The Curranites managed a single tally in their half of the fifth, and both teams scored once in the seventh giving the visitors a 6-3 edge.

The Abbies made it 7-3 in their half of the eighth, and the home forces started a formidable rally in that same frame. They had scored two runs and looked good to add a couple more, but Kennedy's smart tag of Cameron stopped their rally cold and the game ended 7-5.

Both Coke Grady for Curran & Briggs and Vern Handrahan for Abbies were hit freely all through the game. Grady allowed eleven hits, including Don MacLeod's home run. He struck out four and walked one. Handrahan was touched for twelve hits, whiffed nine, and walked six.

Don "Duck" MacLeod was the leading stickler of the afternoon, hitting four for five. Among his safe singles were a triple and home run. Billy Purcell hit two for four. Grant Grady took batting honors for the Curranites. He had three hits, including a double, in five

attempts. Donnie Cameron hit two for four.

Kenny MacDonald made a nice one-handed stab of Cameron's fly to centre in the fourth, and young Jack Kane made a spectacular stop of a hot roller in the ninth and held Grant Grady to a single. These two plays and Kennedy's tag were the best defensive plays of the visitors. Don MacLeod's work in short was good.

For Curran & Briggs, 'Doughie' Arsenault, rookie centre - fielder, handled six flies without a miscue, and his throw-ins were also good. Donnie Cameron went back in the hole at short to stop Kane's grounder and his long accurate heave to first nipped the young Charlottetown player in the fourth.

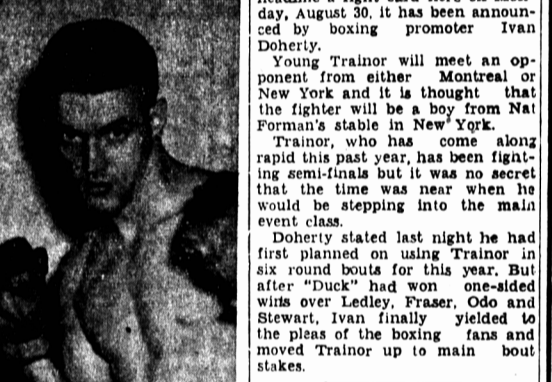
Tractor To Fight In Main Bout Here On August 30
