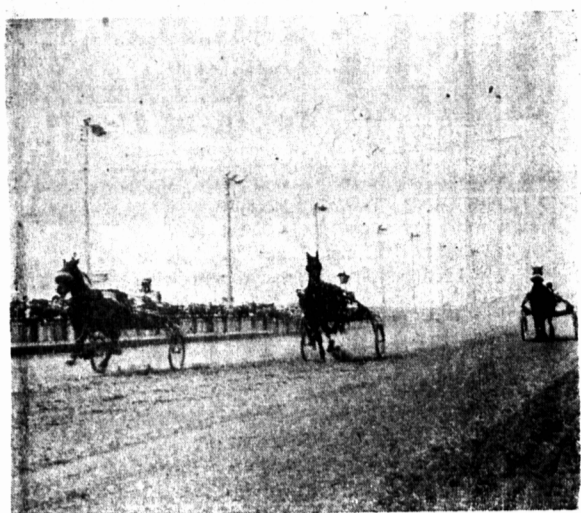


Exciting Race Finishes

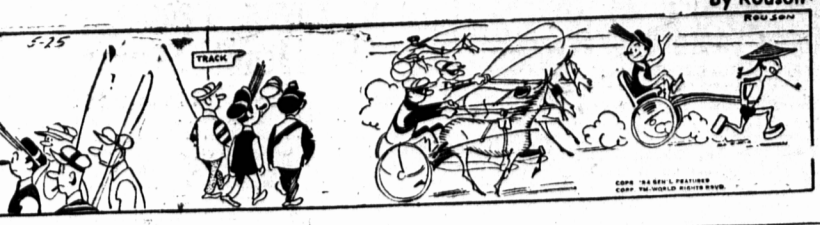
First Rifle Shoot Of Season Held Yesterday

BROOKLYN (AP)—Home runs by Frank Thomas and Dick Cole helped Pittsburgh Pirates knock Brooklyn Dodgers out of first place in the National League Monday night with a 5-2 victory. Thomas lined into the left field seats off Carl Erskine in the fourth inning and Bob Skinner had singled. Cole's blast, his first of the season, came with the sacks empty in the fifth. Max Surkont held the National League champions to four hits, two of them in the seventh when Brooklyn scored its only runs. PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Willie Mays banged home four runs Monday night on a pair of homers and a single as New York Giants edged Philadelphia Phillies 5-4. Earl Torgeson came through with a double that scored two Philadelphia runs in the third inning. Hoyt Wilhelm, who took over from starter Sal Maglie at the start of the Phils' seventh, received credit for the win. Steve Ridzik pitched the ninth but the loss was charged to starter Murray Dickson, his fifth against four wins.

The two Parkdale clubs, the always strong Sunshine Island Dairy and the rookie Parkdale Lions square off on the Parkdale Diamond in one of the initial contests. On the Knights of Columbus Diamond the Basilica Youth Club will be hosts to the Liguorian Youth Club, City League champions for the past two seasons. The strong Canada Packers Club and the Bike Shop Wheelers clash on the Old Diamond. The Meatmen have strengthened considerably since last season while the Bike Shop are new entries featuring former baseball players Brian Lewis, Lorne Hennessy and Wally Alston Shephard.
