MR. MARTIN AND THE MAILS.

Though some of our contemporaries seem disposed to avoid the fact, the people cannot fail to note that but for the initiative of Mr. Alexander Martin—the hard-working representative whom Sir Louis Davies wants to gerrymander out of the House of Commons—the question of our one-horse mail service would not have been ventilated in the popular branch of Parliament, and we should have had no assurance of even an attempt at improvement. The Postmaster-General, Mr. Mulock, had announced that the team service between Cape Tormentine and Anlaac had proved so satisfactory that it would be made "permanent." Under this to say our mails in winter would, under contract, be drawn by horses and sleighs for a term of years. Mr. Martin shamed the Liberal members, including Sir Louis Davies, into an admission that this would not do; and a hope may now be entertained that a special train will in future years be supplied between Sackville and Cape Tormentine as between Cape Traverse and Charlotte-town.

CANADA AND THE STATES.

THE bungle and failure of our Liberal statesmen (save the mark) will probably lead to complications, out of which it will be difficult to extricate Canada without loss of prestige. A correspondent at St. John's says that the announcement of the failure of the Joint High Commission's negotiations gives general satisfaction there because it will enable the colony to resume independent negotiations with the United States for reciprocity in fishery products, which the Americans are desirous to concede, in return for unhampered admission to the bait supply in Newfoundland waters. The favorable position of Canada in the negotiations, obtained by the strenuous efforts of Sir John Thompson, is thus likely to be lost, and it is impossible to say what sacrifices Canada will have to make to regain it. No doubt, the United States will make good terms for Newfoundland;—while the Mother Country will not longer continue to thwart the wishes of Newfoundland for the sake of a country whose statesmen are so manifestly incapable as those now in power in Canada.

THE DRUMMOND DEAL.

It is announced that the House of Commons has ratified the latest deal in respect to the Drummond County Railway. The latest deal is better than the first deal (defeated by the Senate) by a half million of dollars. But it will, in the opinion of the best judges, involve the country in heavy loss. Evidence and experience go to show that the deal means a heavy permanent charge upon the public treasury, for which there was no necessity—other than the political necessity of the Liberals to "fix" a few counties in Quebec.

—Mr. Donald McIsaac, the notice of whose death appears in our obituary column of to-day, was at one time a prominent resident and merchant of this city, and filled for a term under the old Coles-Whelan administration, the office of High Sheriff of Queen's County.

—The Farquharson Licensing law will go into operation tomorrow. All liquor dealers, except those who will pay the fee or the tax, or whatever they like to call it, will according to the law, have to go out of the business.
