

the effort to plague the old partisans by facing them on the record for or against "the people," as they term it.

Tariff legislation will probably be given a rest until after the Presidential election; and so will railroad legislation, except possibly, to extend the time of constructing the Northern Pacific R. R. All the schemes for the Southern Pacific R. R. seems to be indefinitely postponed. Something will probably be done, as I have before intimated, for the formation of steamship connection and the opening of new markets for American produce in South America.

Vague rumors are afloat as to the changes to be made in the House rules, so as to promote mixed legislation. It must be confessed that much needful legislation is now cramped or killed by the circumscription of the rules. But it is questionable whether that isn't compensated for by the prevention of much mischievous legislation by the same means. The Committee on Rules have agreed to report in favor of changes; but what they are is a profound secret as yet.

These are chief points that as yet appear in the future of Congress. The bills to be presented are numberless and nameless, as heretofore, but do not forget that the great importance of the coming season is that it will develop ideas and candidates for the Presidential campaign. KNOX.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, Oct. 3.

Dr. Anderson, dentist, was found dead in his office this morning.

While some workmen were excavating an embankment at the Western Counties Railway Station, at Yarmouth, to-day, a large body of earth buried Adolphus Golden, who died shortly after being taken out, and George Hemeon, who had a leg broken and was seriously injured.

The Local Government have filled the vacant position in the Normal School staff by appointing J. B. Hall to the English chair and Frank H. Eaton to that of mathematics.

During a race to-day between the "Belle-ropien's cutter and Capt. Walsh's, of the cable steamer, "Minia Yacht," the latter was struck by a squall when off Birch Cove and upset and sank. Capt. Walsh and companions were rescued by a steam launch, in an exhausted condition.

The Exhibition was formally closed this afternoon.

OTTAWA, Oct. 3.

The roof of the Parliament Building, Ottawa, caught fire yesterday morning, from the upsetting of a charcoal brazier, used by a tinsmith in repairing the roof. The Commons Chamber was flooded by water. Total damage estimated at \$700.

The Governor General, Major DeWinton and Capt. Harbord, play in the Old Country eleven vs. Canadian cricket team to day.

CONDENSED DESPATCHES.

There is considerable excitement among gamblers and sporting men who bet on the recent alleged international "walk" in New York, by the discovery that the track was short 59 feet in each mile. This would make only three of the late contestants entitled to a share in the gate money.

General Hughes' brigade reached Khat-Ighilzai, on the 30th September. The Governor of that place furnished him with supplies. The tribes profess friendship for the British, but are bitter against Yakoob Khan.

A despatch dated Valparaiso, Sept. 8, says the news of the advance of the Peruvian and Bolivian armies is confirmed. It is reported that the Chilians before the evacuation of Callama sacked and burned the place. The Chilians have raided into Bolivia beyond the Conchas Blancos.

It is reported that Peru has suspended payments from the treasury and prohibited the exportation of silver.

Authentic information has been received at Simla that communication with the British troops has been cut off on both sides of Shuturgardan Pass by the tribes. Reinforcements are being sent up the Kurum Valley.

Cetawayo has arrived at Cape Town.

A Vienna despatch states that Gortschakoff will probably be succeeded by Prince Labanoff, on whom will devolve the task of reconciling Russia and Germany.

A large increase of the Russian army is proposed.

Cyrus W. Field has erected a monument to Major Andre at Tappan, New York, the scene of his execution ninety-nine years ago.

By the giving way of a stand at the County Fair Grounds, in Adrian, Michigan, on Thursday; 6 persons were killed and 44 wounded, several fatally.

The German elections are likely give Bismarck a working majority.

The Dutch Arctic Expedition has returned, after penetrating as far as Francis Joseph's Land.

A negro insurrection has broken at Santiago de Cuba, says a Havana letter letter, and they are raging war against the whites.

Reported Mutiny on Board H. M. S. "Bacchante."

Sensational rumors of disturbances and mutiny among the crew of H. M. ship "Bacchante" are in circulation. On the 17th of September the Prince of Wales with his two sons, Prince Albert Victor and Prince George, went to Portsmouth, where the "Bacchante" was lying ready for her departure. The two young Princes are naval cadets upon this ship, which was preparing for a cruise around the world. On the arrival of the Prince of Wales with his two sons, there was a fine parade of military on South Sea Common, a torchlight procession and a serenade. The next morning the two Princes, accompanied by their father and Prince Edward of Saxe-Weimar, Prince and Princess Herman of Saxe-Weimar, and Prince Louis of Battenburg, went on board the Bacchante, and were there received with the usual honors. Leaving the two young Princes on board, the Royal party left the ship, and next day she started on her cruise. At this time reports among the populace of Portsmouth and Southampton were in circulation concerning ill-feeling which existed among the crew of the vessel, and the reports received may, perhaps, be only exaggerations of these rumors.
