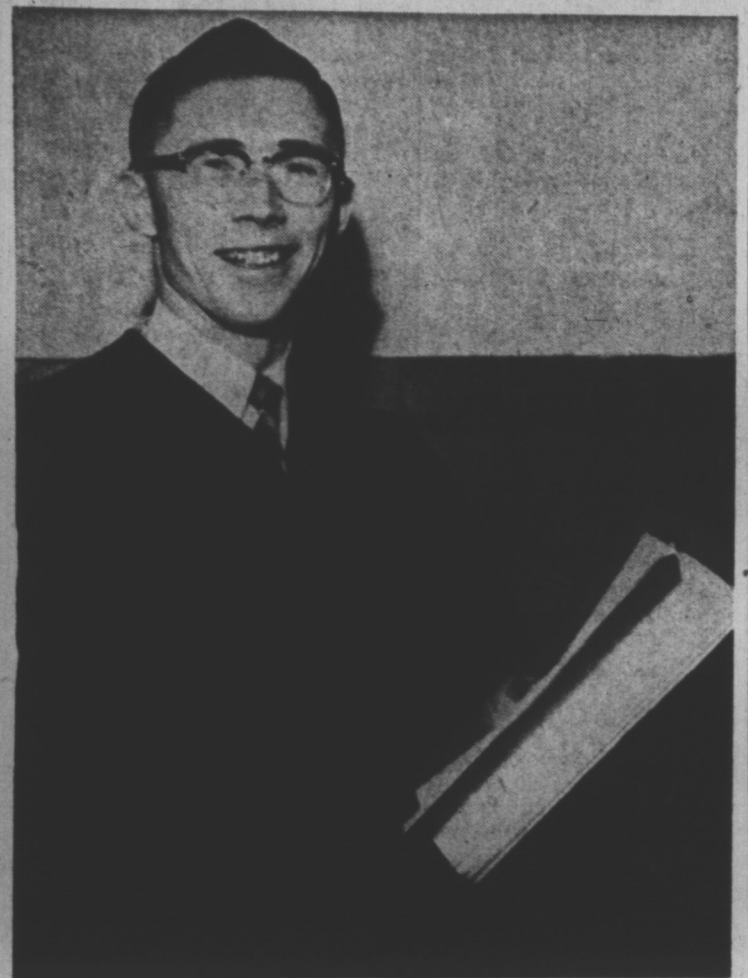


# Freedom Of Mind Priceless, PWC Graduates Are Told

## 'Stake' In Country Value Stressed

Communism would make little headway in Canada if more Canadians had a financial stake in the country, Judge J.S. DesRoches told the 14th successive class of provincial vocational school graduates at closing exercises held at Prince of Wales College auditorium yesterday afternoon.

Judge DesRoches was introduced and thanked by the Island's minister of education, Hon. Keir Clark, who presided. The various trade course certificates won by the 59 graduates of the school were presented by Prince Edward Island's Lieutenant Governor, Hon. F. Walter Hyndman. The provincial director and deputy minister of education, Malcolm MacKenzie, presented the class prizes. Principal E.D. MacPhail delivered his report on the activities of the school during the scholastic year just ended.

Linus Gallant, one of the six drafting graduates included in the class of '59, read the valedictory. **GUARD SURPLUS**

Judge DesRoches advised the graduates to "guard as a precious trust committed to your care" whatever surplus funds might in future accrue to them through their industry. "Use it," he said, "to expand your own business, or to share in the property of the enterprises of others in whom you have confidence."

From their nature humans were prone to preach one philosophy and practice another, the Island

jurist noted. "Marx would probably have starved, had it not been for the financial assistance given him by his rich friends and sometimes follower, Engels."

"Don't be a robot or a clock-watcher," he added. "Be as careful of your work as you are of your person. Think and dream of your work by day and by night. When you have become interested in this degree, work will carry you and not you the work."

Judge DesRoches urged the graduates to give their employers their best efforts, to cultivate a good community spirit, to refrain from sharp or close business practices, to develop a high sense of duty and ethical standards, and to study thoroughly all laws pertaining to business in general and their own trade in particular.

"Never do anything about which you may be ashamed later in life," he said. "Of what use is success if your fellow-man can point the finger of hate and scorn at you?"

A new diesel shop, bricklaying shop, three new commerce classrooms, an academic classroom a film room and a storeroom, would be added to the facilities of the school when the new 163 x 63 three-storey extension was completed, principal MacPhail noted.

In the consequent reorganization, the present typing room would become a drafting classroom and the main office would be moved downstairs to the second floor, he added.

## North Rustico Fisherman Fined For Short Lobster Possession

A North Rustico fisherman charged Friday afternoon in Queens County Magistrate's Court with having in his possession, 89 undersized lobsters, entered a plea of guilty, and was fined \$45 and costs or 30 days by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, QC.

The information laid by Lee Darach, a fisheries officer. An Inca resident pleading guilty to a charge of common assault was given a fine of \$10 and costs or 10 days.

A fine of \$20 and costs or 30 days was imposed upon a West Raley man convicted on a charge of having intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence. Also charged under the Temperance Act the case against a Charlottetown resident of having intoxicating liquor in his possession not purchased on his own individual permit, was dismissed by the magistrate.

Twelve persons charged under the Highway Traffic Act filled the remainder of the docket. Residents of Brackley Beach, Parkdale, Murray Harbour, Milton, and Mount Stewart were each given fines of \$5 and costs or five days.

Similar fines were imposed on three residents of Charlottetown for operating motor vehicle without a driver's licence. Two persons charged with speeding were given fines of \$10 and costs or 10 days, one was a resident of Valois P.Q. and the other was from Charlottetown.

For passing two other vehicles on an upgrade another resident of Charlottetown received a fine of \$10 and costs or 10 days. A reprimand was given to a Milton resident who appeared on the charge of operating a tractor on the highway without first having registered the vehicle for the current year.

## League Plans Electric Show At Ch'town

As part of its public service program, the Electric Service League of Prince Edward Island is now completing plans for its first Electrical Show, to be held in Charlottetown the first week in June.

Helping with the final plans was Norman Purdy of Toronto, manager of market development for the Electrical Bureau of Canada, who was in Charlottetown yesterday, meeting with the league executive.

To be staged at the Prince of Wales College, the proposed "Evening of Information for the Homeowner" will feature displays of the more modern electrical appliances, a demonstration of lighting, and films. No admission is to be charged and a number of door prizes have been contributed by league members.

With construction of new homes and remodelling of older ones now at its peak, it is felt by the league that many homeowners concerned will take advantage of the opportunity to see what is new in the way of electrical living, and to ask questions which might lead to more convenient and economical living in their own homes.

## No Comment On Causeway

Prince Edward Island officials including Premier A.W. Matheson withheld comment yesterday pending further study on the "feasibility survey" covering the causeway proposal as presented Thursday in the Commons by Works Minister Green.

According to the Commons report a 10-foot differential in tides on either side of the causeway would be one of the problems faced by builders. Both sides of the Northumberland Strait would also be faced with tide changes.

An unofficial engineering report yesterday expressed surprise with the suggestion that the water in the strait would rise 10 feet above its present level. It was pointed out that at Canso where tidal conditions are much more pronounced than in the Northumberland Strait there was no appreciable in tide levels after the causeway was built.

The word for roll call was "Mercy" and was responded to by 13 members.

The minutes were read by Mrs. Marion Hume and the financial report was presented by Chester MacLure. New business included plans for the semi-annual thank-offering service. An interesting chapter from the study book was read by Mrs. MacLure.
