STADIUM SHOWS PROFIT

Summerside Council Hears Finance Report

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN Members of the Town Council were told yesterday at their monthly meeting here that the current tax collection to date totals \$439,997 or 71.65 per cent of the 1966 rate roll.

A further amount of collection is expected from accounts which will be paid off before the date upon which interest becomes chargeable, the council was told and the balance left outstanding after that date will include the hard-to-collect accounts.

The report added that the outstanding tax arrears at the end of the fiscal year 1965 in the amount of \$74,631.68 have only been reduced in five months by a collection of \$9,659.50 which points up the necessity of a stronger collection system including the use of the town's small debt court.

Commenting on the financial report, the chairman of the Finance committee, Councillor Frances Perry, commended the office staff for its work, stating that there had been "very little overtime since April 1st".

little better than \$1,800. This is in excess of \$1,500 for the same period in 1965 despite the fact that the stadium showed a deficit of a little over \$1,200 for the month of May this year. Part of the reason for the deficit was attributed to the new look the stadium is receiving from the new paint job.

Councillor Milton Mellish stated that the "stadium really has a new look" and added that financially the stadium is way ahead of last year, as far as the surplus is concerned.

There was considerable discussion concerning the street parking one side of some streets only.

Councillor Herbert Schurman on the other hand, pointed out that on streets where churches are situated there is not enough space now for parking and that parking on one side of the street would simply make the problem more acute.

Mayor George Key Jr. agreed with Councillor Schurman that the problem is not the parking on both sides but people parking "incorrectly" on both sides. He felt this was a grave matter.

Councillor Schurman felt that if the police would tag improperly parked vehicles, it might do away with the problem. In answer to Councillor Schurman's comment, Councillor Morrison stated that councillor D. Alex MacDonnell plans to see the police chief on this matter.

It was decided that a resolution concerning parking on both sides of certain streets be brought in at the next monthly meeting.

POLICE REPORT Following the reading of the police report Councillor Morrison stated that the police "should walk on the speeding in town harder than they have been". The speeding here, he said, is going on and an awful lot of it is going on. He also felt that there are more cars going through red lights than are being caught.

The Council was told that there has been no decision as yet from Ottawa on the transferring of the Experimental Fur Farm from here to that city. A letter has been received from J. Angus MacLean, MP for Queens, requesting information on the farm.

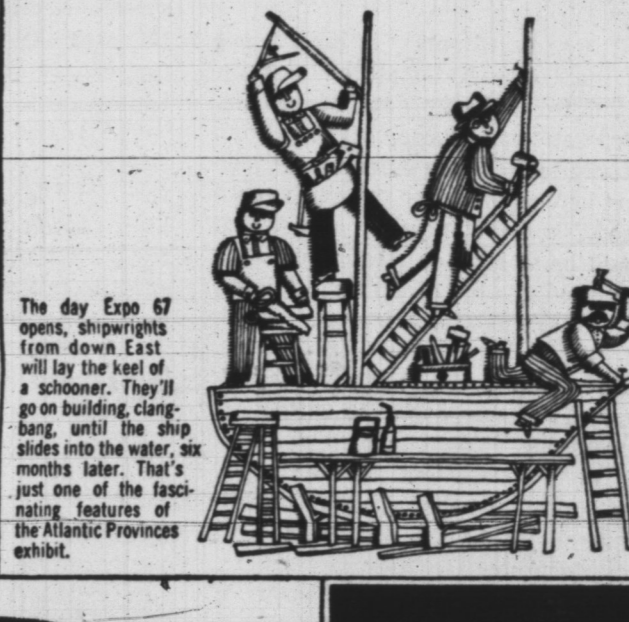
In attendance at the games will be the Lads and Lassies pipe band from Charlottetown and the Presbyterian Pipe Band from Summerside.

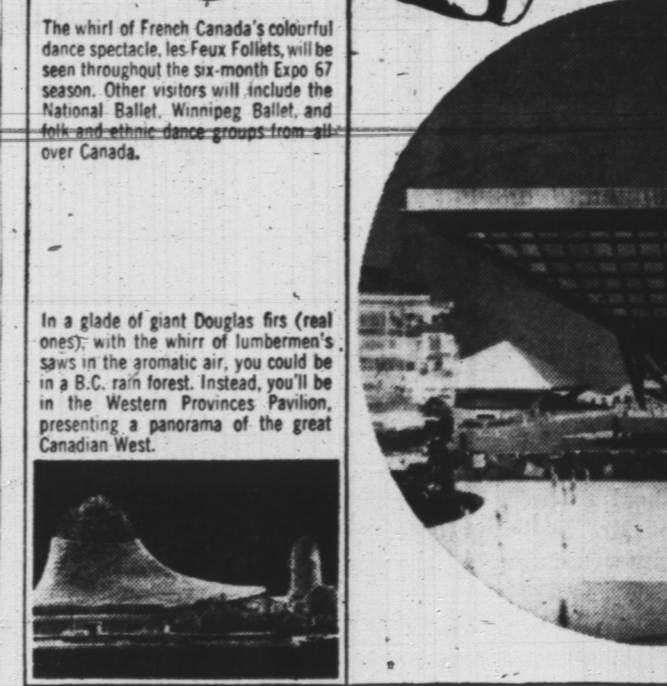

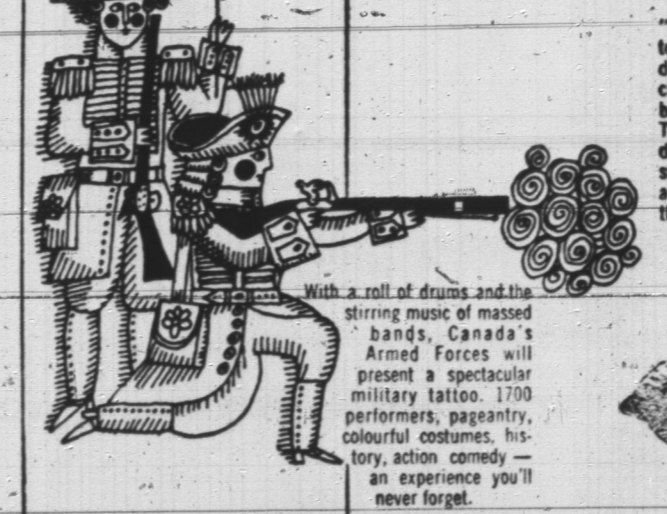

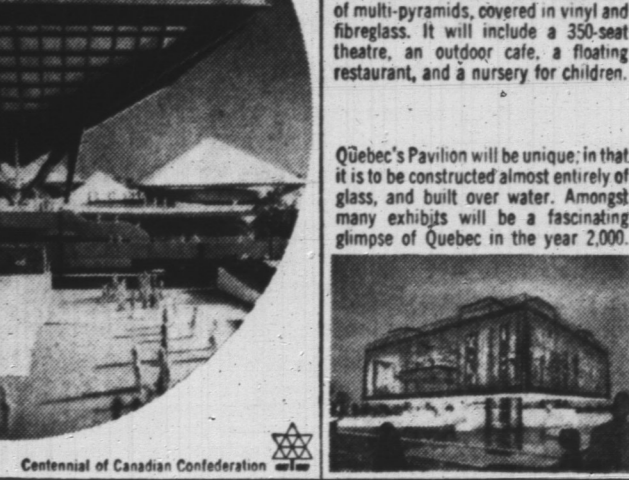
