Archbishop Barfoot To Visit Island

While the Anglican communion and others in this Province prepare to welcome the Primate of all Canada to the capital on Thursday, it may not be generally known that Archbishop Barfoot visited Prince Edward Island at least once previously, probably four or five years ago.

As Bishop of Edmonton, his Lordship was attending meetings in Halifax, and in common with others went out on Sunday to preach in various parishes in the Diocese of Nova Scotia. New London was honored in having Archbishop Barfoot spend the day in the Parish, when he was the preacher at the regular services. He was the guest of the Rev. S. J. and Mrs. Davies, Kensington, and was the welcome and honored mealtime guest between services at a Burlington home. The impression made by his personality at that time was such that his later election to the Primate's office seemed only natural and fitting.

It might be interesting to quote from a letter written by a missionary, Miss Balderson of Palampur, in reference to the impressions made by His Grace during his visit to India. She tells us: "His charm and serenity has made a great impression on everyone. Someone said, 'He preached about the peace of heart God gives,' and added, 'He has it himself. You can see it in his face.'"

One of the small boys in a letter home said: "The biggest Bishop in Canada came to India, and he came to Palampur, and he came to our school." Unintentionally his "bigness" in another sense meant that it was difficult to find warm clothes in his size, and he must have thought longingly of heated homes. "The area was experiencing an exceptional cold spell and the great variety of snow fall at the time." "He made a great impression on everyone; he's such a great man and yet he's so humble," some one said to me.

Islanders will hope that the unseasonable weather may give way to our usual lovely June days for the visit here of the Primate. The people of the Diocese of Nova Scotia, of which P. E. Island is a part will not be especially impressed by the "bigness" of our Archbishop, for the stature of our own Bishop Rt. Rev. R. H. Waterman, is hard to equal, in every sense of the word.—Bur.

One of Three Escaped Jail Prisoners Captured

—Ensign Perry, one of the three prisoners who escaped from the Prince County Jail on June 2nd and was captured yesterday afternoon by Constables Elmer Matheson and Leo Wedge of the Summerside Police Force.

Acting on information that had been reported to police headquarters, the two constables were conducting a search of a woods on the western edge of the town limits when they found Perry, who had been asleep in the woods shortly before his arrest. About 19 years of age and smallest in size of the three escaped prisoners, he appeared tired, pale and hungry and made no attempt to escape arrest.

Two other prisoners, Arthur Cannon and Fred Peters, who escaped in the same jail break are still at large but police have expressed confidence that they will be picked up shortly. At the time of their escape all three prisoners had been awaiting trial on jail breaking charges and Cannon and Perry have also charges of breaking, entering and theft pending against them.—S.

Let's Talk It Over

The Home Economics classes of Summerside High School are completing another successful year under their capable teachers. As has been the practice in recent years, they are holding dinners, buffet luncheons, etc., in honor of the Summerside High School Board of Trustees, the Executive of the Summerside Home and School Association and the teachers of the High School. The meals are prepared by the pupils themselves, served by them with a "host" and hostess at either end of the festive board, and everything is carried out simply and in good taste, according to the dictates of Emily Post.

Invited guests invariably leave the table with a greater appreciation of what this instruction is doing for the girls of the high school, and a greater respect for the capable supervision of Mrs. MacLean, their teacher in this particular branch of the domestic science course. The girls are learning many useful "tricks" of the culinary art, and in the process of waiting on their guests, acquiring an assurance and poise which should stand them in good stead when they take their places in adult society.

Station that has accepted the objective of this size and Mr. Cooke is quite confident that the residents of Kensington and the surrounding districts can achieve this objective since they have exceeded their quota admirably on previous occasions.

Dr. E. T. Tanton Resigns From S'ide School Bd.

—At a regular meeting of the Summerside School Board held last night Dr. E. T. Tanton announced his resignation from the board after about a quarter of a century service. During those years he acted as a member of the board and was chairman of the board when the present academy was built in the 1920's.

The board moved a vote of thanks expressing its appreciation to Dr. Tanton for his years of leadership and interest in the educational life of Summerside. He has been replaced by Mr. Amos Hubley.

In reply Dr. Tanton expressed his great pleasure in working with the members of the school board and said he was glad to have been instrumental in establishing the academy which he declared, from his own experience, could save a parent at least \$800 to \$1000 by sending a child for grades eleven and twelve. He estimated that upwards of 1000 students had passed through grades eleven and twelve since its inception with a resultant savings to parents of Summerside of upwards of one million dollars.—S.

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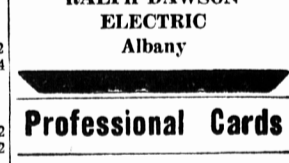
