

A Father's Fatal Cruelty.

TERRIBLE EXPOSURE AND DEATH OF HIS DAUGHTER AND HER BARE.

A Ringgold, Pa., despatch says: John Klingler, a wealthy old farmer of Rush township, has always been regarded by his friends as a severe and harsh old man, but no one ever gave him credit for as stony a heart as the tragedy of the last twenty-four hours proves him to have had.

Indian Curiosities.

J. SMITH, Agent." Mr. Taylor rushed over to Mr. Haskell.

"Great heavens! What shall we do?" "Make our wills!" "Get vaccinated!"

There was comfort in this last idea. They were vaccinated their families their children and their wives relatives were vaccinated. But they are not happy, they can't be happy. Perhaps now they will be.

The Times' London special says: With one accord the judges in the west and south of Ireland are signing writs of eviction by hundreds. There is apparently more destitution than since the awful winter of 1879, tenants having spent most of their little store of ready money in going into the delusive land courts, and laborers having had no work whatever. Already famine and scenes of violence are beginning to be repeated. Mobs of starving men are breaking up meetings of the poor-law guardians, with demands for food. Dead bodies are being found at the roadside wasted to the bone. It is at such times as this that a single judge in Kilkenny issues over two hundred writs of eviction in one day, involving the tearing of roofs from over the heads of at least a thousand human beings; and this is a sample of what is going on in fifteen counties.
