

George Bayer Leads In Canadian Open Golf Tour.

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP) — Big George Bayer of San Francisco shot a rousing 64 Friday, equalling the Westmount golf course record of only a few hours, to take over the lead after three rounds of the Canadian open golf tournament with a 54-hole score of 202.

The betting Bayer's 64 was seven under par and tied the course record set earlier by tiny Bob Toski of Miami.

At 202 Bayer was 11 strokes under par for the distance. Bill Casper, Jr., of Bonita, Calif., was closest to Bayer with 68 for 205.

Doug Ford of Mahopac, N.Y., one of three tied leaders at the halfway mark Thursday shot 70 for 206. Joe Conrad of San Antonio, Texas, fired 68 for 207.

Grouped at 208 were Gerry Kesselring, Kitchener pro now playing out of Toronto; Henry Ransom of St. Andrews, Ill., a co-leader Thursday; Fred Hawkins of El Paso, Texas; Pat Schwab of Dayton, Ohio; Bo Winingar of Odessa, Frank Siranahan of Toledo and Don Fairchild of Casey, Ind.

Next lowest Canadian to Kesselring was Johnny Henrick of Ottawa whose 70 gave him 209, bracketed with Ken Venturi of San Francisco who had a third round 66.

Bayer, six-foot five 240-pounder who has never won a tournament on the pro circuit, blistered each nine in 32, against Westmount's par 35-36. He racked up four of his eight birdies on the front nine and missed par only at the third. He had eight one-putt greens.

He hit a spectacular in the head with his drive at the par four third and took a five.

Bayer hit the green seven feet from the pin at the short second and sank his putt. At the 567-yard par five fourth he reached the green with his driver and a No. 1 iron and was down in two putts. He one-putted the seventh and eighth for two more birdies.

He also one-putted the 10th and 11th and went par to the 15th where he sank a 15-foot birdie. His approach at the 18th left him six feet from the cup and he sank the putt.

Bayer said he feels he has a great chance to score his first win

"If I get some more luck."

The 36-hole leaders—Ford, Ransom and Ed Oliver of Canton, Mass. — couldn't keep pace with Bayer, who used only 10 of his 14 clubs on his sizzling round and had his most valuable club was his wedge.

Ford took two 35s for 70 Friday, one under par, and the 46-year-old Ransom lost his precision play and slipped off to a 72.

Oliver got around the turn in par 35 but ran into trouble at the par-five 12th where he took a seven and finished his round with 74.

Moe Norman of Kitchener, immature young speed demon about the course, had his troubles Friday and had to settle for 72, putting him in the 210 bracket. At the long 13th, where he chipped up eight feet from the pin, Moe three-putted.

Johnny Henrick has been one of the real surprises among the Canadian pros. Little Johnny has shot rounds of 72-67-70 for his 209, and at that figure is four strokes under par for 54 holes.

Gerry Kesselring, back on a course familiar to him since he started to learn the game, put together nines of 33-36 for his second straight 69. He had 70 on his first round.

Stan Leonard of Lachute, Que., a regular on the tour, shot a 68, putting him at 211 with seven American pros.

When the field finished Friday there were 29 players under par 213 for 54 holes. The field will be cut today to 60 lows and ties. The cut-off figure was 218, plus five amateurs.

Nick Westlock, Windsor, Ont., amateur paying out of Royal Oak, Mich., holds the low-amateur status after three rounds. Nick shot 70 to give him 213. Bill Thornton, Tequesta, Fla., amateur who was tied for the honors after 36 holes, withdrew Friday.

Bob Toski's 64 early in the day was made up of five birdies on the front nine and two more on the home stretch. He was never over par and the 64 cut one stroke off the 65 shot Thursday by Gay Brewer of Cincinnati, which then became a competitive record by one stroke.

Toski's big effort lifted him to even par 213. Brewer Friday shot a 73 and joined the 210 bracket.

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (AP)—Gino Cimoli lined a 3-0 pitch for a two-run triple that broke up a 1-1 tie in the eighth inning Friday night as Brooklyn Dodgers took fourth place from Cincinnati in the National League race with a 3-1 victory over the Redlegs, who now have lost seven in a row.
