the actual expenditure on this head was \$3,177,200, and in addition there was an increased charge on account of mounted police of \$1,029,569, as against an estimate of \$832,241.

The Fire Bug at Work.

A DASTARDLY attempt was made at an early hour yesterday morning to set fire to the warehouse of Mr. Perry, at Tignish.

A pane of glass was broken, and a burning roll of cotton waste thrown through. The roll fell upon a barrel of flour, and was slowly burning when the blaze was seen by one of the cleaners in the roundhouse, who gave the alarm.

The fire was speedily extinguished. Near the barrel upon which the burning waste fell, were a cask of kerosene and several rolls of tar-paper. Had the flames communicated to these, as was evidently intended, there would have been a serious conflagration for us to chronicle.

This, it is said, is not the first time the cleaner in question has been the means of preventing the successful carrying out of the designs of the fire bug.

The identity of the fiend whose nefarious design was thus happily frustrated, is suspected, and it is hoped that for the safety of the people, if for no other reason, the strong arm of the law will soon have him within its grasp.

Mr. Perry, it will be remembered, has already suffered serious loss from fire, and can, therefore, ill afford to be made the object of the evil designs of any one.

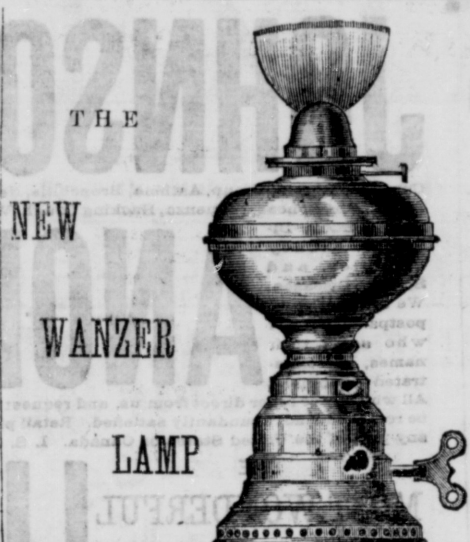
