

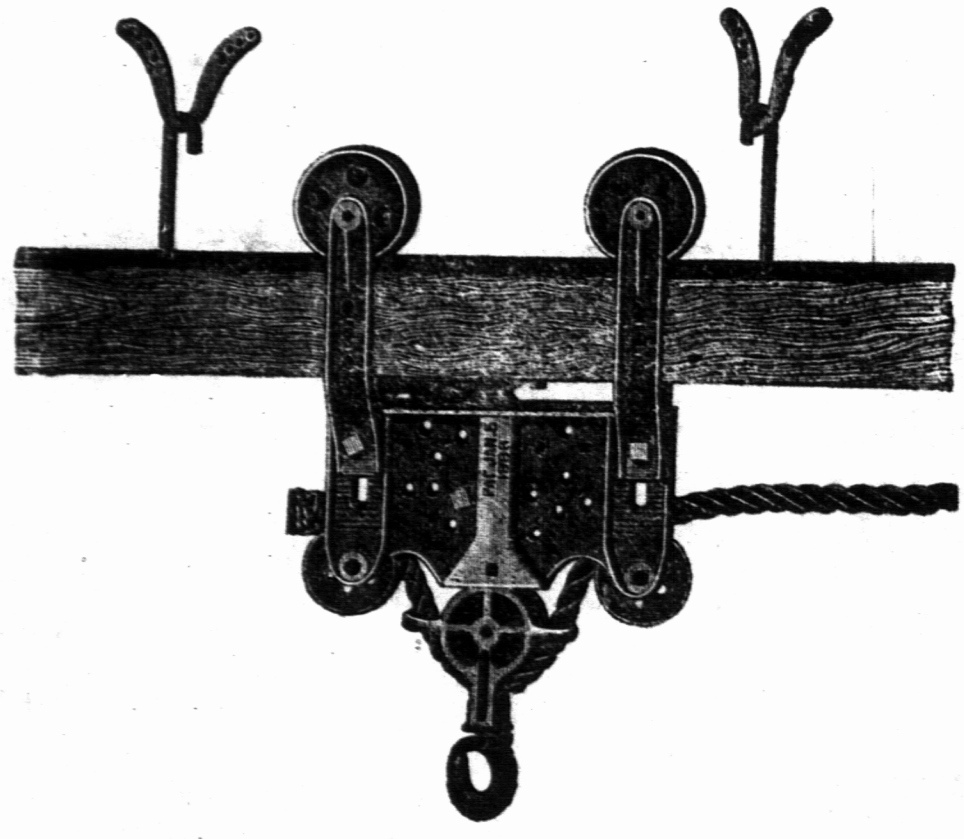

Local and Other Notes.

Gleaned by the Guardian Reporters

Mr. E. H. BERR, of this city, has been appointed representative of the Dominion Line of Royal Mail Steamships.

Mr. Francis Bain has been re-elected Secretary for P. E. I., of the Botanical Club of the Royal Society of Canada, which met in Ottawa last week.

The heavy winds of the past few days have prevented operations on the sunken Heather Belle, and nothing further has been achieved since our last report.

Who is he?—The St. John Sun says, "A P. E. Island man who arrived here last night, says the crops are looking fine and promise a big yield generally."

Mrs. Eliza Mellett of Royalty West was placed in jail on Tuesday to serve out a term of two months for violation of the Canada Temperance Act; first offence.

REV. D. SUTHERLAND, Messrs T. C. James and John A. Lawson left this city yesterday morning for Montreal, to attend the annual session of the Presbyterian General Assembly.

Mr. Isaac Harper, notice of whose death appeared in our columns a few days ago, died from an attack of pleurisy and other troubles, and not from blood poisoning, as was at first supposed.

Two drunks come up this morning in the police court. Three informations laid by the City Marshal, yesterday, against persons charged with selling intoxicating liquors on Sunday, also come up.

It seems strange that, although the Cape Traverse branch train runs out on the main line most every Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning, returning to the Landowine in the evening, it does not carry passengers and freight.

THE MARKETS.—There was quite a little stir in the markets yesterday. Quantities of potatoes coming in. Prices are dull. Potatoes were bought at 18 cents and oats 32. The beef market was somewhat brisker than usual. Hay moved off quickly, 60 cents being paid for pressing. There was the usual abundant fish market. Fresh mackerel were in for the first time this season, and sold at from 8 to 12 cents each.

Victims of Cigarettes.

Elmer Hardy, the 19 year old son of James Hardy, of New Brunswick, N. J., was suddenly attacked on Tuesday night with convulsions that had many of the features of hydrophobia. He threw himself about in his agony and tried to bite himself, as well as everything within his reach. He also growled like an angry dog. At times it required the united strength of four men to prevent him from injuring himself. He did not manifest any dread of water, however.

Hardy was bitten about a year ago by a pet dog and a few months ago he was bitten again by the same animal. There were no suspicions that the dog was affected with rabies at either time.

Hardy has been an inveterate cigarette-smoker, and the doctor having charge of the case attributes the trouble solely to this cause, although it is thought the bites of the dog may have aggravated the trouble.

Henry Rinehart, a young man from New Hope, died at Lunenburg, N. J., Wednesday, from excessive cigarette smoking. He had been working in the repair shops of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company since Monday. Wednesday he fell heavily to the ground while at work, and when picked up was unconscious. His features were horribly distorted, and his flesh turned purplish black. He was revived for a time, but of which he died. He confessed that he was an inveterate cigarette smoker, and that he had been warned that the vice would kill him. During the previous three days he had smoked 17 packages, and his daily average was four. He smoked almost incessantly, and his lips and fingers were a deep yellow from the smoke stains.
