

# Stan Leonard Cops Trophy in Canada Cup Tourney

MELBOURNE (CP) — Canada finished third behind Australia and the United States in the final stages of the Canada Cup golf tournament Saturday, but Vancouver golfer Stan Leonard got consolation prize by taking the individual trophy.

He out-putted Australia's Peter Thomson in a sudden-death playoff to make the results a repetition of the 1954 contest in Montreal, when Australia won the cup and Leonard took the trophy.

Thomson and partner Kel Nagle pulled 563 to lead the United States by 10 strokes in the second biggest victory margin in the history of the cup. Americans Sam Snead and Cary Middlecoff, after tumbling the first three rounds, made a surprising spurt in the fourth by both hitting the Royal Melbourne's par 70.

Leonard and Al Balding of Markham, Ont., second at the start of the last day, rolled in one stroke behind the U.S. team, de-

spite a 70 by Leonard. Balding returned 77.

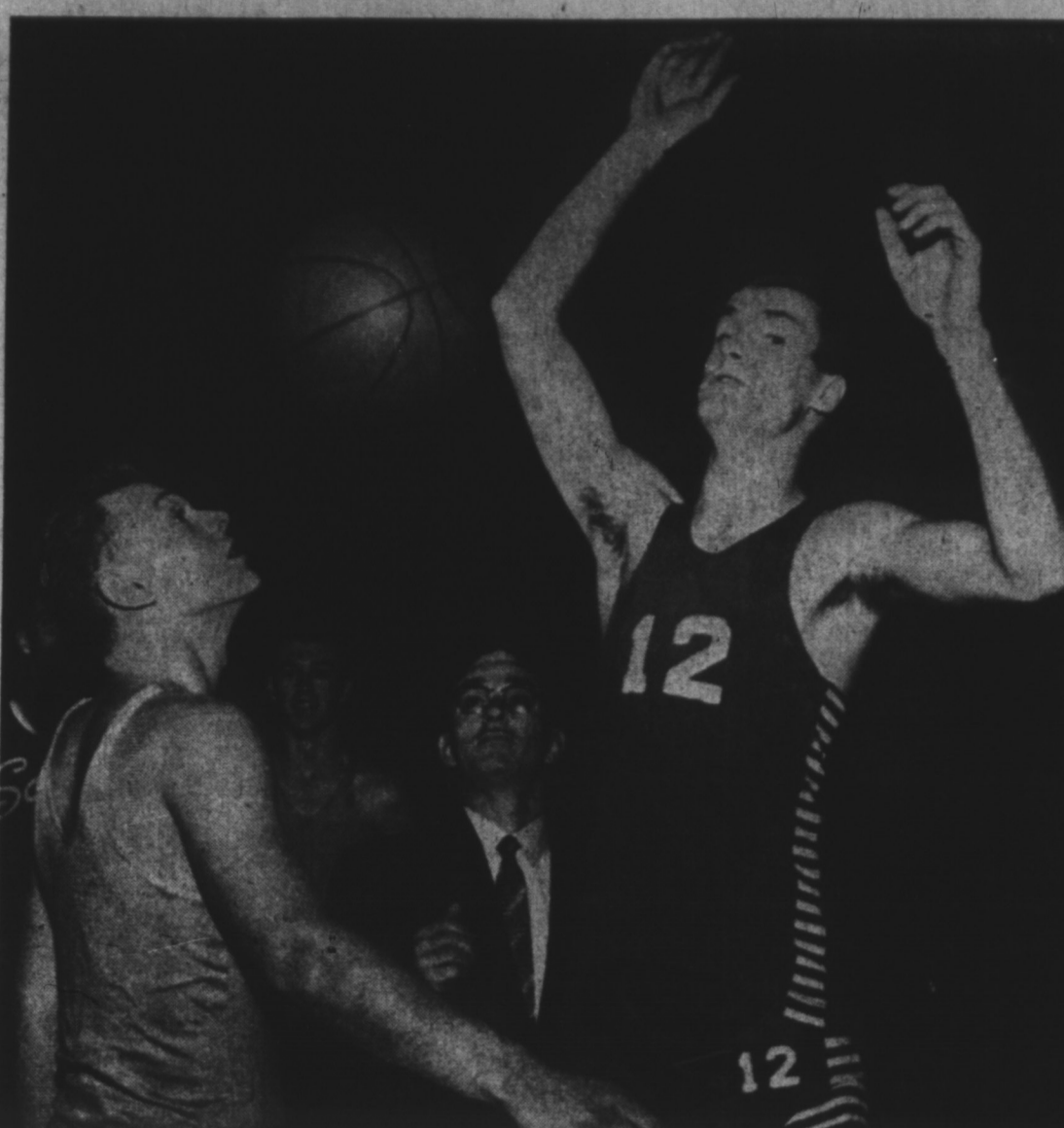
South Africa, aided by a 69 from Gary Player, pulled in fourth with 580. England followed with 588.

The playoff for the individual trophy came after Thomson, who had started one stroke ahead, tied with Leonard at 275 for the 72 holes. Thomson had three putts on two of the final nine holes, then threw away the individual title by missing a 14-foot birdie on the final green.

Both got good drives on the 24-yard sudden-death hole. Leonard put his second on the apron and played one more stroke before sinking a six-inch putt for par.

Thomson overshot by 25 yards with his second, and did the same on his return. His final nine-foot lipped the hole but stayed out.

The popular Leonard was cheered loudly by the 20,000 gallery, and he was mobbed by

HAMILTON (CP) — A third-quarter fumble by Dave Thelen that paved the way for Hamilton Tiger-Cats' third touchdown was described by Ottawa Rough Riders' coach Frank Clair as the probable turning point in Saturday's Big Four football playoff.

The touchdown, scored on a forward pass from Gerry McDougall to Gene Jones in the final minute of the quarter, gave Ticats their vital margin as they beat Ottawa 21-7 and took the two-point series 26-24.

# Tiger-Cats Capture Title; Down Rough Riders 26-24

HAMILTON (CP) — Hamilton Tiger-Cats broke up a fierce and tense scoreless struggle with three explosive third-quarter touchdowns to defeat the hard-luck Ottawa Rough Riders 21-7 Saturday and advance into the Grey Cup final for the third straight year.

The desperate Tiger-Cats fought their way into the East-West final against Winnipeg Blue Bombers in Toronto next Saturday by winning the two-game total-point series for the Big Four football championship 26-24.

Ticats from behind with a tremendous performance in the second game on the brilliant passing of quarterback Bernie Faloney and clutch pass-receiving of Tommy Grant to wipe out Ottawa's 12-point first-game lead.

The defending Eastern champions, who muffed three good scoring chances in the first half of the game, were back in the lead in the last eight minutes of the third quarter when the tenacious Ottawa passer de Lence collapsed. They scored their first two touchdowns within three minutes of each other to go ahead on the round 19-17 and added their third less than four minutes later to increase the margin to 26-17.

PUNCH MISSING  
The Rough Riders, whose attack was missing much of its usual punch with Canadian quarterback Russ Jackson unable to run on his deadly option roll-out play because of an ankle injury, fought back to close the gap to two points by striking for their only touchdown in the first two minutes of the final quarter.

But a questionable play, sent in by coach Frank Clair with still about nine minutes to play, wiped out their last good chance when it backfired.

The Riders had marched from their own 19 to the Hamilton 47 but instead of having second-string quarterback Babe Parilli kick to drive the Tiger-Cats deep into their own end, Clair called for a third-down pass. Parilli's pass, intended for end Bob Simpson, was knocked down by linebacker Jim Taylor, getting Hamilton out of a big hole.

Clair said Simpson had been getting into the clear and he thought that Parilli could hit him with a pass to bring them within range for at least a field goal attempt that would have put Riders ahead 27-26 on the round.

# SAYS BUD GRANT "It Didn't Matter Much Who Won"

WINNIPEG (CP) — "It didn't matter much who won," said coach Bud Grant of the Western champion Winnipeg Blue Bombers. "We knew we were going to be in for a tough game no matter which club came out on top."

He was commenting on Hamilton Tiger-Cats' victory Saturday over Ottawa Rough Riders in the Eastern Big Four final. Tiger-Cats won the game 21-7 and the two-game, total-point series 26-24 to advance into the Grey Cup at Toronto next Saturday against Bombers.

"Hamilton must be a good foot-

ball team," said Grant, who didn't see the game either live or on television. "They had to be good to come back off that 12-point deficit from the first game."

VETERANS PLEASED  
Most of the Bombers felt the same as their coach but some who have been in Canada for at least three seasons were "kind of glad" Hamilton won.

"This will be the sawoff game," said fullback Charlie Shepard, who played with Bombers in 1957 when they lost the Grey Cup to Hamilton 32-7 and again last year when Bombers beat Ticats 35-28. The hardrock import from North

Texas State, who was used only on punts due to injuries in 1957, was outstanding in the 1958 triumph.

Kenny Ploen, former Iowa star who was the losing quarterback two years ago, had a glint in his eyes as he remarked that "maybe I will get some revenge next Saturday."

# HORVATH PICKS UP 3 POINTS

# Habs Dump Leafs 4-1; Bruins Tie Red Wings

Montreal Canadiens, minus their leading scorer, continue to show as the class of the National Hockey League.

Saturday night they extended their undefeated string to 14 games as they handed Toronto Maple Leafs their first home ice loss of the season by a 4-1 score. Canadiens had too much scoring punch for the Leafs despite the absence of right winger Bernie Geoffrion, tops on the team with 10 goals and 10 assists. Geoffrion has a deep cut above his right ankle.

In the only other Saturday night action, a Bronco Horvath, the league-leading scorer, got his 17th goal midway through the third period to give Boston Bruins a 3-3 tie with Detroit Red Wings.

LARGEST CROWD  
The largest-crowd of the season, 14,622, were on hand for Montreal's first Saturday night appearance in Toronto since Dec. 3, 1955. They found little to cheer about except when defenceman Allan Stanley scored in the third period to cut Canadiens' lead to 2-1.

After a scoreless first period, defenceman Doug Harvey and right winger Dickie Moore put Montreal ahead 2-0 in the second. After Stanley's goal, centre Jean Beliveau put Canadiens into a 3-1 lead.

Leafs pulled goalkeeper Johnny Bower with 36 seconds to play in the game only to have left winger Don Marshall lift a high shot into the empty net 11 seconds later.

Bower, who made 27 saves, was struck on the face by a deflected puck with 15 seconds left to play and had to leave the ice for 14 stitches on the inside and outside lower lip. He also lost two bottom front teeth. Leafs played the remainder of the game without a goaltender.

Montreal netminder Jacques Plante, giving Toronto fans their first look at his celebrated face mask, played an outstanding game, blocking 26 Leaf drives. It was the 13th straight game in which he has held the opposition to two goals or less.

Horvath's goal at Boston ended Bruins' losing streak at four games. Added to his assists on Boston's other two goals, he pushed his league-leading point total to 30.

Bruins blew leads of 1-0 and 2-1 before Horvath bled them out with a shot from close in at 8:27 of the last period.

Red Wings took the lead only once when they scored twice within 58 seconds in the second period. Murray Oliver scored his first major league goal at 7:47 to tie the score at 2-2 and then Red Kelly put Detroit in front.

Boston took a 1-0 lead in the first period on Guy Gendron's goal but Gordie Howe tied it up late in the period with Wings playing a man short. Flem MacKell put Bruins in the lead again a minute later.

Richard gave the Canadiens a 1-0 lead in the second minute of play when he swept in on Chicago goalie Glenn Hall and flipped in a shot from five feet out.

Eric Nesterenko's long, screened-shot through a jam in front of Canadiens goalie Jacques Plante evaded the score early in the second frame.

Jean Beliveau gave the Canadiens the lead early in the final period and Richard topped off the night with his 10th goal of the season near the end of the game.

In the second period Pilote tangled with Maurice (Rocket) Richard and both were given two-minute penalties. In the final frame, Pilote, who started pro hockey in the Canadiens system, exchanged punches with Montreal's big Albert Langlois. For this, both were given five minutes.
