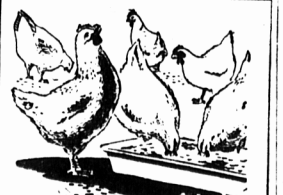

Infants at least two to three weeks prior to planting, using either Formalin — Bi-chloride of Mercury or Semisanol.

All seed stock intended for planting should now be brought out of storage and placed either outdoors or into an open shed where the air and sunlight can get at each tuber. This procedure which is now becoming common practice especially with our certified seed growers will harden and toughen the skin as well as induce the growth of a short thick sprout which will not readily break off in normal handling. Any tuber which develops spindling sprouts should be discarded entirely. Spindling or half-sprout as it is sometimes called is an indication of disease, most likely leaf-roll.

All tubers which show the symptoms of spindle tuber should also be discarded. Watch for off-type tubers with a tendency to being long or cylindrical and especially if they have numerous eyes — some of which may be bulging. These latter undoubtedly are spindle tuber diseased and must be discarded to prevent contamination through contact with cut sets or through the cutting knife.

Other Conditions Tubers showing discoloration at the stem-end should be discarded. Such discoloration may be vermicillium wilt or if in the form of net-crosis (a brownish net like formation) could possibly be an indication of leaf-roll. Tubers showing rot of any kind should be discarded. If the rot is of an unusual character the tuber should be shown to the nearest inspector who, if unable to diagnose the trouble, will submit it for microscopic determination at the Science Service Laboratory. This is very important if the province is to maintain its relative freedom from bacterial ring rot.

The size of the seed piece often determines the eventual yield. The average cut set should weigh not less than 12g, and preferably ounces. Cut thick blocky sets with plenty of flesh under the eyes. Varieties such as the Sebazo and Katahdin, which are inclined to produce misses in the field resulting in oversized tubers should be planted as closely in the row as possible, even down to six or eight inches. This close planting will produce a crop of more medium sized and B-size tubers which is definitely preferred by those growers in the South and elsewhere who purchase our seed.

Particularly in a year such as this when seed is cheap, Sebazo growers should use from 27 to 35 bushels per acre.

Full Stand Necessary A full stand of healthy plants per acre is necessary in order to make production costs make a profitable return.

Potatoes which have been greened out doors should not under any consideration be fed to live-stock. This greening contains Solanine which actually is a mild form of poison.

All of the factors mentioned above are necessary if growers expect to produce fields with a full stand of plants and relatively free from the several diseases which affect the potato crop. It has taken years of effort on the part of our growers to gain the reputation for producing the high class disease-free seed potatoes for which this Island is now famous.

This is not the time to become careless of this reputation by using inferior seed stock. Competition for markets is keener than ever and our potato trade is essential to the general economy of this province. Disease control is therefore of first importance in the production of a high class product.
