MONTREAL (CP)—Total Canadian newsprint shipments for the month of May, 1958, amounted to 561,373 short tons, the Newsprint Association of Canada reported Wednesday. Figure for May, 1957, was 574,256 short tons. This brings the total for the first five months of this year to 2,475,115 short tons against 2,663,672 for the first five months of 1957.

Western Intervention In Lebanon Hangs In Balance

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Dag Hammarskjöld arrived here Thursday on a mission that may determine whether the Western powers intervene directly in Lebanon's rebellion.

The United Nations secretary-general was greeted by the quietest time this troubled country has had in more than a month. Rebel leaders had agreed to hold their fire while he is visiting here. But rebels continued to man trenches and roadblocks in Beirut.

Most Lebanese, after 41 days of battles, riots, strikes, bombings and shootings in the effort of political factions to overthrow President Chamoun, were looking for any solution that would bring peace.

Officially, Hammarskjöld was here to confer with the three leaders of a UN observation team ordered by the Security Council to see that arms and men from the neighboring United Arab Republic do not reach the rebels.

But in the past he often has stepped in to settle bitter quarrels.

CENTRAL PROBLEM
His central problem was that Lebanon has accused President Gamal Abdel Nasser's United Republic of aiding the rebels.

The government feels that the 50 unarmed UN observers sent here to watch the 150 miles of mountainous border are not equal to the job. Early this week it decided to ask Hammarskjöld for a sizable body of troops similar to the UN force now on guard along the Israeli-Egyptian Gaza border.

U.S. State Secretary Dulles has said American troops might be sent to Lebanon in certain conditions. The British government was reported to be ready to join in such a move.

Any decision by the Western powers to intervene apparently would depend upon how Hammarskjöld and his observers sized up the situation here, and whether such intervention was requested by UN or by Lebanon.

Both the British and American governments have declared their interest in preserving Lebanon's independence.

Hammarskjöld refused any comment on this angle upon arriving by plane at dawn from London.

After a brief rest he began his conferences with the UN observation team—Norwegian Maj.-Gen. Odd Bull, former president Galo Plaza Lasso of Ecuador and Rejesswar Dayal, former Indian ambassador to the UN.

There was speculation that after his talks here he might go on to Cairo to see Nasser.

From the rebel side the Druse tribal leader, Kamal Jumblatt, declared he would call for volunteers from all nations "including Communist countries" if there is foreign intervention on the government side.

Former premier Saeb Salam, chief rebel leader in Beirut, was not so fiery.

"What we know of Hammarskjöld's wisdom makes us hope his trip will be fruitful in the interests of peace in Lebanon and the Middle East," he said.

The crisis in this nation of 1,500,000, almost equally divided between Moslems and Christians, started over the efforts of friends of President Chamoun to have the constitution amended so he could succeed himself.

Chamoun has since declared he does not intend to seek re-election, but has spurred rebel demands that he resign before his term ends in September. His opposition comes chiefly from Moslems, among them many nationalists who support Nasser.

Quebec Growth Is Anticipated

MONTREAL (CP)— Anticipated expansion during the next 25 years of Quebec province's population and wealth will provide fruitful ground for the advertising and publishing business, a United States advertising executive said Thursday.

George C. Dibert, vice-president of the J. Walter Thompson Agency, Chicago, told a joint meeting of the Advertising and Sales Club and the Audit Bureau of Circulation that development of Quebec's natural resources is "just a hint" of what is to come.

Surveys showed Quebec has a young population with 43 per cent under 19 years old. This fact could give the province "the drive and strength that characterizes a biologically youthful population."

The average income of Quebec citizens in 1956 was \$1,180, a gain of 89 per cent in 20 years. The income would continue to increase.

Quebec's promised increase in wealth is typical of the whole of Canada, said Mr. Dibert, and the Association who passed away last Wednesday. Mr. P. C.
