VIOLENT DEATH FAR FROM HOME.—Mr. T. E. Campbell, agent and operator on the Mexican National Railway, Bustamante, Mexico, recently forwarded a letter to His Lordship Bishop Rogers, informing him of the sudden death of Mr. Daniel J. Hurley, formerly of Chatham. Mr. H. was a carpenter in the employ of the Mexican National Construction Co. at place above named; that, on Saturday, the 18th Nov., he left there for the purpose of spending Sunday in the City of Monterey, sixty miles distant, intending to return the following Monday. At the first station, Villaloma, 44 miles on his journey, got out, and in attempting to jump aboard, missed his footing. He fell beneath the trucks of the caboose, and met death instantly, the wheels nearly severing his head from the body and breaking his legs in two places. The remains were decently and respectfully interred at Villaloma, with all the rites of the Church, two priests conducting the obsequies.—Moncton Times.
