BUILDING BIG VAULTS.

GUARDING AGAINST BURGLARS HAS BECOME A FINE ART.

Recent Improvements Made in the Construction of Vaults and Their Doors—Burglars Become Inventive and so the World Wags and the Moon Smiles On.

The most vulnerable part of a vault now is the edge of the door. It is almost impossible to obtain an absolutely tight joint, one which will be impervious to liquid explosives. The old method of attack was by means of a blow, or the crack of the vault door. As the construction of these doors became more perfect this was made impracticable. Then, the burglar turned his attention to other explosives, and today he uses nitro-glycerine. Nitro-glycerine when warm runs as freely as water. If the crack of a door is not absolutely tight the nitro-glycerine will find some small lodging place in it. When exploded it rips off the door, tears off its outer layers or explodes can be used to permit the use of nitro-glycerine and the vault is in an isolated place where powerful explosives can be used. Dynamite is laid against a weak spot and well tamped. Its explosion either makes an opening or weakens the walls or roof of the vault, or other explosives can be used to advantage. With a guarantee of comparative freedom from operation a set of burglars can enter a modern vault in ten to fifteen minutes. The shortest process is usually by the use of explosives, and it has been found that the high explosives are singularly local in effect and produce very little smoke, and are not sledge are often used, though burglars prefer boring, with the use of a blow pipe to draw the temper of the steel attacked. The most common method of attack is sometimes extremely difficult because of the high conductivity of iron and the close contact of the cold steel adjacent. Burglars seldom attempt to make holes more than an inch in diameter, and the heat from the small flame which can be introduced through such a hole is quickly dissipated. Sometimes the burglar borers through the soft metal and breaks the intervening sheets of hard metal with the use of a hammer, removing the metal piecemeal. It is estimated that an expert with finely tempered tools will work through an inch of a vault wall in an hour. It sometimes happens, though, that an inexperienced burglar, in his job after penetrating the outer layer of steel because his poorly tempered tools were all dulled in the attempt.

ANCIENT HOSPITALS.

These Institutions Were in Existence 500 Years Before Christ.

The first real hospital was one situated at Epidaurus, and dedicated to Esculapius. This hospital was in existence for over 500 years before Christ. It consisted of a general hospital, but of two special hospitals in addition. The Temple proper contained accommodations for all acute or chronic cases, and also a hydropathic establishment. In separate buildings were a lying-in hospital and a chronic hospital, and to the latter the aged and infirm, and those believed to be in artemo mortis, were admitted. The priests of Saturn in Egypt treated people for insanity 1,500 years before Christ. It is of the greatest importance, because we find that under their lunacy was considered as a disease to be repressed, but as one to be overcome by kindness and skillful treatment; and the temples of Saturn combined much that is now to be met in many of our best hospitals. The first lunatic asylums were founded on the pyramidal pile, for no one who resorted to them had so little self-respect as to desire to obtain medical relief, and the work can be compensated those at whose hands they received treatment and benefit.

REPLY TO "COMMON SENSE."

Sir.—In reply to "Common Sense," allow me to say that the leading temperance men did not intend to support an orator from abroad to tell our people how to vote on the Scott Act, as the parties in this city and province who can advocate the Scott Act are well known to the suppression of vice and the protection of our houses of legislation.

The temperance people seize the circumstance of a Scott Act election to treat the electorate of Charlottetown to a hearing of one who is an adept on the question before them.

Judging from his reception here three years since, they will, I have no doubt, appreciate the treat. But does it not strike "Common Sense" that it is a terrible reflection on the opponents of the Act, that they cannot find anyone of intelligence either at home or abroad to take the platform on their behalf?

It is not for want of money that they are unable to do this, for they are blowing around about all the money they have, plain light colored cloth, and going to match it in color. This is in imitation button style, the scalloped button piece forming the seam line against the corset at the front and the extension of the seam line to the seam line at the back. A simple shoe, with a pretty name, is low cut and a combination of button and lace fasteners, of soft, black kid. Down the front is a line of scalloped edge open work, to show the stocking of the wearer. The elaborate and broad button piece has three diamond-shaped points, corresponding to the three buttons, and a circular hole is made below each button, through which also the laces are visible when on the foot. It has a broad, perforated heel facing of the same material. —Shoe and Leather Reporter.

How Cigar Ashes Can Be Utilized.

Cigar ashes are used for medicinal purposes as a cure for ringworm, epidemic scurvy, etc. They are useful on account of the lime and alkaline properties they contain. Cigar ashes have been used under the pretensions name of "diamond dust from the sun," and the purposes to which they are chiefly put are cleaning, brightening and sharpening razors, lancets and doctors' other delicate instruments, as an insecticide for plants, etc., and as a tooth powder. It has been reported that a London firm offered a guinea per ounce for them for the purpose of compounding with other articles as a valuable dentifrice. The ash is, however, so light that it requires a very large quantity indeed to weigh one ounce.

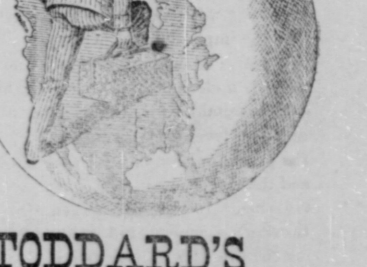
