A Desperate Break for Liberty.

GALVESTON, Oct. 6. Sixty convicts, working on the Railway near this place, made a desperate break for liberty. As they rushed for the woods, amid deafening yells, the guards opened fire on them, and twenty-five were killed and wounded. The others escaped and are still at large.

The French Elections.

PARIS, Oct. 6. The latest reports from the elections, show that the Republicans have sustained heavy losses. No less than one hundred and seventy-five Conservatives were elected. Two cabinet ministers were defeated and the election of two others is doubtful. Over two hundred second ballots will be necessary.

What Home Rule Would Do.

CORK, Oct. 6. At the Wicklow Convention, Parnell said that granting Home Rule to Ireland would put a stop to outrages in Ireland, stop the talk about total separation from England, and make Irishmen loyal and props to the British Constitution.

The Eastern Difficulty.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 5. The conference recommends Serbia and Greece to disarm. Greece has called out the naval reserves. There is a marked difference of opinion existing at the Ambassadors conference.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6. Fifty representative American orators are going over to Ireland to help to elect the Parnellite candidates to the British Parliament.
