MCA Truck Driver Prevents Accident At Ry. Crossing

Prompt action on the part of MCA truck driver Ralph Pineau of Charlottetown, yesterday evening prevented what might have been a serious train accident.

While driving to work about 5:30 p.m. Mr. Pineau on approaching the railroad crossing on Belevedere Avenue in the Experimental Farm area observed that the steel rails had been torn loose at this point. Realizing the danger to rail traffic he waited at the crossing in order to warn any train that might approach.

It was fortunate that he did so, since he was stopped only a few minutes when he observed a train approaching from the direction of St. Dunstan's College. Mr. Pineau ran down the track to meet it and succeeded in waving it a disset unit and one car.

The damage to the CNR line is said to have occurred when one of the carry-all units engaged in moving clay to the fill being built at the city end of the Hillsboro bridge hooked into the rails while negotiating the cross-

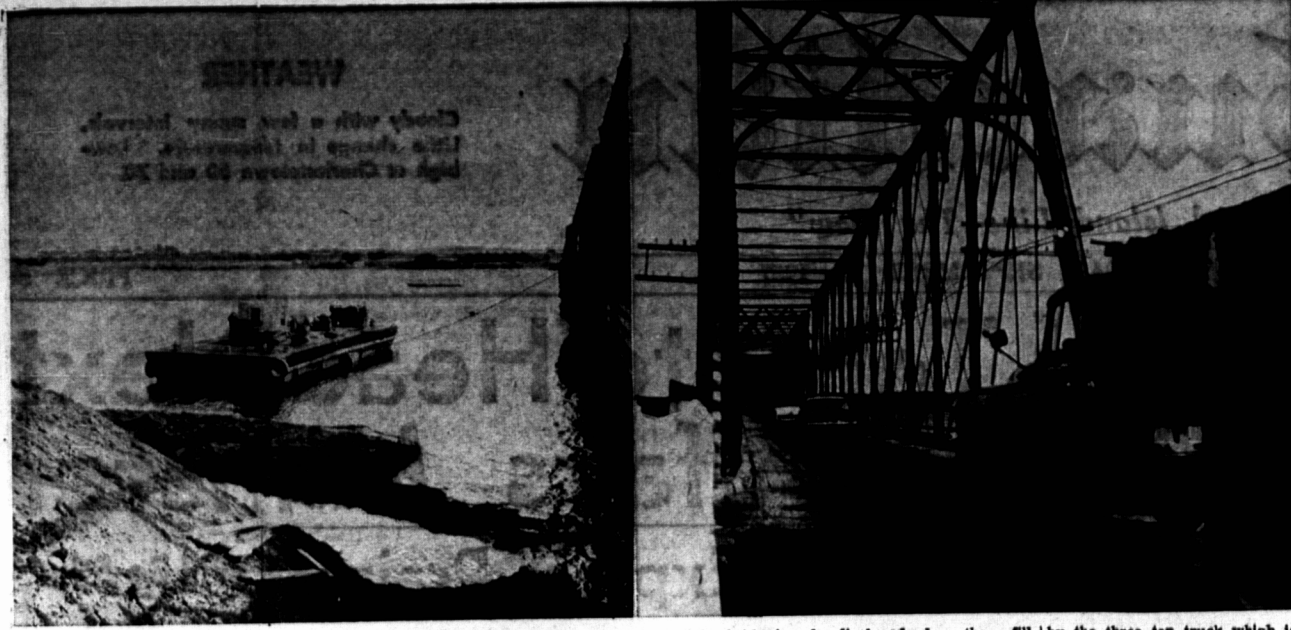
Two Young NB Sisters Killed

NEWCASTLE, N.B. (CP) — Two young sisters were killed and their two brothers and grandmother injured Wednesday night in an accident involving three trucks at Upper Millerton.

Dead are Shirley Siddall, 15, and Gianna Siddall, 8. Taken to hospital here were Floyd, 9, and six-month-old Fred, as well as their grandmother, Mrs. Frederick Siddall. The children's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Derek Siddall of Millerton.

None of the three hospital patients was reported in serious condition.

The accident happened at the top of a hill when Marcus Marderville of Derby, driving a panel truck, tried to pass a three-ton truck driven by Hazen Sullivan of Coughlan's Post Office. He collided with a half-ton truck driven by Mrs. Derek Siddall and also hit the Sullivan truck.

MAY MEET HERE IN 1958

Reports Marked Success Of Potato Conference

Next year's meeting of the National Potato Conference will probably be held in this Province. This information was disclosed yesterday by Mr. Donald A. MacDonald, manager of the P.E.I. Producer's Co-operation Assn.

Mr. MacDonald was commenting on the first meeting of the national organization which was held this year on the campus of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, August 28-31.

He said the invitation to the Conference to hold its 1958 meeting here was extended by Hon. Eugene Cullen, provincial Minister of Agriculture, who was one of the Islanders in attendance at the Guelph meeting.

The manager of the Producer's Co-operative was one of twenty Island representatives attending the conference.

Take Precautionary Measures In Bridge Construction

As a precautionary measure, construction engineers yesterday brought in a "clam shell" which will be used to remove large quantities of mud which is displaced by the fill in the Hillsboro Bridge approach and could conceivably threaten the piers of the bridge.

The mud which at this point is 21 feet deep in a semi-fluid state and the sideways pressure on the first pier, it was felt, could cause damage. The piers which consist of clusters of wooden piling encased in cement have been in place for more than a half-century.

In spite of rumors to the contrary, traffic continued across the bridge all day yesterday and construction officials said they could not foresee any interruption as a result of the work being carried out.

It is pointed out that when the approach gets beyond the first pier, the existing danger of sideways pressure will not be present since the causeway takes a decided swing and will be more than 100 feet away from the second pier and 200 feet away from the remaining piers.

It is understood that the river bottom is covered with a very thick layer of mud most of the way across. Engineers state that in certain areas the mud reaches a depth of 50 feet.

The placing of fill, which was discontinued yesterday forenoon, was resumed again in the afternoon but workmen were careful to place the fill on the east side of the approach until dredging operations clear the mud immediately in front of the structure.
