

Substantial Salary Boost Given Top Public Servants

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson has announced substantial salary increases for some 100 members of the top echelon of the public service, including deputy ministers.

The increases, retroactive to Dec. 1, 1965, average eight per cent and push a half dozen officials to within a whisker of the \$30,000-a-year plateau.

Up from \$27,000 a year to \$29,000 are R. Gordon Robertson, clerk of the Privy Council and secretary to the cabinet, Robert B. Bryce, deputy finance minister, and Marcel Cadieux, under-secretary of state for external affairs.

A \$6,100 boost goes to George F. Davidson, director of the bureau of government organization and secretary to the treasury board who goes to \$29,160 from \$23,000 a year.

Moving up to \$29,700 from \$27,500 are D. F. Bowie, president and general manager of the Canadian Overseas Telecommunications Corp., and W. C. MacNamara, chief commissioner, Canadian wheat board.

Elected officials and certain of the Crown agency and corporation heads are not included in the increases.

GORDON GETS \$75,000

CNR president Donald Gordon is paid \$75,000 a year; Prime Minister Pearson, \$85,000; CBC President Alphonse Oulme, \$40,000; Opposition Leader Diefenbaker, cabinet ministers and Chief Justice Taschereau of the Supreme Court of Canada, \$35,000; members of Parliament, \$18,000; and senators, \$15,000.

All officials on the Friday list had not received increases for two years.

Tom Kent, who moved recently from policy secretary to the prime minister at \$26,000 to become deputy minister of citizenship and immigration, gets a boost to \$27,000 a year. This position had carried a \$25,000 annual salary.

Other deputy ministers or those of equivalent rank going to \$27,000 from \$25,000 are: Elgin B. Armstrong, national defence; John R. Baldwin, transport; S. C. Barry, agriculture; Elmer A. Zimmerman, chairman, defence research board; C. F. Elderkin, inspector general of banks; Richard Humphreys, superintendent of insurance; Commissioner George McClellan of the RCMP; Roger Duhamel, Queen's printer; Walter E. Duffett, dominion statistician; Dr. W. E. van Steenburgh, mines and technical surveys.

Moving to \$24,840 from \$22,000 are Rodrigue Bedard and D. S. Maxwell, both associate deputy ministers of justice. Joseph W. Willard, deputy minister of national health and welfare (welfare) goes to \$27,000 from \$23,000.

U.S. Newsmen Are Ordered Expelled From Indonesia

JAKARTA (Reuters)—President Sukarno has ordered all American correspondents to be expelled from Indonesia for allegedly giving a misleading picture of Indonesian events. He said relations with the United States have worsened.

Announcing the expulsion in an order to Foreign Minister Subandrio, the president said U.S. correspondents always wrote stories which hurt Indonesian feelings.

The order affects correspondents of the two American news agencies, The Associated Press and United Press International, and the New York Times, Subandrio told other correspondents.

Foreign ministry sources said all non-Indonesian correspondents working for American news organizations would also be affected by the order, irrespective of nationality.

Speaking at a presidential palace ceremony, Sukarno said U.S.-Indonesian relations have worsened because the U.S. has often violated the spirit of these ties.

He said former U.S. ambassador Howard Jones had asked him to ban anti-U.S. demonstrations and placards in Indonesia. The president said he in turn asked Jones whether he could forbid U.S. newspapers from carrying reports attacking Indonesia and saying Indonesia is on the verge of collapse.

Foreign ministry sources said no deadline was set for the departure of the correspondents. The Associated Press and United Press International each has one staff correspondent in Jakarta. The New York Times has a part-time correspondent. Antoine Yared of the AP is a Lebanese.
