Four New Seats The new Legislature will have 61 seats, four more than the old. A redistribution act, enacted in 1950 and proclaimed Saturday, gives fast-growing Edmonton seven seats instead of five, and Calgary six instead of five. A new rural constituency, Bonnyville, appears on the electoral map.

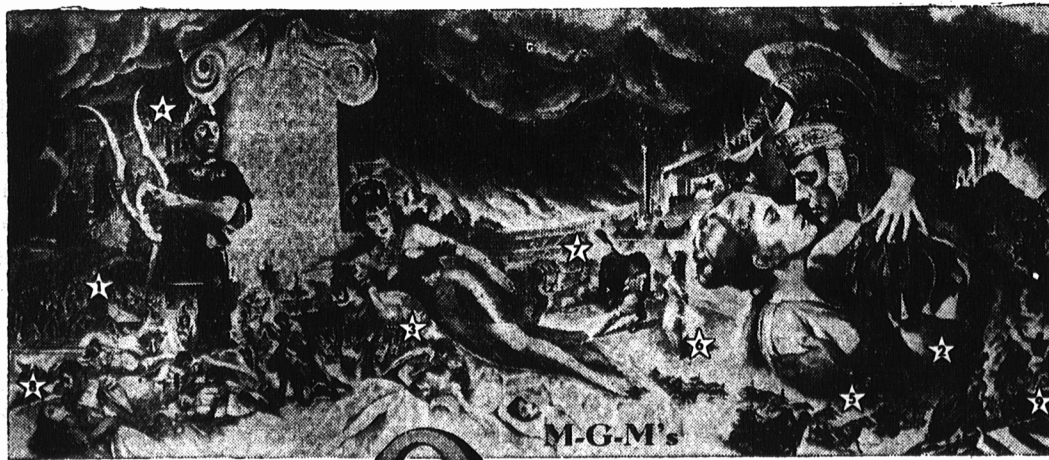
