Catholic Nurses Elect Officers

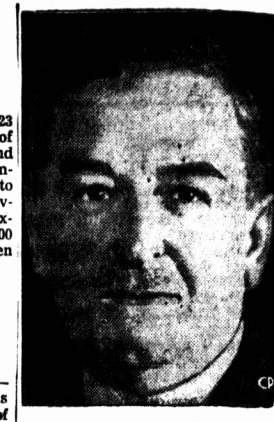

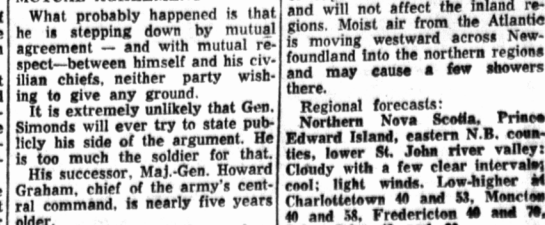
