The R. C. A. F. Royals emerged from a three-cornered tangle to take sole possession of first place at the Summerside Recreation Grounds last night, beating the Curran & Briggs Juniors in five innings by the score of 3 to 2. All the airforce runs came in the last inning. Hogan reached first when his roller sifted through third baseman Delaney, and took second when Grady who had retrieved the ball threw over the first baseman's head. Hogan made the hot corner on St. John's infield single; Embrett singled to right scoring Hogan. St. John pulling up at third. With the tying run on third, and nobody out, Schurman, C. & B. catcher, tried to get Embrett going to second. What was apparently meant to be a cut-off play by the short stop fizzled badly and the ball went into centre field. St. John scoring easily on the play.

MacKenzie reached first on a fielder's choice, Gillis' miscue allowing Embrett who had been trapped between second and third to get back safely to second. Hunter was on when Gillis forced MacKenzie at second. Barlow doubled scoring Embrett with the winning run. DesRoches then popped to Delaney and McCulloch struck out to end the ball game, which was called by umpire DesRoches on account of darkness.

The Curranites picked up their first run in the second. P. Schurman's sharp single to left going through Boylin for three bases. Schurman scored on Richard's double to right. The Juniors got their other tally in the fourth frame. Delaney walked, stole second, went to third on Dalton's scratch single and came home on LeFur's roller to the pitcher; both runners being safe on the play.

IN THE CORNER

Hockey officials from far corners of the Maritimes will be arriving here this week-end for the big meeting on Saturday that will change the whole hockey set-up of the seaside provinces. Attendees will be league and team representatives of the two Major Hockey circuits in the Maritimes and if the business goes through as scheduled at that meeting, Maritimers will see one Major League in operation this coming winter as a six or seven team organization.

As the result of two meetings earlier this summer, the meeting at Charlottetown on Saturday will see the final formation of an amalgamated league that has been the talk of hockey fans and officials in the past couple of years. The second meeting at Amherst on June 17th saw the actual formation of the new league but the final touch will be added here Saturday with the election of officers and the drawing up of a constitution to govern the new organization.

Six of the seven teams which will take part in the new Maritime Major Hockey League have already posted the required \$1,000 bond to secure their entry. They include Sydney and North Sydney of the Cape Breton league and Charlottetown, Halifax, Saint John and Moncton of the Big Four. It is believed that Glace Bay, which has not posted bond as yet will join forces with New Glasgow, N. S. as a single entry and will request a franchise at such at the Saturday meeting here.

In connection with the hockey meeting, the P. E. Islanders capable coach and manager Leo Lamoureux will arrive in the City from his home at Windsor, Ontario on Friday evening to be on deck with his club executive for the all-important meeting of the Maritime hockey heads. Leo, however, is not coming just to attend the meeting. According to reliable sources here, the former Montreal Canadiens playing star, who put the Islanders at the top of the Big Four League in one season and nearly clipped off the Maritime title with it, will take up permanent residence here in Charlottetown. Lamoureux will bring his 13-year-old son with him and Mrs. Lamoureux is expected to join them a little later in the summer.

There is no need to say that Leo and his family will be warmly welcomed by the hockey public of this Province. Those who met and knew Leo and his charming wife during last season were as much struck by the latter's arrival as the latter were with this fair Isle. Just what coach Lamoureux's full plans are as regards taking up residence here will not be known until he gets here, but whatever they are and however long it may be, they will be openly welcomed here. Local officials and the general sporting public will also be looking forward to Leo's arrival to hear from him first hand just what is in store for the island next winter as regards a hockey team.

Lefty McAleer went all the way to win for the Abbies in the second game, setting down the Rovers on six hits. Plus Gaudet, former Big Four hockey star, went the route for the Memramcooks in the opener although he was hit freely. Jackie Burke was the loser.

The Rovers broke a 5-5 tie in the ninth inning to win the first contest. They went to bat at the top of the ninth and put together a triple, two singles, two walks and a faders choice for four runs. Buck Whitlock's home run into centre field in the last of the ninth was the Abbies last effort.

After battling through three scoreless innings the Rovers went into a 2-1 lead in the fourth.
